## Doctors leaving practice at end of year

Helensville husband and wife doctors Adrian and Maryanne Gane leave the Kaipara Medical Centre they helped set up on December 2 this year.

"We're not retiring really - more having a change," explains Maryanne. "We want to work some of the time and have some time off.'

They plan to work as locums around the country, but only as they feel like it.

"There's a great need for locums all around the country, especially in rural areas," says Adrian. "Small town New Zealand has trouble getting holiday relief for GPs."

Adrian's vocation as a doctor was really set in childhood. His father was a general practitioner in Remuera, Auckland, and Adrian used to accompany him while he drove around making house calls.

"I was always a bit altruistic, so aimed to become a doctor when I finished school."

Maryanne was born in England to Kiwi parents - her father was also a doctor, specialising in obstetrics and gynaecology and moved to Tauranga in time to start school.

Like Adrian, she grew up with a desire to help people - which led to her meeting her husband-to-be when they both attended the Auckland University School of Medicine, from where they graduated in 1981.

They worked initially for two years based at Waikato Hospital, which included two, three-month stints at Tokoroa Hospital, before spending a year in Tauranga on the GP training programme.

They then left New Zealand to work as volunteer doctors in the highlands of Kenya at a former mission hospital, spending a few weeks travelling in the UK and Ireland before their return home.

In early 1987 Maryanne took on the role of locum doctor for three months for Helensville GP Dr Don Liddell.

The couple were in the process of deciding where to settle and work long-term and Helensville appealed. They bought Dr Liddell's practice in March 1987, and started as the town's new doctors the following month.

They would have been here 25 years in April next year.

That original medical practice was a very different proposition to the current Kaipara Medical Centre. In those days most GPs worked from their homes, as did Don Liddell.

The Ganes initially followed suit, living for two years in the doctors' rooms and residence at the corner of Commercial Rd and Porter Crescent, a building now called the Alison McKenzie House and which

houses the Helensville Women & Family Centre, as well as offices for Mt Tabor Trust and Parent Aid Kaipara.

In 1990 they built the home in Pipitiwai Drive they still live in, and the following year were joined in the medical practice by Kiwi doctor Duncan McDonald, who stayed on for 12 years.

The 'house' was now a 'medical centre' and getting busier by the day; it became obvious as the decade waned that the practice was outgrowing the premises.

An agreement was reached with the Helensville District Health Trust to purchase the existing medical centre.

Fundraising was then put in place to raise the funds to build the new Medical Centre, which opened in December 2006. The land and buildings are owned by the Trust, while the practice itself stayed with the Ganes.

We wanted to make sure medical care in Helensville carried on," says Adrian, who was the 2008 ProCare GP of the Year.

Sons Matthew and Ronnie were born and educated here, and both doctors have been involved in various other community activities, such as a stint on the Helensville Primary board of trustees for Maryanne and a role as Chair of the South Kaipara Men's Trust for Adrian.

As well as part-time locum work, Adrian and Maryanne are looking forward to spending more time with family in Auckland, Tauranga and Christchurch, and indulging their passion for tramping. They won't be moving from Helensville, however.

Travel plans include a desire to travel to Spain to walk the Camiño de Santiago, a 1000-year-old pilgrimage route to Santiago de Compostela in north west Spain.



### Skippers to leave Waitoki School

Long-serving husband and wife principal and teacher team Ian and Trish Skipper will leave Waitoki School at the end of this year.

The pair have taught together at various schools since 1982; Ian has been principal at Waitoki for 23 years and Trish has been there almost as long.

Other than travelling and spending more time with their family, in particular their elderly parents, lan says he "isn't really sure" what they are going to do next.

"We're really too young to retire fully," adds Trish - which leads lan to admit they

may take on some short- or long-term relieving teaching after a "good long break", some of it to be spent re-exploring parts of New Zealand by campervan.

They also hope to travel overseas to England and Europe.

Born in Thames, Ian began school at Ohingaiti, south of Taihape and then Hikurangi before his family moved to Helensville, where he completed his last two terms of primary school before continuing his education at Kaipara College.

He then attended North Shore Teachers

Training College before starting his education career in 1977 teaching at a selection of our local schools - a year at Helensville Primary, two years at Waimauku School and then a stint at Waioneke until August 1982.

Meanwhile, Trish, born in Palmerston North, had grown up in Mt Roskill in Auckland. Having met lan through an acquaintance in 1979, she too attended Auckland Teacher Training College and started her teaching career at Whangarei Primary.

