Last college building project nears end



· Work is well under way on the new social sciences buildings

Students will start next year at Kaipara College able to move straight into the school's new social sciences block.

The school's old 1960s-era science block was demolished in August, and building started straight away on the new 400sq.m. buildings, which will face each other across a large hard surface courtyard with seating and planter boxes.

When complete the \$1.4 million building will feature four social sciences classrooms and one maths room. There will also be a large social sciences resource room at the end of one of the buildings.

The new buildings replace the old social sciences rooms which were destroyed by a fire at the school in 2006.

The new classrooms, as with those opened in earlier stages of the school's rebuilding, carry over themes from the original Helensville District High School, with wide roofed-over verandahs and weather board siding.

Unlike those older buildings, the new blocks are completely modern in construction with a mixed timber and steel structure and "kilometres" of wiring and data cabling, says principal John Grant.

The school has already been enjoying power savings brought about by the new efficient, commercial double-cycle air conditioning system installed in much of the rebuilt school, including classrooms and the gym.

The completion of the new social sciences block will see the finish of rebuilding work at the college - a four-stage, six-year transformation which has seen the majority of the school demolished and replaced. The old tech block is about the only remaining original section.

Other work needed to bring the whole project to completion will be mostly landscaping, with a large central open courtyard and grassed area to be established, and the school canteen to be moved.

As part of the previous rebuilding work, the school hall had its large fixed stage area removed; the college is now arranging funding to purchase a 2m by 6m mobile stage.

Interest sought for carving project

Local carver Denise Marshall has a dream to install a series of carved public benches around Helensville - but she needs help to achieve her aim.

She has been donated a macrocarpa log, currently stored at the Art Centre, but says it would be a struggle to take on the project alone.

"I want more people to become involved - I want it to become a community project," says Denise.

"It's a major undertaking for one person.'

She believes there are locations for three to five seats in places such as the Riverside Reserve in Mill Road, Rautawhiri Park, outside the Commercial Road council service centre and on the small Bridge Street reserve overlooking the Awaroa Stream.

Her plan is for each seat to be sitespecific, featuring themes in the carving related to its location - subject matter like sports for a Rautawhiri Park seat, and perhaps dog walking for the Riverside Reserve.

Ideally Denise would like a core group of five or six people to help, though she says there would be room for others to help out to a lesser degree.

She doesn't believe the project would be onerous for an enthusiastic group, and estimates each seat would only take about five days to complete, with the work split over five weekends, working three to four hours at a time over the 10 days.

Denise also says it doesn't matter if volunteers have no previous carving experience, as she is willing to teach the basics.

The 'roughing out' is a learning process. The initial stage would be building confidence, with more input from me," she savs

"As they get their confidence they will bring in their [own] ideas."

Denise says the council's parks department supports the project - although she was unsuccessful with an application for arts funding for it - and the Lions Club of Helensville has offered to provide wood carving chisels.

At this stage she isn't expecting a firm commitment from locals - she just wants to gauge how many people may be interested in getting involved.

New manager for Parent Aid

Nadine Phillips of Helensville has taken over as manager of Parent Aid NorthWest. She took over late last month from Lynette Edmunds, who held the role for seven years.

Originally from Wellington, Nadine moved to this area with her family in 2006, living variously at Wainui, Kaukapakapa and now Helensville.

Daughter Briana (8) and son Daniel (6) go to Wainui School, while four-year-old Tara attends Kaukapakapa Preschool.

Nadine takes on her role as manager at Parent Aid with first-hand knowledge of how the support organisation works, having benefited from its services when Tara was a baby. She was thrilled to learn that the home support worker who helped her then is still part of the team.

"I already knew and had respect for [Parent Aid], and I've always been drawn to nonprofit organisations," says Nadine. "This seemed like an amazing opportunity."

The opportunity to work in our community with its wide range of support options was also a big plus.

"There are lots of support groups and organisations [and] they all work together so well."

As manager she will report to Parent Aid's governing committee, handle all the administration, marketing and finances, and co-ordinate with the four support workers, matching them to clients.

In Wellington Nadine was employed for many years as a legal executive and secretary. She then worked as membership secretary for the World Wildlife Fund for Nature, before moving into the veterinary sector. She worked as both a veterinary nurse and receptionist, finally spending six years as practice manager for the Onewa Road Veterinary Hospital.

Since moving to this area she has worked part time as a teacher aide at Wainui School. She served on the Wainui Playgroup's committee for many years, and is currently on the Wainui School PTA. 'My two passions are animals and child care," she says.

While stressing that it is early days in her new role when it comes to plans for the future, she does believe there are some "neat opportunities" to explore, especially around the issue of funding. Currently, Parent Aid relies entirely on grants.

"And there are always further opportunities for how we can support people."

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Local fire fleet updated

Helensville Volunteer Fire Brigade's new Iveco pump rescue tender is a "big upgrade" says station officer Mark Anderson.

The seven-year-old fire engine, which came here from former duties at Kumeu, has replaced a "very old" Dennis unit with a machine more in line with the national fleet, which Mark says is currently undergoing modernisation.

A rescue tender is a dual-purpose vehicle, working in rescue situations such as car crashes, while also being fully equipped to fight fires.

It has an almost new loadout of rescue equipment, including cutters, spreaders and hydraulic rams.

Having the latest equipment is important, says Mark, as it means firefighters from other stations who may be called in to help with a fire will be able to use the gear straight away.

Helensville's local volunteer fire fighters have spent a lot of time training on the rescue equipment, including using old vehicles for 'scenario'-type training.

On the fire fighting front, the new lveco tender has one major benefit over the old Dennis, and the station's other fire engine as well as carrying 1800 litres of water, it has built-in foam. Foam is much better than straight water when fighting, for instance, grass or scrub fires as it 'sticks' better, and also conserves water - important considerations for a rural brigade.

