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2014 A&P Show to be zero-waste groundbreaker

Next year's 112th Helensville A&P Show will become the first officially council-sanctioned zero waste event in Rodney district.

And show manager Caroline Anderson believes it will be the first zero waste A&P show in the country.

Visitors to the show, on Saturday, February 22, will see clusters of three brightly coloured bins located around the grounds manned by blue-dressed volunteers.

The bins feature huge graphics and are colour-coded - green for compostable material, red for landfill and yellow for recyclables. The volunteers will direct show-goers which bin to use.

Perhaps more importantly, all packaging materials used at the show - think the cups, plates and cutlery supplied by the numerous food stalls - will be totally recyclable or compostable.

They will be made from sugarcane bagasse, potato starch, corn starch or special compostable polymers that break down into natural ingredients when composted. New polymers like PLA look like plastic but are actually compostable.

At the time of writing the A&P Association was waiting to hear about funding for the

zero-waste project from Auckland Council's Waste Minimisation and Innovation Fund. However that was expected to be a formality, as it was the council which originally approached the A&P Association to tell them funding was available.

Commercial rubbish firm Rubbish Direct has already be contracted for the event. It will quantify and remove the rubbish, sort the waste and dispose of or deal with the waste correctly, and funds permitting will conduct an audit of the waste.

"Although ideally we want no landfill waste on show day, we acknowledge the 2014 show is unlikely to be truly zero waste, but instead a stepping stone towards this ultimate goal," says Caroline Anderson.

"As the Helensville A&P Show is the biggest one-day event in town and attracts a large number of visitors from Auckland, we believe the knock-on effect of promoting a green footprint will be significant."

All trade exhibitors at the show will sign a zero waste agreement to minimise potential landfill waste brought on-site, as well as requiring all food vendors to use biodegradable or recyclable packaging and cutlery. "The project involves a rethink of both how we run the show as well as how we operate as an association year-round," says Caroline.

She says support from trade stand holders has been very positive, and many are already operating in a zero-waste environment as best practice.

Caroline says there are several goals behind the decision to run a zero-waste show.

Those include significantly reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill; ensuring the event is sustainable; providing an example for other larger-scale events and showing the local community and the agricultural and horticultural sector

that it is easy and ultimately cost-effective to generate less waste and dispose of waste in a more environmentally beneficial way; educating the community; making the event more appealing and attractive; and quantifying and understanding the nature of the waste the show generates.

To put the zero waste event together, the A&P Association is working with the Auckland Community Zero Waste Alliance (ACZWA) which has the full support of Auckland Council.

"A zero waste event is more than using compostable or recyclable packaging, its also engaging the event-goers to know what is recyclable and compostable. That is where volunteers are needed to show the way," says ACZWA spokesman Chris Pairama.

ACZWA operates under the auspices of the Zero Waste New Zealand, which in turn is administered by the Kaipatiki Project, one of Auckland's most active and diverse environmental groups.

Waste educator volunteers are trained to help event-goers tell the difference between the various materials and put the right

Call to help update local website

Locals are being asked to check through the hundreds of free community listings on the Helensville Online website to make sure everything is up-to-date.

The website, at www.helensville.co.nz, has around 120 pages of local information on it and site owner Dave Addison, of Dash Design in Parakai, says it has become impossible to keep all the listings up to date without outside help.

"There are around 300 listings for community groups, education providers, clubs and sports organisations," says Dave.

It's got to the stage where I can't keep the listings current on my own, but rather rely on locals to let me know when things change."

He would like anyone involved in any sort of community group or organisation to check over the site and let him know if they find outof-date information. The listings are free, and there is no charge for updating them.

"The site is a fabulous resource both for locals and people interested in Helensville. It gets about 14,000 individual visitors every month, so it's important to keep it as current as possible."

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Free sports and art gear win for Parakai School

Prime Minister John Key handed over a huge bundle of sports and art equipment to children at Parakai School last month.

The gear was part of a \$700,000 giveaway to more than 1000 primary and intermediate schools around the country by the Meadow Fresh 'Cool Our Schools' programme.

Parakai was the first school in New Zealand to receive prizes in the competition.

