# Parakai hospital & dementia facility to open soon

Work is nearing completion on the new hospital and dementia wings at Craigweil House in Parakai, with the building expected to be open by Thursday, April 5.

An open day is expected to be held soon after the opening.

The development, which is costing "in the millions" according to Craigweil operations manager Richard Parker, will also see further refurbishment work on the original heritagelisted 1908 house, adding seven more beds to the existing rest home in a concurrent project costing more than \$100,000.

The new 20-bed hospital will be joined directly to the existing building, while the 20-bed dementia wing is a separate building, joined to the hospital by a covered deck.

Richard says staff numbers at Craigweil will increase from the current 23 to up to 53, and it is hoped the new wings will be half full within three to four months of opening.

He says there is no shortage of applicants for the positions on offer.

Auckland architectural firm Eclipse Architecture has created a design in keeping with the existing weatherboard appearance of the original home.

The new hospital will feature large rooms with low-silled windows so bed-ridden patients can see outside easily. Each room

will have its own television, and ensuite bathrooms will be shared by two rooms.

There will be a nurses' station, a large new laundry to service the entire complex, and a day room for patients with huge ranch sliders onto decking overlooking a grassed and landscaped area. A conservatory may be added at a later date.

Rooms in the fully-fenced dementia building will be slightly smaller without the need to cater for lots of bulky medical

equipment, and also to encourage the dementia patients to take part in the various therapeutic activities such as music and dance that will be on offer.

It will feature a special colour scheme designed for dementia patients, and lots of scented plants such as lavender will be used in the surrounding plantings.

As well as large windows, skylights will

let in as much natural light as possible.

In the original home, as well as the additional rooms, other major work will be carried out. The kitchen will be greatly expanded, as will the dining room, and the whole property will be repainted and recarpeted.

There will be a new 1920s-style picket fence out front, and the aim is to restore all the original stained glass windows if applications for heritage grants are successful.

Craigweil's natural thermal bathhouse, which dates from the 1930s, will also be renovated as funds are available.

# letters

On Friday last I spent all day on our farm at Wilson Road, South Head, looking for the vivid yellow flower heads of ragwort. I dug every one out, buried the stalks and disposed of the seed heads properly.

Every year I do the same, and there are now almost no residual plants whatsoever on our farm. However, some seeds continue to blow in on windy days and every year stragglers must be destroyed before they can seed.

One day a year is not bad considering the alternative of letting them go and causing misery to my neighbours. When we see how thick agapanthus has become on the South Head and other roads we must be grateful that ragwort has been mostly eliminated by careful farmers, as both these plants are inedible and prolific at spreading. Ragwort is poisonous to most stock.

Unfortunately the extensive tiling won't be able to be repaired as replacements are unavailable, but the restored bathhouse will feature a hoist for less mobile residents.

Manager Deborah Presland, who has worked at the home since 1988, is delighted the bathhouse is to be refurbished in its original 1930s style.

Many other features are being retained to protect the art deco and neo-classical style of the building, says Richard.

Work already completed includes the restoration of the kauri mantle piece in the main house and stripping joinery back to its original native timber. Much of the exterior painting is also complete.

Craigweil House is owned by the Allenby Group NZ, which took over the property 12 months ago and changed the name from Parakai Home for the Elderly back to its original title.



# Hotrod a tribute to lost son

When Ryan Moore was 15, he began his dream project to build a hotrod with his father Chuck.

The hotrod was to be just a regular 'driver' - nothing too flash. But Ryan, who suffered from serious depression, took his own life in April 2009 just two months into the project.

After his death parents Chuck and

Sheila, of Waitoki, decided on something much more special - a loving tribute to their talented musician son.

The result, Ryan's Peace Bucket, was one of the highlights of the Kumeu Hotrod Show on February 21 and 22, taking pride of place just inside the doorway of the main indoor exhibit and winning the People's Choice award.

 One of the hotrod's airbrush With the number plate 'T4RYAN', the 1923 Model T Ford 'T-Bucket' has been fashioned after Ryan's persona.

"Anyone who knew him would recognise the T-bucket as being a mirror of his life,' says the sign which accompanies the car.

Ryan identified with the 1970s, with its values of peace, love and rock and roll, and in particular regularly wearing (and selling) home-made tie-dyed shirts.

To that end, the car has been given a lavish tie-dyed paint job, complete with two airbrushed portraits of Ryan on either side by Steve Levine at Imagin-Airing.

