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A&P Show to commemorate start of First World War

The Helensville A&P Show on Saturday, February 22 will feature a special tribute to the First World War to mark the centenary of the start of the conflict.

Details of the commemoration were still in the planning stages as *Helensville News* went to print, but the Royal New Zealand Air Force band was confirmed, as was a Defence Force buglar, who will play the Last Post, and other Defence Force personnel.

The Show will be officially opened at around 10am by Prime Minister John Key, who is expected to give a First World Warthemed speech.

It was planned to have the Ode of Remembrance recited in both Maori and English by returned service personnel. Two minutes of silence will be observed following the Last Post. That will be followed by playing The Rouse, and then singing the National Anthem.

Local organisations such as the RSA, Scouts and Girl Guides were to be invited to participate.

The Helensville & District Historical Society will have a WWI-themed display on hand, and there will be a display of vintage military vehicles.

The show's commemoration will be part of a nationwide series of such events planned

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for the next four years, to remember the First World War, which ran from 1914 to 1918. Ten percent of New Zealand's then population of one million served overseas; more than 18,000 died and over 40,000 were wounded. Nearly every New Zealand family was affected.

Further changes are afoot at the A&P Show this year.

The main stage has been moved from its former location beside the race track to the grassed area off the end of the show office. That will help

separate the noise from announcers in the equestrian rings and that generated by acts on the stage, while providing a grassy, shadier and more attractive site for people enjoying the stage events.

Similarly, the large 'Relish the Taste' marquee is being relocated from that site to a new position at the north end of the trade displays.

Relish the Taste will this year feature cooking demonstrations by nationallyrecognised chef Annabel White and our own Peter Brennan,

Organisers are hoping to entice the Prime Minister to a barbeque steak cook-off.

For the second year a limited number of free trade stands have been offered to local community groups; the successful applicants this year are: South Kaipara Landcare; Helensville Lions; Peggy Purl; CAB Helensville; Parent Aid; and the McCosh Charitable Trust. Last month we reported how the A&P Show will be a zero-waste event for the first time this year, funded in part by a \$3000 grant from Auckland Council's Waste Minimisation Innovation Fund (WMIF).

As well as aiming for a waste-free event, the show will be smoke-free. These initiatives have been aided by the Auckland Council WMIF scheme and Rodney Local Board funding.

An informal survey on Facebook by show organisers found about 80 percent of locals

were in favour of the show being smoke-free. The organisers hope visitors to the show will follow the spirit of the event by refraining from smoking.

Course for small block holders

Mark Anderson of Helensville Vets will hold a six-week course for small block owners, starting next month.

The course will cover common animal health issues in sheep, cattle, calves, horses and pigs, along with worm control, animal handling, and the legal requirements associated with owning animals on a small block of land.

Classes will run for two hours, once a week for six weeks, with a field day at the end so participants can put some of the

theory they have learned into practice on a small block.

Participants will receive extensive written information and product samples to go with Mark's verbal and visual presentation. The course will be held in the meeting room at the Helensville Veterinary Clinic, and costs \$500 per person. Numbers are limited.

Mark says the courses were popular when held previously, but they haven't been held for several years.

Dave says he was honoured to have his truck chosen as one of the prestige indoor exhibits at the show, which featured vehicles from a number of other local people. The indoor exhibits are by invitation only, and Dave had to supply photographs of his truck to the show committee for approval.

Dave has owned his truck - the same as one that appears in the movie Forrest Gump - for about five years. It came from a ranch in Texas, near the Mexican border, and Dave says it was in "a very bad state. It was a real mess".

He completely dismantled the vehicle himself, then with the help of a number of mostly local craftsmen completely rebuilt it, including fitting a Ford Mustang 302 Boss V8 engine. Dave says his truck, which he drives regularly, is unusual in that it is fitted with a rare, longer-than-standard eight foot deck.

A member of the Kaipara Classic Car Club, which he was representing at the hotrod show, Dave also owned a 1956 Ford F100 pickup for 22 years, which was also chosen for indoor display at the Kumeu show 10 years ago. He sold that vehicle just last year.

Visitor numbers to the show were well down on last year, with around 30,000 people attending over the two days - 10,000 less than previously.

Art Centre planning busy 2014

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The Helensville Art Centre has been able to plan a packed year of subsidised exhibitions, classes and workshops after receiving all the grant money they asked for from Creative NZ.

Events will include '3 for All' exhibitions in March and August where locals can exhibit works for just \$3 per item for adults or \$1 for children. Art Kaipara will exhibit in April and September, while in May there will be a 'Fabric of Art' show with works produced using fabrics and fibres. In June will be a photographic exhibition called 'Reflections'.

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Farewell to Betty Wishart

Betty Dorothy Wishart November 1, 1914 – January 8, 2014

Betty was born at Marton in the Manawatu, the youngest child of Harry and Kate Merson, and shortly after the family moved to Raetihi where she spent her formative years with brothers Mac and Jack and sister Mollie.

