Poppy project is blooming

A wall with hundreds of blood red poppies is rapidly growing in the entrance foyer to the Helensville RSA in Commercial Road.

Designed to commemorate New Zealand's involvement in World War I and the centenary of the ANZAC Gallipoli landings next year, the wall already boasts around 700 hand-made poppies and is about two thirds complete.

Many have been made of various types of paper, while others are knitted, crocheted or made from felt.

The poppy wall was suggested to the RSA by Helensville's Jackie Milina, who had read about a similar '5000 Poppies Project' being run in Australia and Wellington.

Jackie kick-started the project by making 500 paper poppies. Western ITM in Kumeu donated plywood sheets and RSA WWI centenary project co-ordinator Keith Cowper mounted black-painted polystyrene to that so the poppies could be pinned up. He made a number of paper poppies himself, and Jackie, along with locals Jan Scott, Anne Keane, Sheryl Mathews and Jenny and Sonya Viselich of Hobsonville have made numerous others from a range of media.

Rather than simply mounting the poppies in a flat display, they are being bunched to give a 3-D effect.

Now the call is out for more people to make poppies for the wall, particularly RSA members. The aim is for around 1000 poppies in total, which will be left on display in the RSA foyer until ANZAC Day next year.

Anyone interested in making poppies to contribute to the wall should phone Jackie on 420 8328.

She says that once the wall is full, if there are left over poppies the plan is to get a large polystyrene cross and cover that with poppies and mount it on the RSA foyer's opposite wall.

New classes for 2015 A&P Show

A range of new classes added to the schedule for next February's Helensville A&P Show are just some of the changes in store.

New arts sections will include drawing, print making and both indoor and outdoor sculpture - all available in classes for children and adults. Show manager Caroline Anderson says they will be a great opportunity for locals to exhibit their work before an audience of around 6000 people.

Works on display will also be able to be offered for sale, with the A&P Association taking a modest 10 percent commission.

Entrants in the photography section will have a major new incentive too. The winner of the champion adult photo will see their entry go into the Royal Agricultural Society Northern District's new 'Supreme District Photo' competition, with \$500 in prize money up for grabs. The winner will also receive a sash and a certificate.

Show schedules should be available early December.

Keeping with the arts theme, a free public art workshop will be held on show day by artist Andrew Hall, who with the support of Auckland Council Creative Communities NZ will help show goers create sculptures from waste.

That in turn ties in with the 2015 show being a zero waste event for the second year running, following a successful trial at this year's show.

Entertainment on the main stage will be by Sal Valentine and the Babyshakes, and Captain Festus the Pirate will be wandering the grounds, singing, playing pirate games and telling tall tales of the sea.

The main stage will be moved back to its original position in front of the main show hall, and food and wine vendors will have stalls around the bar area. The large marquee in the trade area which last year housed food stalls and demonstrations will be set up as a farmers' market for next year's show.

10th HIPPY graduation ceremony

Seventy South Kaipara families will celebrate the completion of another year of the HIPPY pre-school education programme at a graduation ceremony on Friday, December 5.

Twenty of the children will be wearing their graduation robes after completing the full two year (60 week) programme. They will receive framed certificates, t-shirts, books and a small gift.

The rest of the families will have either completed the first year (30 week) programme or be working towards completion. All of these children will also receive gifts and certificates acknowledging their hard work – as do the parents who have committed to working with their HIPPY child on a regular basis.

The ceremony in the Helensville War Memorial Hall will open at 6pm with a karakia followed by a performance by the Parakai School drumming group, reprising their popular performance at last year's graduation.

HIPPY South Kaipara was established in 2005, so this will be the 10th graduation ceremony.

A special ten-year celebration will be held on Saturday, March 7 next year involving all past HIPPY children and parents, tutors and supporters. There have been 550 families enrolled since 2005 and

26 parents employed as HIPPY tutors.

"The first HIPPY children are at Kaipara College now and doing well," says local HIPPY co-ordinator Bernie Malizia.

She says parents are keen to talk about how HIPPY has made a difference to their child's ability to settle into school and have the confidence to take on new challenges in life. Christmas parade time!



It's Helensville Christmas parade time again on Saturday, December 6.

Sponsored by the North West District Business Association and ASB Bank, the parade has been redesigned this year to take in more of Helensville and tie it in to Parakai as well.

It will start at 12.30pm from the Oikoumene yard in West St, before heading up Commercial Road and then continuing on its new route to the Riverside Reserve beside Helensville Museum in Mill Road.

Shops will be holding promotions in Helensville from 9.30am to 12.30pm, and at Parakai from 3pm to 4pm, where locals who spend \$20 or more will have a chance to win \$20 vouchers.

The traditional 'photo with Santa' gets a twist this year, with two sittings - from 9.30am to midday in Santa's Grotto at the RSA in Commercial Road, and in a classic convertible car at the museum from 1pm to 3pm. No family photographers or 'selfies' will be allowed.