The school's students had to collect stickers

from qualifying Meadow Fresh products, which were then attached to special collection sheets and sent in to the company to enter the giveaway.

Parakai was picked to be the first prize recipient in part because it was one of the schools in the prime minister's electorate, partly because of its low-decile rating, but also because of the large number of stickers it collected in relation to its relatively small roll.

Principal Sean Valvoi says his students saved 1418 stickers in only one term of the two-term competition.

All schools completing a collection sheet will receive a prize; the more stickers collected, the more goodies they get.

First year Parakai School teacher Kieran Fry, who teaches years 6 and 7, was behind

the school's involvement in the competition.

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Show president off to Aussie youth conference

Learning ways to encourage more young people to get involved in agricultural shows will be top of the agenda when Helensville A&P Association president Jordan Bradly travels to Brisbane in January for a three-day 'Next Generation' youth conference.

Jordan, who in July last year became the Helensville Show's youngest president at age 21, is also the Royal Agricultural Society's (RAS) Northern District Youth Council representative, and it's with that hat on he is travelling to Australia - his first overseas trip.

Next Generation is the Queensland Chamber of Agricultural Show Societies'

youth arm, and as such is the Australian equivalent of the RAS Youth Council here.

In New Zealand, the RAS is the governing body for all agricultural shows. The country is divided into six districts, and the Helensville Show comes under the auspices of the Northern District, of which Jordan is also vice-chairman. Jordan says the Northern District is a very strong youth advocate, and as a representative on the Youth Council he meets with the 11 other council members from around New Zealand to try to come up with ways to encourage more youth participation in agricultural shows.

"The idea is to encourage youth involvement from a grass roots perspective to encourage more youth at show level, then ultimately at district level," says Jordan.

A&P shows around the country have difficulty attracting younger members.

With the local Youth Council only formed in September last year, Jordan says he will be interested to learn at the conference how his Australian counterparts are addressing similar issues across the Tasman.

He met some of the Australian representatives when they visited the Royal Show at Feilding last December. In Brisbane he will stay on the University of Queensland campus.

While Jordan will be there solely as an observer and to network with the Australian youth members, Northern District chairman Geoff Smith will present a paper at the conference.

St John get-together

St John volunteers who serve the Helensville area gathered for a get-together and dinner late last month.

It was a chance for them to meet colleagues who serve in different divisions, including the ambulance service, the youth division (cadets), the OpShop and the area committee - a wide range of ages and diverse skills, all with the same purpose of doing their best for the Helensville area.

St John OpShop staff have put a call out for locals to have a clear-out of last year's unused presents and donate them to the Commercial Road shop to sell. They would also like locals to donate plastic bags as they have trouble sourcing enough.

They are also keen to enlist a couple more volunteers to man the counter; locals who can spare a few hours each week or month should pop into the shop.



Poker Run raises \$6000 for Shelly Beach fire station

Locals from Shelly Beach to Helensville, Kaukapakapa to Kumeu were treated to the sight of more than 200 motorcyclists rumbling through our towns on Sunday, November 17.

They were taking part in the 5 Station Poker Run, an annual 200km ride which raises money for one of the five fire stations in our area - Helensville, Kaukapakapa, Shelly Beach, Kumeu and Muriwai.

This year Shelly Beach was the host station, and the event raised around \$6000 says chief fire officer Adam Knezovic. That will go toward upgrading medical equipment and communications gear such as portable radios.

The amount raised was about \$1000 more than raised the previous year for the Muriwai brigade.

Motorcyclists came from as far away as Feilding, Hikurangi and Cambridge.

The five volunteer fire brigades involved in the 5 Station Poker Run all work together on fire calls around the district, and

the event is a way for members to get together in a social way, while raising funds at the same time. Taking turns to host the event highlights the stations involved.

This year the ride left Shelly Beach at 10am, calling first at Helensville, then via Peak Road to Kaukapakapa, where they stopped at the market. They then continued on to Kumeu station via Kahikatea Flats Road, Dairy Flat, and the Coatesville-Riverhead highway, then out to Muriwai and finally back to Shelly Beach.