Featuring a 302 Ford V8 engine and unusual pearl white

paintwork for the engine, chassis and non-tie-died body sections, the hotrod was assembled by Helensville's Lance Walsh. It had originally been purchased from . Whangarei as a juststarted project.

Originally from northern Washington state in the United States. Chuck and Sheila have lived in New Zealand for 25 years

# Local builder takes on renovation franchise

Helensville couple Bryce and Belinda Coles have just taken on the local franchise for Australasian home renovation company Smith & Sons.

Bryce, son of Jenny Coles of Allsorts in Commercial Road, began his builder's apprenticeship 12 years ago with local builder Malcolm Pickering.

He worked with Malcolm for seven years before becoming self-employed, working mainly in the renovation field both locally and throughout the Auckland area.

# 4th Running of the Roses

Helensville Lions Club holds its annual Running of the Roses fundraising event this Saturday, February 11.

First held in 2009, the event will see up to 3000 numbered imitation roses released into the Kaipara River on an outgoing tide at the Kaipara Cruising Club (this year around 3.30pm). The first six roses retrieved from the river when they reach the Kaipara Dairy Factory win the major prizes.

This year's two top prizes are each valued at \$1000 – a Bay of Islands cruise for two including a night's accommodation from Fullers United Travel, and a 43" Samsung television from Magness Benrow.

# Young Farmers will compete at A&P Show

A Junior Farmer competition will again be a highlight of this year's Helensville A&P Show.

The contest features one year five to eight representative from each of the local primary schools, who must demonstrate skills in farming, domestic and general knowledge categories.

Contestants have four minutes to complete activities such as hammering nails, sawing wood, milking a 'cow', ironing a shirt, whipping eggs, and completing a wheelbarrow obstacle course.

Competition organisers Lyn Catchpole and Julie Croft say the greatest challenge for the contestants is a speech each child must give on the Show's main stage.

Points are awarded for each activity completed, with extra points earned for those who dress as a farmer in the RD1sponsored event, now in its fifth year.

In addition to the children's tasks, parents and other school students are encouraged to come along on the day to support their Junior Farmer competitor. The crowds are judged for overall enthusiasm and a Supporters Trophy is awarded to the winning school.

Starting at 1pm, the competition was inspired by the adult Young Farmer Competition held each year in New Zealand.

## Free bowel cancer screening programme

250 randomly selected eligible Kaipara Medical Centre patients have begun a free, four-year bowel screening pilot programme being run by the Waitemata District Health Board.

Local earthmoving contractor Dave Swale was the first person enrolled in the new programme. Dave had had two uncles and a friend die from cancer, so when the opportunity came to take part in the pilot scheme he was quick to sign up.

The programme will be rolled out to more people to a total of 137,000 Waitemata

It provides a simple screening process for people with no obvious symptoms to check for early signs of bowel cancer. It's different to other screening programmes, as participants don't need to enrol or even see a doctor or visit a medical centre.

Eligible participants receive an invitation letter and a test kit from WDHB with detailed instructions on how to take a sample and send it to the laboratory.

Invitations to participate are generated from a population register - the first time an invitation-based population screening programme has been piloted in New Zealand.

"The programme is the first of its kind in New Zealand, and the test is free and very simple to take," says Kaipara Medical Centre's practice manager John Issott.

"We're very excited that some of our medical centre's patients are the first to take part."

Bowel cancer is the second most common cancer in New Zealand; each year about 100 residents from the Waitemata area die from it. The bowel screening programme will help detect cancer at an early stage. If caught in time, there is a 90 percent chance of successful treatment and long-term survival.

# A&P Show turns 110 this month

The Helensville A&P Show turns 110 on Saturday, February 25, and should once again be the largest event on the town's calendar.

New attractions for the kids this year include bumper boats, a Boot Camp obstacle course, mini jeeps and hotrods, and hopefully the Zipline Flying Fox.

They are just some of the new amusements in the Cookie Bear's Roadshow, which has been updated with new features including three large slides.

The show's layout will be mostly the same as last year, although the Junior Farmer competition and dog agility and pet dogs have been moved to the trade area, and the military vehicle display, previously around the racetrack, has a new spot beside the trade displays, bordering Railway Street.

One of last year's biggest crowdpleasers, the Grand Sheeplechase sheep racing, is back again. Also returning from last year are the popular 'Water Walkers' Zorbs which this year will be joined by Neverland Castle and an Air Cannon.