A Christmas tree decorating competition will begin at the museum at 10am, with judging by public vote from 11.30am until 1pm. Winners will be announced at 2pm, followed by Santa's Countdown-sponsored lolly scramble.

There will be markets and entertainment at the Riverside Reserve from 1pm to 3pm, and a flyover by Fly West in association with Parakai Airfield will provide extra thrills.

From 3pm entry to Parakai Springs will be discounted to \$5 per person, with children under 5 free (discounted entry only via Springs Road). There will be entertainment from 3pm in the events arena including a DJ and jugglers The Bling Bros, followed by Carols in the Park presented by local churches.

Ritchies will provide a bus from the Caltex station in Helensville to Mill Rd at 1.30pm for just \$1; from Mill Rd to Parakai Springs at 3pm for \$1; and from Parakai back to Helensville at 8.30pm after the carols for \$2.

Public parking will be available in Mill Road from midday at the following commercial locations: Premier Panelbeaters; Placemakers; Helensville Glass; Helensville Plumbers; and Helensville Mechanical.

New owner, name for long-running local business

One of Helensville's longest-running businesses, Hayes Chainsaws and Mowers, has a new owner.

South African-born André van Zyl took over the Railway Street business, which Pat Hayes had run for more than 30 years, about six weeks ago. He will be renaming the business Helensville Mowers Ltd.

Coming from a rural area near Pietermaritzburg in South Africa, André began working in the mower business on his

18th birthday in 1998, taking charge of the machinery at his uncle's large-scale garden service business.

He also spent time supervising the work crew, which meant he became familiar with how the machinery was operated by the end-user, and spent a year in a mower shop to further his learning.

After moving to New Zealand André initially worked in road maintenanceincluding looking after State Highway 16 through Helensville. He spent the next six years working at Hauraki Mowers on the North Shore the

Mowers on the North Shore, then switched to Gardening Aids in 2009.

Four years earlier André qualified as a Briggs & Stratton master service technician, passing the five-hour exam with an 82 percent mark. That qualification has to be updated every year.

More recently he studied online at the Husqvarna University, gaining his gold service technician certificate.

André had been looking to purchase his own business for several years when the chance to take over Pat Hayes' came up; he already knew the business from his time working at Hauraki Mowers, which supplied the Helensville business with parts.

"I've always wanted to get into my own shop," he says.

As well as renaming the business, André plans to expand the offerings to include ride-

on mowers, and is also looking into on-site servicing.

He currently lives on the North Shore with his wife Tarryn, their six-year-old daughter and two sons, one a four year old and the other just a few months old.

However he's planning to move to the Helensville area, probably around the middle of next year.

"I grew up in the sticks in South Africa, and I like the idea of a more rural area."

Former Olympic and double world champion Blyth Tait won the premier class at the International CIC Horse Trial held at Woodhill Sands Equestrian Centre last month.

Blyth, riding Leo Distinction, was second after dressage, competing against 11 other combinations in the Fiber Fresh Feeds sponsored CIC Two Star event. He picked up four show jumping penalties but gained victory with a clear cross-country round and only 8.8 time faults.

Charlotte Grayling on NRM Lowenberg led the dressage on 39.5, but retired early in the cross-

country. That paved the way for former local Jock Paget to move into second place on Coleraine Coaltown. Third after dressage, Jock added just four show jump penalties and jumped clear on cross-country.

Helensville's Shelley Ross, Coleraine Coaltown's regular rider, was the show jumping course designer.

Students take on police challenge

A team of four Parakai School students competed in the Blue Light Norwest Zone Police Physical Competency Test challenge for Year 7 students late last month at the North Shore Events

Centre. Renee and David Povey, Tyrone Brown and Krystal Tuigamala had to complete a range of challenges such as pushing a trailer 10m, scaling a wall, carrying a 'body' (actually a stuffed dummy) and climbing through a window.

The course, designed to challenge their ability to handle common physical activities, was based on the police physical

competency test which all New Zealand police constables, sergeants and senior sergeants have to sit every two years.

Atrial fibrillation (AF) is a common abnormal heart rhythm, affecting one in every 100 people. Some of the causes are high blood pressure, damaged heart valves or muscle, over active thyroid, high amounts of alcohol or severe infection (such as pneumonia)

In AF, instead of a regular electrical signal passing through the heart muscle to trigger a contraction, multiple random signals fire off, which causes the top part of the heart (the atria) to quiver (fibrillate). This quivering means the heart muscle is less effective working as a pump, and if it is happening very fast, can reduce the flow of blood around the bodycausing palpitations; feeling out of breath, tired, or dizzy; and chest pain. Treatment is aimed at keeping the rate under control, or even converting

the signal back to a normal rhythm (sinus) by either medication or electrically (cardioversion). Also the muddled flow of the blood increases the risk of forming clots, which may travel to the brain (stroke) or lungs, and because of this we calculate a person's risk for stroke to determine what form of 'blood thinning' medication they should be on, from aspirin, to Warfarin or Dabigatran.