At each stop the riders go in the draw for a playing card. At the end of the ride, the entrant with the best poker hand from the five drawn cards wins the major prize - this year dinner for two and a night's accommodation at Skycity Hotel in Auckland, won with a full house.

Organiser Stephen Sparnon says many other prizes were given out, and the day ended with a barbeque dinner at Shelly Beach Reserve cooked by Waimauku Lions Club members.

Next year Helensville will be the host station.

"I'd like to thank everyone for supporting us - the entrants, sponsors and community," says Adam.

Medical Centre back in local

Ownership of the Kaipara Medical Centre is back under local control following the switch to a mixed community ownership model on November 1.

That means the medical centre will now always have a minimum of 51 percent local community ownership.

Under the new ownership model, the Helensville District Health Trust (HDHT) has a 50 percent stake in the business; two of the centre's doctors – Dr Phill Barter and Dr Aimee England - hold 30 percent of the shares; and the remaining 20 percent belong to the Waitemata District Health Board (WDHB).

Doctors Adrian and Maryanne Gane owned the practice until their 'retirement' in December 2009. At that stage the Health Trust was solely a landlord as it owned the premises. The Ganes sold Kaipara Medical Centre to a company called Peak Primary which owned a dozen general practices throughout New Zealand.

After a couple of year it became evident a 'corporate head office' ownership model did not suit our rural community, compounded by the fact Helensville was the only rural practice in Peak Primary's portfolio. With the decision-making out of local control, morale at Kaipara Medical Centre dropped and the practice was on the cusp of losing some key staff.

The Health Trust was approached to see if it would buy the centre, and purchased the business on February 1 this year. Now, after what Trust chairman Dianne Kidd describes as "one of the more challenging business structures" she has had to deal with, half of the business has been sold to the doctors and WDHB.

Under the new ownership model the centre will be run by a five-member board made up of Dianne as chairman, and directors Susan Narbey (representing HDHT); Dr Maryanne Gane (doctors representative); Olive Rudolf (Ngāti Whātua); and Dr Tim Jelleyman (WDHB).

Sustainability, stability and succession are at the heart of the mixed ownership model.

Sustainability will be achieved by the Kaipara Medical Centre being successful

and profitable, and providing a return to its owners. The Health Trust can reinvest dividends in health outcomes in the community as it is a charitable trust.

Stability will come through attracting and retaining the best staff for the medium to long term, and succession by growing the medical centre and ensuring it has the right people trained and able to provide continuity of service.

The HDHT and WDHB have been working in partnership throughout the year to enable a smooth transition towards the new ownership for the centre's staff, clients and stakeholders.

Says Dianne Kidd: "The Trust has a longstanding relationship with Kaipara Medical Centre and it has been part of our vision to achieve community ownership for this important facility for some time.

"Our strategic relationships with Ngāti Whātua Nga Rima o Kaipara and Waitemata

DHB are also long standing and strengthen our ability to lead the Kaipara Medical Centre into the future."

From a practical point of view, it will be 'business as usual' as far as the general public are concerned, but with a renewed focus and commitment to provide the people of Helensville and South Kaipara with the best medical care.

"In the initial stages [community ownership] means the decision-making and controls are brought back to the local area," says Dianne.

"It's the start of a new era. There will be opportunities through the relationship [with the WDHB] that will benefit the community.

"We now have the opportunity to really listen and hear what people want as part of the community and to respond - we couldn't do that with the old [ownership] model."

Podiatry for diabetes patients

Chris Rewi of Hibiscus Podiatry has started a monthly clinic in Helensville for patients with diabetes.

The service is free for patients referred to Chris by Kaipara Medical Centre. They can get up to four checks in a 12-month period; if more checks are needed there is a charge of \$15. Patients referred from some other practices must pay the \$15 for each visit.

Clinics are held on the first Monday of each month in the Waitemata Health Services building beside the Kaipara Medical Centre in Commercial Road. However Chris expects the frequency of clinics will increase because diabetes patients require regular checks, and he is now taking bookings up to 12 months in advance.