"This is a really good advance for us," says Mark. "It's really worthwhile in a rural area."

The lveco is designed to operate with a minimum crew of four, but usually carries six

fire fighters.

Helensville volunteers are also looking forward to receiving the latest breathing apparatus, which the Fire Service is in the process of replacing nationwide.

The new masks have built-in microphones and electronics to amplify speech, making communication between firemen while fighting fires simpler and clearer, and therefore safer.

Swimming water quality to be tested at South Head lakes

No Kaipara beaches are on the list to be monitored over summer by the Auckland Council Safeswim water quality programme.

However, two South Head lakes - Ototoa and Kereta - are among 10 freshwater lakes being monitored.

The Safeswim monitoring programme began on November 62 and runs until the end of March next year.

The monitoring programme is designed to provide regular assessments of water quality at 69 beaches around the region plus the lakes - in an effort to reduce the risk to public health. Water samples are collected regularly from the selected locations and tested for bacteria.

Results are available on freephone 0800 723 379.

At the most recent test for cyanobacteria on November 16, both South Head lakes were rated safe for swimming.

McLeod history book review

The Pioneering McLeods of Helensville by John McLean Hardback, 94 pages, illustrated.

Published by, and available through, Clan McLeod Helensville, 184 Govan Wilson Road, RD5, Warkworth 0985, phone 09 422 9928. Also available from the Helensville Museum.

John McLean is the author of several

historical books examining the early days of New Zealand, and is himself descended from the Scottish/Nova Scotian settlement at Waipu in Northland.

The Clan Mcleod, a prominent part of that migration, commissioned him to write the history of their family beginning with the extraordinary John McLeod, and his less flamboyant brother Isaac.

John McLeod was an entrepreneur. In an age in which obstacles were merely physical rather than obstructive and bureaucratic, he got things done.

Recognising the huge value and demand for quality timber the McLeod brothers opened a mill in the heart of the kauri country at the southern tip of the Kaipara Harbour. Today it is easy to criticise previous generations for their exploitation of resources. In the 1860s and beyond, the resources of the mighty kauri trees that covered Northland must have seemed



infinite - just as oil and coal probably did a century later.

The mill at Helensville "grew by leaps and bounds" and ultimately employed more than a hundred men, both Maori and immigrants. John McLeod built a "comfortable dwelling house for himself" and his family which was named, in honour of his wife, "Helen's villa". Sadly, this first house that gave what became a prosperous little

town its name, was later pulled down and replaced.

Isaac stayed on in the district, but John McLeod became involved in a long list of enterprises - the coal mine at Kawakawa, the lime works in Auckland, gold mining in Coromandel and also as politician. He was first nominated for a seat in the Auckland Provincial Council in 1865 and became an active, eloquent and well-educated member.

John Mclean has produced a delightful and factual account of this remarkable pioneering family.

In an age of revisionist

history it is refreshing to find an historian who has so diligently sought contemporary accounts. The plentiful quotations from the Southern Cross and other newspapers are testament to the quality of writing and journalism then in vogue. It serves to place this hard working, god-fearing pioneer family at the centre of the events, as well as being most enjoyable for its clarity.

Christmas cake

It is almost Christmas time already, as I write this the decorations are up in stores and children are listing the must-haves for the holidays. Flicking through my notes and recipes this one for Christmas cake literally fell out onto the floor - self selection that can't be ignored! Of course it is a family recipe, but whose family I couldn't really tell you. When my mother passed away I inherited her ring binder of hand written recipes. Not all are in her hand, such as this one. However, I have used it for many years at home and at work and it never fails. The fruit can be interchanged as long as the general quantities remain the same. I have used crystal ginger with extra rind to make a truly spicy version, cherries instead of the prunes, even dried figs instead of raisins.

It looks like a bit of an effort when you see the list of ingredients, but nowadays you can buy bags of premixed fruit which cuts down considerably on the assembly time. Soak the fruit in the brandy a day before you make the cake.

This makes a 220mm x 70mm round cake; use a spring tin if you have one. Grease it with butter and line it with 2 layers of baking paper on the bottom and 2 layers around the sides.



Ingredients:

270g raisins 270g currants 150mls brandy 270g sultanas 180g prunes (de-stoned and chopped)

80g candied peel

50g slivered almonds

220g plain flour or 210g gluten-free baking flour 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 teaspoon mixed spice 1/2 teaspoon nutmea 250g soft brown sugar 250g butter 1 tablespoon black treacle or golden syrup 5 eggs Blanched almonds for decoration.

You will need four bowls.

Day 1: In the first bowl place the dried fruit and the brandy. Cover with plastic wrap and leave to swell over night. Stir it a few times during the day to ensure all the fruit gets to soak up the brandy

Day 2: In a second bowl combine the candied peel and the slivered almonds, with a table spoon of the flour. Mix it through to stop the peel clumping together. In the third bowl sift together the remaining flour, baking powder, cinnamon, mixed spice and nutmeg. In the last bowl large enough to hold all the ingredients, cream together the butter and sugar, adding the eggs one at a time and finally fold in the treacle.

Using a metal spoon cut the flour and spices into the butter mix in three batches. Then cut in the peel and slivered almonds. Finally cut in the soaked fruit.

Spoon the mix into the cake tin and decorate the top of the cake with blanched almonds. Bake at 150° Celsius or 140° fan bake for 3 hours. Test with a skewer, if not cooked after 3

hours turn the heat down to 100° and test every 10 minutes until the skewer comes out clean. Allow to cool completely in the tin before turning out. This cake can be made well before Christmas and benefits from a wee drizzle of brandy or sherry once per week until Christmas.
