The children ran the marathon over a period of six weeks, running along with their parents, covering approximately 40km in training, for which they kept a log book. They finished up with a final 2.195km run on the day of the Auckland Marathon.

In total, each pupil ran 42.195km - the same distance run on the Sunday by their adult counterparts.

Oscar made the final run in just over 10 minutes, with his team mates all posting impressive times. The whole team enjoyed the experience and atmosphere of the day.

## Old dairy factory up for auction

The dilapidated old Kaipara Dairy Company property at the south entrance to Helensville is due to be sold at auction this week.

Realtor Nigel McNeill of Bayleys Real Estate would not be drawn on what the property would go for, but says it has to be sold no matter what price it reaches.

He says there are at least two seriously interested prospective buyers.

The 1.3 hectare Mill Road site with 12 separate buildings has a government valuation of just over \$2 million and is being sold by Kaipara Investments Ltd.

In August 2009 the *Helensville News* revealed extensive plans by developer Jeremy Dyson to knock down the historic old buildings and replace them with Kaipara Mills, a development incorporating apartments, a hotel, theatre, commercial units and a public market. Despite spending \$500,000 on planning the project never came to fruition.



## New doctor starts next week

Kaipara Medical Centre's newest doctor, Willemijn Baneke, starts next week.

Replacing Maryanne Gane, Willemijn is a young woman GP doctor who has moved to New Zealand from her native Holland with her IT specialist partner Thomas.

She joins experienced GP Dr Richard Davies, who joined the practice last year as Adrian Gane's replacement.

Born in England, Richard spent 14 years in the Falkland Islands before coming to New Zealand. That experience working in a small community means he is ideally suited to medicine in rural New Zealand.

Over the next few months locals may also get to meet Dr Roland Ostring and Dr Elizabeth Eliot. They are a husband and wife team who have moved to Helensville from Christchurch where they ran their own practice. They will help out when the other doctors are away on leave

These changes will mean some Kaipara patients will be asked to change to another GP as their regular doctor. The staff is asking for the

cooperation of patients so the changes can be made as smoothly as possible.

Another change to how you will see your doctor at Kaipara Medical Centre is the introduction of a daily 'duty' doctor and nurse, with different clinicians taking each day of the week. This is for patients who need to be seen on the same morning, when they contact the practice for an urgent medical matter.

When a patient goes in they will first be seen by the nurse, who will assess them, possibly start treatment and then, if needed, the doctor will attend.

The duty doctor system is being trialled to allow better access to a patient's own GP on the day of their choice, rather than seeing different people each time. The nurses can

also take bookings in advance for CarePlus, diabetes checks, dressings, and blood pressure checks.

The aim is for patients to be able to plan with greater certainty when they wish to visit the centre.

Kaipara Medical Centre continues to be available for ACC accidents and the 24/7 after hours service is also unchanged patients can still phone the practice number and speak to the after-hours nurse, who will put them in touch with the on-call doctor if required.

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# European sabbatical throws up ideas for education here

Parakai School principal Sean Valvoi believes New Zealand schools should be doing more to turn out students who are problem solvers and innovative thinkers and we need more emphasis on learning foreign languages and developing students with a global conscience.

However, he thinks New Zealand schools are right at the top when it comes to supporting students who are falling behind.

He has reached these conclusions after a 10-week sabbatical in France, Denmark and Sweden which saw him visit seven primary schools in total, observing classes and playground behaviour and meeting principals and staff.

Sean returned to Parakai School at the start of Term 4 and has written a 13-page report for the Parakai Board of Trustees.

He went with five main areas of enquiry – looking at the schools' leadership and governance; discovering what programmes they have in place for students who are falling behind; learning how they implement teaching foreign languages; looking at how they develop students with a global conscience; and investigating the impact of the Scandinavian countries' more liberal education systems on student achievement.

"There are certain aspects of the way schools are run over there that we can learn a lot from," he says. "I was impressed with the practices I observed in Denmark and Sweden, the importance they place on developing students to become creative and innovative, always approaching tasks from a problem-solving angle.

"I saw kids really excited by learning, and lots of interesting ways of learning."

He says Denmark and Sweden, and to a lesser extent France, place a much higher degree of importance on learning at least one, but more often two, foreign languages.

"New Zealand education needs to place more focus on learning foreign languages from a younger age if we are to be active participants in the international community."

Sean found many differences in the way schools are run in those countries. In France the principal is the sole leader of the school –

there is not even a secretary. In Sweden, many schools have two principals of equal status, with no other managers or leaders.

In New Zealand, says Sean, "we are doing most things right. Our leadership structures are a little bit more liberal and less 'flat', and I think that helps provide a career path for teachers."

The schools in all three countries had different systems to deal with children who are falling behind. But, says Sean, "it is encouraging that what is being carried out in New Zealand is generally better than what is provided in all the countries visited."