As we head into summer it's easy to forget about the routine health checks we need to ensure we receive as women. Has it been over three years since your last cervical smear test? If so, make sure you pop in for a quick smear test as soon as possible. At the Kaipara Medical Centre we have three nurses who can perform smear tests along with our team of doctors, including two female doctors - myself and Dr Nicole Badie.

Another routine check is your mammogram, recommended once every two years for women aged 45 to 69 years (and best of all it's free if you are in this age range!) The Breast Screen Aotearoa unit has a mobile trailer and clinics on the North Shore and West Auckland. Phone 0800 270

200 to make an appointment, or speak to one of our nurses at Kaipara Medical Centre. It only takes 30 minutes and is a really effective safeguard against undetected breast cancer.

Many people forget their GP can also offer a wide range of contraception, so it's worth coming in for a chat - either on your own or with your partner to discuss the options available. For example, we now offer Jadelle, a contraceptive implant in the upper arm that is effective for up to 5 years. Kaipara Medical Centre can also now insert and remove IUDs, so you're no longer required to get a referral to another clinic.

Finally, we are very sad to see a valued member of our team depart this month. Dr Rakesh Dogra has worked at Kaipara Medical Centre for seven years and will be missed by many of us in Helensville and the South Kaipara. He is returning to India to be with his family, and we wish him all the best for the future.

Disabled people visit local disco, art centre

47 disabled people from the Elevate Christian Disability Trust in Onehunga visited Helensville recently, attending the weekly 'Wiggle & Giggle' disco at the Helensville Community Church in Mill Road, and a special one-off art class was held for them at the Helensville Art Centre.

The group was invited by Pauline Denton after she had visited them to do a craft activity and show a film featuring her work as an arts and activities co-ordinator with Mt Tabor Trust, which support adults in Helensville and Henderson who live with learning difficulties.

The group came to the regular Wiggle & Giggle disco, which Pauline runs and which is attended by a similar number of local people from families and agencies within the disability sector. With the arrival of the 47 from Onehunga numbers at the disco swelled to around 90, and friends of Mt Tabor came along to lend an extra hand.

Pauline says the day was great fun for everyone, and another visit is planned in the New Year.

Support sought for number plate camera

Long-time Fordyce Road, Parakai resident Roy Brooks is seeking support from other property owners in his road for the installation of a number plate camera.

Roy, who has lived in Fordyce Road for 36 years, says there have been a number of burglaries in the road in recent years.

He wants to know if his neighbours along the 5km-long road would be interested in contributing to the cost of a hidden camera, which would photograph the number plate of every vehicle driving up the road.

Images from the camera, stored on a memory card, could be used to identify offenders after a property has been burgled. If used in conjunction with a sign indicating the road was under camera surveillance it could also help deter burglars before they offend.

Roy is looking at a compact, highdefinition camera that costs around \$1000. It can photograph vehicles travelling at up to 80km/h, and uses infrared to work at night as well as during daylight hours. Being motion-activated it only operates when a car approaches, meaning batteries last for around 12 months.

He says if the majority of homes in Fordyce Road contributed to the purchase of the camera, the cost could be as low as \$20 per household.

Obviously a lower uptake would mean a higher cost per house.

Free wi-fi internet - but with a catch

Helensville and Parakai residents can now access the internet for free following the installation of two wi-fi 'hot spots' by Telecom recently. However there's a catch - you need to be a Telecom mobile customer. Locals using other mobile carriers can access the service too, but at a cost.

The two wi-fi hot spots were installed as part of a nationwide Telecom programme, which has seen more than 600 phone booths around the country upgraded with the service.

The Helensville service runs from the phone booth in Commercial Road outside the library, and in Parakai outside the 4 Square. Both booths feature bright pink stickers which explain how to access the service. With typical wi-fi signal strength the hotspots have a range of about 80m. Users can register up to five devices to connect against their mobile number.

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Kaipara to Kaipara walkway expands into horse trekking

The popular Kaipara 2 Kaipara walkway will expand into horse trekking for three special weekends early next year.

The three-day walkway opened in October 2010, and last year was named one of the top four things to do in the Kaipara area by the New Zealand Herald.