Caring for animals with special requirements

A Waitoki-based cattery and 'doggie homestay' is specialising in caring for elderly or very young pets, and those that have special needs or medication requirements.

Catz Pyjamas is run by veterinary nurse Bubbles Otway from the 40ha sheep and beef farm she and husband Colin Hawken live on in Valley Road.

She describes it as a "boutique" service, catering for a maximum of nine cats and six dogs at a time.

Originally from Tomorata, Bubbles says many catteries and kennels can't easily accommodate animals with

special requirements, or very young pets that have cats that need looking after. have yet to be vaccinated or desexed. Pets can be isolated if required.

"My 'guests' are treated as if they are my own pets," she says.

Bubbles has spent the last four years helping train vet nurses at Unitec, and before that worked in animal emergency and afterhours care on the North Shore.

The cats have a purpose-built accommodation block behind the house. while dogs are catered for with kennels and a large outdoor run area.

"For the active dog we have lots of farm walks and running free time."

Dog care is mostly for people that also

Bubbles says her big passion is animal rescue. She works closely with the Humane Society and also Auckland Council's Silverdale animal shelter, taking in homeless dogs.

Those animals are treated for fleas and worms, vaccinated and desexed, and then assessed to work out the best sort of family for them. They are then advertised on TradeMe, and a suitable home is chosen from applicants. The \$150 donation asked for doesn't even cover the Humane Society's costs, says Bubbles.

"I cannot speak highly enough of this organisation.

Annual youth summer camp

- 1 cinnamon stick
- Slice of orange peel
- 2 cups black grapes
- 2 cup cherries

Heat together in a pot the water, merlot, sugar, cinnamon stick and slice of orange peel, stir, bring to the boil and simmer for a couple of minutes. Add the grapes and cherries, cover and bring back to the boil, give it a bit of a shake to move the contents about and cook for about 1 minute. Take off the heat and strain the fruit retaining the liquid in the pot. Discard the cinnamon and peel. While the fruit cools return the pot to the stove, and over a medium heat, reduce the contents by half, or until it begins to thicken. Remove from the heat and fold the fruit back in. Chill until needed.

Sable Biscuits

- 140g unsalted butter, softened
- 100g white sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 2 cups (260g) all purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder - 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon mixed spice

Pre-heat oven to 170° celsius, grease baking trays and line with baking paper. Place them in the fridge.

Beat the butter, vanilla essence and sugar together until fluffy, add the egg and beat to combine.

In another bowl sift together the flour, mixed spice, baking powder and salt. Combine the dry ingredients and the butter mix loosely and turn out onto a floured board. Knead gently to combine. Wrap in plastic wrap and chill for 10 minutes in the fridge.

Flour the board and roll out the dough to about the thickness of a pencil. Cut out your shapes and lay on the chilled baking sheets until the tray is full then bake for about 15-20 minutes, cool on a rack.

To serve, layer the biscuits with a blob of cream, spoon in some fruit, drizzle the juice about and pop another sable on top dusted with icing sugar. Garnish with mint leaf and grated dark chocolate.

Christmas desserts

Here are a couple of my favourite alternatives to the standard Christmas pudding menu, much of which can be prepared ahead of time.

Sticky Date Pudding with Toffee Sauce

Pudding:

- 2 cups pitted dates
- 1/2 cup water
- 1 cup orange juice
- Zest of an orange
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 180g butter softened
- ³⁄₄ cup brown sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 2 cups standard flour or gluten free plain flour
- 2 teaspoons dried ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Set the oven to 150° celsius and line a greased cake tin with baking paper.

Put the water, zest and orange juice in a pot. Use kitchen scissors to snip each date into 3 pieces, add them to the pot and set on the stove at a medium heat. Stir and allow to come to the boil then remove from the heat. Sprinkle in the baking soda and stir into the hot fruit. It will foam up but that's ok. Allow to cool on the bench.

Beat together the softened butter and the brown sugar until light then add the eggs one at a time, beating as you go. Add the flour, ginger and salt to the butter mix and stir through. Add the warm fruit mix to the cake batter and combine. I stir with a rubber spatula to get all the bits off the bottom of the bowl and then tip into the lined cake tin. Bake for about an hour at 150° celsius.

Sauce:

- 1 cup cream
- 1 cup brown sugar

Put the cream and sugar in a thick bottomed pot. Heat on low stirring gently all the time, bring it to the boil and turn down to low. Stir until it is gently simmering then leave to cook for 3-5 minutes. Remove from heat and allow to cool. If you want it thicker then allow to cook for longer, reduce in volume and thicken. Stores well in the fridge, stir it together if it separates.

Serve with soft whipped cream, and garnish with thin sliced crystal ginger and mint leaves. Pudding stores well in the fridge, can be made as individuals in a muffin tin just adjust the cooking time.