Sean believes the overseas schools place much more emphasis on developing students with a 'global conscience'. They follow the news, and local, national and international issues.

"I feel there is more which can be done [here]," says Sean. "For older students, starting the day with a discussion on current local and global issues would be highly beneficial."



## Rautawhiri Park becomes rally pitstop ANNA'S HAIR STUDIO

The Rautawhiri Park carpark was turned into a 'parc ferme' for racing cars when the Targa New Zealand Rally passed through Helensville recently.

Two of the early stages of the race, which attracted more than 100 cars, were held locally, through Taylors Rd and Old North Road. Those roads were closed for half a day for the racing.

After completing those stages, competitors drove past Kaipara College to Rautawhiri Park, where they could spend an hour changing tyres, making repairs and cleaning the cars.

They then cruised down Commercial Rd on their way to the third stage to Warkworth.

The Targa Rally is characterised by the diverse range of vehicles which enter, this

year ranging from Ferraris, Lamborghinis and Porsches down to basic older cars like Ford Anglias and Escorts. Cars race in either the Metalman Classic or the Modern class.

This was the first time in the event's 17year history it had travelled north of Auckland.

As well as the competitive entries, around 30 drivers entered the Targa Tour, which lets them drive on the closed roads using racing lines, but at speeds limited by a lead vehicle. The Tour is aimed at owners of older, classic vehicles.

Targa Rally organisers hoped the event would raise \$50,000 for charity Cure Kids. If that target was reached, the Targa Rally would have raised \$500,000 for the charity since 2002.

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## Helensville Primary gets top ERO review Kaipara Medical Centre

Helensville Primary has received a glowing Education Review Office (ERO) report - so good in fact that it's now been placed on a 4-5 year review cycle instead of the more common 3-yearly review.

The report says the school "provides students with a high quality education. The school culture is inclusive and warm relationships between staff, students and whānau are evident.

"Students are confident, capable and proud of their school."

Principal Eileen Brunton says the report is "a very good reflection on the staff, Board of Trustees and parents."

Explaining that only around 10 percent of schools get put on the longer review cycle, she says ERO's review is a "very positive thing for our school."

The ERO report says "many examples of high quality teaching practice are evident in the school. Students respond well to teacher's high expectations for their learning.

"Helensville School provides very well for the learning, engagement, progress and achievement of Māori students" and the report cites in particular the establishment two years ago of Te Kura Tuatahi o Te Awaroa, the school's Māori Medium class.

"There is a school expectation for all students to learn te reo me ona tikanga Māori."

The report praises the Board of Trustees. saying they "continue to be child-focused and have a clear understanding of their

### Submissions on council waste plan

Locals have until January 31 to make submissions on Auckland Council's draft waste plan, which outlines ways to manage and minimise waste.

They may also attend a hearing to speak in support of their submission during February and March 2012.

The draft waste plan was signed off in October, with councillors supporting the streamlining of waste management across Auckland and reducing the amount that is sent to landfills each year.

John Dragicevich, Manager of Infrastructure and Environment Services says the formation of Auckland Council

governance role."

The staff, too, receive accolades, saying "the school has established high quality leadership and management practices. Trustees are well served by school leaders.

"The principal is strategic in her approach and ... her leadership style is focused on improving teaching practice and raising student achievement.

presented an opportunity to rationalise services for all of Auckland.

"Until now, we've had seven different systems for collecting and dealing with waste across Auckland. We have the opportunity to streamline how we deliver waste services to all households.'

The plan includes consistent funding of waste and recycling services for all Aucklanders. All households will pay directly for the kerbside refuse they put out (45 percent already pay directly.)

Any changes will be done in stages over the next four years after the plan in adopted in mid 2012.



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Local children attending arts school

Locals are being invited to apply for senior scholarships to the Corelli Academic School of the Arts in Browns Bay.

Several local children already attend the private school, which runs its own, heavily arts-oriented academic curriculum where students produce and hold half-hour shows – open free to the public – every Friday at 12.30pm throughout the year. Last year 84 shows were held.

"The community arts support is outstanding," says arts director David Selfe.

The senior scholarships, available through national charity The Corelli Foundation, are for Year 10, 11, 12 and 13 students in music, dance, drama, or the visual arts. They provide for 50 percent of tuition fees, except in music where the scholarships cover 40 percent of fees.

The Corelli School is a Cambridge Examination Centre. Students from Year 10 work on the International General Certificate of Secondary Education, usually sitting the examinations at the end of Year 11.

They then move on to the Advanced Subsidiary level in Year 12, and Cambridge A level for their final year, as well as sitting their chosen international performance examinations with the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music, Trinity/Guildhall, and/or the Royal Academy of Dance.

Students are immersed in the internationally-recognised Cambridge System from Year 1, with primary and

intermediate programmes designed to prepare students for the senior examination curriculum.