"We decided to expand into trekking as we had a number of walkers come through that owned horses, or had teenagers that rode as well, that wanted a place to bring their own horse and ride – as opposed to other treks where the horse is provided," says Clare Dill, who with husband Steve, and Shane and Jenny Hood, developed and run the walkway.

"The number of farms to ride on in the area is reducing as areas are

turned into lifestyle blocks, so I think people are pretty pleased they can come and ride somewhere close to home that still feels like you are in the middle of nowhere."

The walkway has been rebranded as the K2K Experience to reflect the fact it is no

longer just for twolegged trekkers. The horse treks

will be held over the w e e k e n d s o f January 17 to 19, February 14 to 16 and March 14 to 16. Shorter rides are also available by request.

H o r s e b a c k trekkers will need to bring their own horse and bedding, and unlike the walkway will be guided throughout.

The treks start on Friday afternoons, with participants taking a short ride to the Dill's farm bach where they can relax and enjoy the surroundings. The hut is the same one

used on one night of the walking trek.

The next morning sees the start of a guided 40km trek through the Kaipara Hills with views of the Kaipara Harbour, stopping for a break at a 'secret' waterfall before heading south past Mt. Auckland, through several large family sheep and beef farms, and finishing back at the farm hut.

The Sunday will be a more relaxed ride of about 15km to the top of the Kaipara hills to see views of the Hoteo River.

Horses will be penned up overnight in a small yard beside the hut or in a neighbouring paddock.

The Dills and Hoods are both farming families, and the walkway concept initially came about after visitors commented they hadn't realised how beautiful the land tucked between State Highway 1 and 16 was. The two couples decided to venture into tourism, and the K2K Walkway was the result.

Glowing ERO report for KKK Playcentre

Grains in our diet

Eating gluten-free is something many people choose to do, but there are an estimated 35,000 people in New Zealand who are 'poisoned' if they consume gluten, a protein found in wheat, barley, oats and other grains.

Far from a food fad, eating food free of gluten is an essential way of life for those people unfortunate enough to develop celiac disease, an auto immune disease that affects the intestine.

Consumed gluten causes the lining of the digestive track to react. The immune system attacks the villi that line the digestive track and enable absorption of food. Continuing to eat gluten eventually stops your ability to absorb nutrients from food and you would starve. Symptoms include bloating, constipation, stomach pain then diarrhoea as your system purges itself of the toxin. Every time you consume a bit of gluten you kill off more of your ability to digest food.

Removing gluten from the diet isn't easy and requires spending a lot of time thinking about, planning, shopping and preparing

Gluten Free Pizza Base

You need a large bowl, a wooden spoon, a rubber spatula, and baking paper. This mix will make about five, 6" to 8" pizza bases.

- 600 ml of warm water
- 1 teaspoon of dried active yeast (not surebake)
- 1/2 tea spoon of salt
- 1/2 tea spoon of sugar
- 1/2 tea spoon mixed herbs
- 60mls (3 table spoons of oil)
- 5 cups of Bakels 'Health' Flour.

Put everything except the flour into the bowl and leave for five minutes to activate the yeast. Then sift in the flour and beat with the wooden spoon. The mix should be a thick batter that the wooden spoon will stand up in.

Tear off five sheets of baking paper about 400ml square. Dollop a fifth of the dough onto each paper. Have a cup with a little oil in and dip the spatula into it; use this to spread the blob into a circle about 5mm thick. Bake at 200° C for about five minutes, until the surface dries out but it is not cooked all the way through. Allow to cool and wrap in plastic to freeze. Use as you would any pizza base and bake for the same length of time with toppings. You may need to experiment with thickness and cooking times to get your pizza how you like it.

NASTY COMPUTER VIRUS

The first cases of a nasty new computer virus called CryptoLocker have turned up in Helensville. It is a 'ransomware' program which, when a computer is infected, encrypts most data files on the computer, making them useless. It then displays a CryptoLocker payment program that prompts you to send a ransom of either US\$100 or US\$300 in order to receive a code to decrypt the files. Infected computers only have 72 hours to pay the ransom. Major anti-virus programmes will detect the virus.



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