When parents need to put their feet up for a spell, the main stage will have local band Retro Vibe playing, plus for the kids Cherry the Clown, who will be wandering the Show grounds on stilts during the day.

There will be Clydesdale cart rides around the grounds, and pony rides for the children. Also returning is the popular Carmel's face painting, highland dancing competitions, and for a true taste of farming activity, the sheepdog trials.

Woodchopping is one of the biggest crowd draws each year, and the Puhoi Woodchoppers will be back in action on the 25th.

At 1pm Oikoumene Forest and Harcourts will be running a noreserve auction on their adjoining trade sites for a sleepout from Oikoumene worth \$12,000. Proceeds from the fundraiser will go to Helensville Primary. See page 43 in the Schedule.

Relish the Taste, the 'mini expo' of locally produced food and wine which is always popular, is back again too.

A regular feature at the show in recent years have been beautifully coloured and decorated cardboard-cutout works of art by local school children; this year look out for some colourful calves.

Of course the Show would not be what it is without the animals, this year including cattle, sheep, miniature donkeys, horses, and working dogs - plus the equestrian competition.

Add to those regular features like the Historical Society butter making, River Valley Amateur Winemakers & Brewers Guild, Brightside Spinners, Old

# Visit to Te Hana Māori Pa complex

Students from Te Kura Tuatahi O Te Awaroa, the Māori Medium class at Helensville Primary, have visited the new Maori Pa tourist complex at Te Hana.

The tamariki have now been immersed in a special Māori Medium learning setting for two years and focus on learning about the South Kaipara environment, its history and Te Ao Māori (the Māori world-view).

The visit to Te Hana included a powhiri in which the tamariki took part, demonstrating their knowledge of Tikanga Māori.

The children then joined with tourists from all over the world to tour of the replica Pa site. They learned what it was like to live in New Zealand three hundred years ago, the customs and practises of the Māori people, and finished by hearing the legend of the Māori maiden Te Hana.

The boys were particularly impressed by the part of the village which trained boys as young as themselves in the art of warfare.

The visit gave the students and whanau a sense of belonging and connection to the people of Te Hana. They were able to join in with all of the waiata and were familiar with the Ngati Whatua tikanga or customs.

Over the last few years there has been a resurgence of interest in te reo, waiata and the tikanga of Ngati Whatua in the South Kaipara, with groups from Helensville and Wellsford meeting regularly to korero (speak) Māori, learn their stories and practise waiata. These people believe te reo Maori and the culture of Ngati Whatua in the South Kaipara has all but been lost and share the vision of bringing it back.

## Raw fish salad

Something I get to do over my summer break is to go fishing with my mates. This year my week off coincided with days of rain and mucky winds that meant the chance of a fish was missed.

Since being back at work the weather has improved and my mates have been making the most of it.

A beautiful snapper was dropped off by neighbours on their way home from a long day out last week. As we had people coming over for a meal that night, I decided to make my one fish go a long way.

Raw fish is eaten in many parts of the world. I have eaten a Spanish version made with blood oranges and spiked with dry sherry; in Yugoslavia (when it still existed as a state) I enjoyed a version made with

apples, using plum brandy as the curer. The fish was rather lost in this salad but the hangover was spectacular!

In the Pacific, coconut cream and sweet fruits such as melon, mango or pawpaw are added and lime juice is the preferred curer.

My version below is easy to make and can sit in the fridge in the cure juice up until the last minute when it is literally thrown together. We may have missed the early part of the summer but I am picking the latter will be long and warm with plenty of evenings to enjoy some outdoor dining.

#### Raw Fish Salad

2 cups slivered almonds or South Head macadamia nuts, chopped 300g white fish (snapper, tarakihi, ling)

Lemon juice (approx 100mls)

1 x 400g can of coconut cream

- 4 spring onions finely chopped
- $\frac{1}{2}$  cup coriander leaves (cilantro) chopped
- 1 red capsicum, sliced and diced
- 1/2 cup diced cucumber
- 1/2 cup sliced red onion
- Chilli flakes or Kaitia Fire chilli sauce (to taste)
- Pinch of salt

Dice the fish into small pieces and wash under cold running water. Place the fish in a bowl and add the lemon juice, the fish should be just covered with the juice. Place in the fridge and leave for at least 2 hours. The fish should appear white and feel firm.

Drain off the lemon juice and add all the other ingredients with the salt added last for taste. Gently mix all together and serve with a glass of cool white wine or rose<sup>2</sup>.