In 2010, Corelli received its sixth 'Top School' rating with the Cambridge international exams.

The Corelli Academic School of the Arts was founded in 2001 by husband and wife team David and Kirsten Selfe, who saw a need for a kind of 'creative immersion' in New Zealand where the arts play a major role in a child's school curriculum.

They describe the school as a "boutique learning environment that is rich in diversity, expression and progressiveness."

With the roll restricted to 150 students, strict attention is given to values and ethics in what they describe as a family style school. Students are expected to take responsibility for themselves, and to support the goals of other children of all ages.

Class sizes are small, with mixed-age groups learning together in a curriculum that adapts for different learning levels, peer support and mentoring opportunities, and long-term relationships with teachers.

Despite its small roll, Corelli's focus on artistic output is backed with facilities such as the 184-seat Jonmer Theatre, an audio recording studio, widespread practice rooms and music facilities. On the academic side there's a modern science laboratory. Specialist tutors teach dance, music, drama and visual arts, with academic studies managed by separate qualified staff.

### Call for youth to register for free development programme

Local young people aged 15 to 24 are being encouraged to register by the end of this month for Te Awaroa Youth Club's free 2012 'Youth Vision' youth development programmes.

Four courses will be held next year, with the first running from Tuesday, January 31 to Thursday, March 22. They run over eight weeks on Tuesdays to Thursdays from 9am to 3pm.

"There are age-old lessons being lost to this young generation that Te Awaroa Youth Club recognises as important for adult success," says Heidi Van Duyn.

"Take changing a leaky washer - it's a simple process similar to many other life skills taught at TAYC, but some of these basic DIY skills are foreign to youth."

The curriculum includes employments skills; life skills; social and community skills; health and fitness as well as adventure-based learning.

Each module is taught from a strengths-based approach where participants are encouraged to up-skill in a friendly and encompassing environment.

The Youth Vision programme recently finished its first year. It was developed to provide young locals with opportunities to prepare them for their role in society and develop their potential, while at the same time facilitating and promoting positive personal growth.

It's intended to complement, not replace tertiary education. The course is on a 'first in first served' basis and spaces are limited to 12, so early registration is recommended.

Based at Te Awaroa Youth Club in Awaroa Road, the programme makes full use of the club's facilities.

Youth Vision is free thanks to two years' worth of funding from the ASB Community Trust.

### Try Panforte for Christmas

Christmas is just around the corner, and the trouble is that most of the traditional Christmas foods are designed for enjoyment in the colder climates. Rich fruit cakes, sweet fruit mince pies, the big roast, baked hams, and steamed pudding.

I certainly enjoy cooking and eating those items, but I really struggle with cooking up a big meal on Christmas day. To be fair we have usually worked at Porcini up until the last minute so to turn around and do it all again at home can be less than appealing.

This year we held a roast turkey dinner at home at Easter for our family and friends which seemed a much more appropriate time of the year for a day in the kitchen.

One Christmas dish I do enjoy very much is the Italian, or more correctly Tuscan, treat of Panforte. Recipes are diverse, often contain citrus rind, and loads of spices including pepper. There are references to Crusaders carrying the confectionary Panforte, and the use of Panforte in surviving sieges.

And according to Wikipedia, in 1205 Panforte was used as a currency by the people of Siena to pay their taxes to the monks and nuns of the monastery; this payment was made on February 7, hence its connection to Christmas.

My recipe is somewhat pared down, includes no rind or pepper, but does include chocolate and fabulous local spicy honey by Kiwitahi.

#### Panforte

2 cups slivered almonds or South Head macadamia nuts, chopped 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups dried fruit (currants and small sultanas) 2/3 cup plain flour or gluten free flour 2 table spoons sifted cocoa 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tea spoons cinnamon 60g dark chocolate (not milk chocolate) 60g butter 1/4 cup sugar 1/3rd cup Kiwitahi Manuka honey

In a large bowl combine the nuts, fruit, flour, sifted cocoa, and cinnamon. Mix together thoroughly and set aside.

Place the chocolate, butter, sugar and honey in a bowl and heat to melt and combine. This can be done over a pot of hot water or by short bursts in the microwave. Once the chocolate mix is smooth stir into the dry ingredients and mix by hand until a cohesive mass is formed.

I use a pizza tin at Porcini but any 9inch/23cm round cake tin will suffice. Line the bottom with baking paper and dump in the Panforte mix. Push the mix to the edges of the tin and flatten with your hand or by running the bottom of a spoon over the mix. The Panforte will only be about 10-15mm thick.

Place into a 160° Celsius oven and bake for about 25 minutes. The cake should be soft and still wet looking. Remove from the oven and cool. Once cool place into the fridge and leave for a couple of hours to harden.

To serve, cut in half and then cut thin wedges from the centre to the edge. Serve straight from the fridge with a cup of coffee and a dollop of cream.