Married in 1981, the couple moved in 1982 to remote Matiere in the King Country under a 'dual appointment' with lan as principal and Trish as teacher. Their son James was born at Waikato Hospital during their time at Matiere.

After five years there they shifted to nearby Tokirima for 16 months, before lan took up his current position as principal at Waitoki School in May 1989, bringing his education career virtually full circle.

"I've spent the biggest percentage of my teaching and living in the Helensville area," he agrees.

Trish began teaching part-time at Waitoki the following year, with her hours gradually increasing until she joined the permanent staff in 1994.

The couple made the decision to move back to 'civilisation' as they needed to be closer to a hospital for son James' medical condition. He had considered larger schools, but they liked the benefits the smaller school offered James and daughter Anna, born in 1989.

When Ian started at Waitoki the school only had two teachers and a roll of 30 - today that roll has trebled.

Earlier this year lan oversaw the opening of a new \$1.2 million building incorporating administration and office space, a new hall, staff room, music room, sports storage and toilets - a building which accounts for more than half the school's area.

The Waitoki School Board of Trustees is currently going through the process of choosing a new principal with the aim of making an appointment by mid-November.

### Waitangi Treaty settlement deed

Local Maori have closed the books on a 24-year claim process with the signing on September 9 of their Treaty of Waitangi Deed of Settlement.

Around 400 people gathered at Aotea/Shelly Beach where government, Auckland Council and whanau representatives arrived by ferry from Helensville.

The settlement covers both cultural redress, and financial and commercial redress.

Cultural redress includes recognition of

the traditional, historical, cultural and spiritual association of Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara with places and sites owned by the Crown within their area of interest.

The settlement vests nine sites totalling approximately 675ha, subject to specific conditions including protection of public access and conservation values: Atuanui Scenic Reserve; Mairetahi Landing; Mauiniu Island; Moturemu Island; Tīpare; Makarau; Makarau Bridge Reserve; Parakai; and Ten Acre Block Recreation Reserve.

the Crown that will include Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara at a future date.

As mentioned in last month's Helensville News, six existing geographic names will change and nine sites which do not currently have official names will be assigned geographic names.

The settlement's financial and commercial redress recognises the economic loss suffered by Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara arising from breaches by the Crown of its Treaty obligations and is aimed at providing Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara with resources to help them to develop their economic and social well-being.

Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara will receive financial redress to the value of \$22.1 million plus interest through their settlement.

They will purchase, at market value, Woodhill Forest; the land under Kaipara College, Kaukapakapa School, Parakai School, Tauhoa School, Waimauku School and Woodhill School, which will all be leased back to the Crown; and three properties in Old Woodcocks Rd, Kaipara Flats.

No private land is affected.

The Deed of Settlement also provides for Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara to purchase available selection units of Riverhead Forest up to a value of approximately \$6.4 million, and to have a the right to purchase the Paremoremo Housing Block.

In 1864, Te Otene Kikokiko, of Te Tao  $\overline{U}$ , gifted to the Crown a 10 acre block of land in Te Awaroa for public purposes on the condition that the land be returned if it was no longer required for those purposes. The Crown alienated parts of the block to private parties rather than returning it to Ngāti Whātua when it was no longer required for public services.

Accordingly, two sites from within the Ten Acre Block will be returned to Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara: Ten Acre Block Recreation Reserve as a reserve; and 24 Commercial Road, Helensville.

Following the official signing of the settlement document, all the guests present were offered the chance to sign as well, many of whom took up the offer.

At 3pm the action will move to the carpark behind the War Memorial Hall. There will be live youth band performances and children's entertainment leading up to the screening of the first of two rugby quarter final matches on a giant screen. Tables and chairs will be provided.

The hall will be open, decorated by the Helensville Floral Art Society and with a cafe catered by Macnut Cafe, serving a range of food. Outside there will be more food on offer from Helensville Primary and Kaukapakapa Playcentre and the Helensville Lions sausage sizzle.

The second rugby quarter final will screen at 8.30pm, with the evening finishing around 10pm.

Ritchies will run a free shuttle bus service

## College building work nearing completion

Kaipara College's new \$4 million building project is on schedule for completion by the end of November, with the hall ready in time for NCEA exams at the start of the month.

That's despite a wet autumn and winter and difficult subsoil conditions - it's an old stream bed - which meant timber piles had to be driven 10m into the ground in places.

When complete, the government-funded work will see the total replacement of the original 1930s to 1970s school block.

The work has also involved upgrading all the major services such as the power supply, data links, stormwater and sewerage, which didn't meet current standards.

When complete there will be a new staffroom, a student services block including health and guidance facilities, an international students' centre and English and IT classrooms.

The hall has been shortened by one bay

at one end, and by the removal of the stage at the other, with a drama suite and two music practice rooms added.

The building project will allow for the development of a "performing arts centre based around the restructured hall," says Principal John Grant.

The current project follows the opening in the middle of last year of the college's new \$2 million science block - and it isn't the end of construction work at the school.

Next year, the original science block will be demolished to make way for new social sciences rooms.

### Salsa time

#### with Peter Brennan of Porcini Cafe

SAN MARCOS

CHILPOTLE PEPPER

The start of daylight saving heralds the start of barbecue season, so with the cooking moving outside, dress up a barbecue steak and salad by making a spicy salsa to add freshness and zing to a simple meal.

Many supermarkets carry 'chipotle chilli in adobo', usually in 100g tins. Chipotles are jalapeno chillies that have been smoked and dried; the adobo is a Mexican barbecue sauce that preserves the whole chillies. Store what you don't use in the fridge in a screw top jar. Chipotle in adobo will give your salsa an authentic smokey taste and plenty of heat.

#### Roast tomato salsa

2 tablespoons olive oil

- 1 onion peeled and diced
- 8 cloves of garlic diced
- 10 firm ripe tomatoes (approx 800g)
- 1/2 cup chopped coriander
- 1/4 cup cider or white wine vinegar
- Juice of a lime or a lemon
- 1 teaspoon of salt

2 teaspoons of sugar

1 or 2 chopped chipotle chillies from the can, or 2-3 chopped fresh red chillies

Blacken the tomatoes by either placing them under a grill and turning them as the skin blisters and blackens, or on the bars of a hot barbecue grill. If you have a gas hob place a cake rack over the flame and place tomatoes on top, turn as they blister and then remove. Once roughly blackened but not mushy, transfer to a bowl.

Heat a pan with the oil and sauté the onions for a few minutes, add the garlic and cook for a further 2 minutes, set aside.

Place the softest half of the tomatoes into a food processor with the onion, garlic, chopped chipotle, vinegar, lime, sugar and salt. Leave most of the blackened skin on the tomatoes as this adds to the smokey flavour. Pulse to combine but do not puree. Pour into a bowl.

Chop the rest of the tomatoes by hand and add them along with their juice and the coriander. Mix together, adjust the seasoning, cover and leave in the fridge for a couple of hours before serving.

#### Eggplant and chipotle salsa

- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1 large egg plant, peeled and diced into 1cm cubes.
- 6 cloves of garlic chopped
- 1 teaspoon of salt

150g approx of fresh green beans, blanched in boiling water and refreshed in cold

- 2 chipotles and some adobe sauce, chopped fine
- 2 red peppers
- 1 table spoon of white wine, cider or sherry vinegar
- 1/4 cup of chopped parsley.

Roast the peppers as for the tomatoes above, then rinse them under cold water to remove the blackened skin. Cut in half, remove the seeds, dice and place into a bowl.

Set a pan on the stove, add the oil, egg plant and garlic. Sauté for a few minutes until egg plant is tender then add to the bowl. Cut the blanched beans into 3cm lengths and add to the bowl. Finally stir in the chopped chipotles with some of the sauce, add the vinegar, parsley and salt. Cover and store in the fridge for a couple of hours before using.

#### FIRE BRIGADE HONOURS NIGHT

The Helensville Volunteer Fire Brigade will hold it's annual Honours Night presentations on Saturday, October 29.

Since it was formed in 1914 our local brigade has been part of the United Fire Brigades Association, and every year service honours are awarded to the members of the brigade by the UFBA in recognition of their service to the community.

In order to qualify for honours a brigade member must attend at least 60 percent of weekly training over a year. After three years of service a firefighter receives a framed certificate, and after five years a silver medal. From then on they receive a silver bar for the medal every two years until they have completed 25 years service.

At 25 years the silver medal is replaced by a gold medal, the Gold Star. From then on a gold bar is awarded every two years until a second Gold Star is awarded after 50 years service - a very rare event.

The honours night includes a dance and supper.

As the Helensville Brigade is voluntary, the UFBA honours is one of the few ways the countless hours of training and attending calls are rewarded.