Father Harry owned a sawmill in Raetihi, which was destroyed in the great forest fire of March 1918 – a fire rated as the most

destructive ever in New Zealand. One of Betty's earliest memories was of her and her siblings being roused from their beds, hurriedly dressed and rushed to the railway station, and hearing the continuous sound of the relief train whistle as it came down the smoke-filled line. They were billeted in Ohakune while Harry stayed behind, trying to salvage what he could and managing to save the family house.

After her father's death in 1920 the family moved to Auckland. Betty spent her secondary school years boarding at

Wanganui Girls College and after several menial jobs managed to get a position at George Courts in Karangahape Road. There she was a keen participant in all their staff sporting activities, especially marching, biking and swimming.

Betty was then accepted at New Plymouth Hospital for nurse training. After qualifying as a Registered Nurse in 1943 she transferred to Whangarei to train as a midwife.

On January 8, 1945 she married Alex Wishart who was managing the Bell Block for the Lands and Survey Department, preparing the land for subdividing into rehabilitation farms for returned servicemen. Alex himself was a returned serviceman, having been invalided home after being badly wounded in the battle at El Alamein.

The Wishart and Merson families had been friends before the war and one of Betty's friends, Joan, married her brother Mac who then settled in Helensville setting up an electrical business.

Alex and Betty were allocated one of the blocks of land adjacent to Old North Road, and developed an Angus cattle and Southdown sheep stud.

Sandy arrived safely but unfortunately the other baby did not survive. Alex died suddenly in December 1956 and Betty was left with four children and a farm to run. Fortunately there was a strong sense of community on the Bell Block farms with the farmers all being

was a strong sense of community on the Bell Block farms with the farmers all being returned servicemen and Betty received plenty of support. She remained on the farm until 1981, Doc Roy managing the property for the last 20 years.

Betty was never one to let the grass grow beneath her feet. She was active in many local organisations including the school committee, calf club, Helensville A&P Association, St. John, the Historical Society and Scouts, where she was the secretary from 1967 to 1973.

In the 1960s she provided board for pregnant unwed women for 'The • *To Page 5*



Roses Festival in early March

The Running of the Roses is no more instead, welcome the Lions Roses Festival.

Helensville Lions Club will hold its sixth annual fundraising event on Sunday 2 March, an event which after five years has been rebranded.

As in previous years it will take place at the Riverside Reserve in Mill Road, from 10am to 3pm.

Locals can enter the renamed 'Race of the Rose' by buying a \$5 raffle ticket, which will give them the chance to win one of seven major prizes: an overnight cruise in the Bay of Islands; one week's use of timeshare accommodation worldwide; four theatre tickets; a cruise to Riverhead; Tiffin Tea with champagne: six bottles of wine: and \$100 cash.

Tickets can be purchased from Lions Club members in Helensville, at the Helensville A&P Show on Saturday, February 22, or at the festival itself.

Unlike previous years, tickets will no longer come with a rose as that was found to have caused confusion in previous years, with some people thinking they had to be there in person to throw their rose into the river - or even swim with them!

Numbered roses corresponding to the raffle tickets will still be dropped into the river however, to 'race' downstream - this year that's expected to happen around 2.15pm. As in previous years, the first roses across the line will be the prize winners.

The rebranding comes with a new more family-friendly format for the day, with entertainment set to include Maypole dancing, live music and singing, food and craft stalls, numerous children's activities, a fancy dress competition and parade, and a Fun Run - more details of which will be released closer to the time.

Spot Prizes will be drawn at intervals throughout the day.

She was an enthusiastic member of the Motor Neurone Disease Association, Birthright New Zealand, and a long-time supporter of the Women's Division of the RSA, where she was made a life member in 1998 and became their patron.

Betty had many interests and was always busy with some type of handcraft; there weren't many that she hadn't tried. She was also an accomplished pianist and would while away afternoons at the piano.

However her real love was spending time fishing.

She joined the Auckland Lady Anglers Club in 1973 and rarely missed a trip out, especially on the Kaipara. She was happy fishing anywhere at any time, and took part in competitions all over the country with varying degrees of success. Ironically she rarely ate the fish she caught as most was given away to friends.

The parting accolade of a guard of honour given to Betty at her funeral by the members of the Auckland Lady Anglers Club was a fitting tribute to a great lady and fisherwoman.

Betty is survived by her four children, nine grandchildren, 15 great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren.



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Circus comes to town

Showing the moves that thrilled crowds in Helensville recently is 21-yearold circus performer Jaine Mieka (right).

Jaine was part of the troupe working for Circus Aotearoa which played four shows in the 'Big Top' at the Helensville showgrounds.

In her second year with the company, which tours the whole country and last performed in our town in 2010, Jaine is

an aerialist who performs group acrobatics including the hanging hoop, net and silks. Hula hoops are her solo act.

She loves touring with the Raglan-based circus, and as well as seeing the sights in the North Island she performed throughout the South Island as part of the 'Great Southern Tour'.

The troupe ends up in some far-flung places; a 2012 visit to Fox Glacier on the South Island's West Coast was the first circus visit there for more than 40 years.

Adult ADHD support group

Helensville's Men and Family Centre is to set up a support group for adults with ADHD (Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder), at the suggestion of counsellor Brett Lambert.

The group will be facilitated initially by Andrew Connolly.

"As a counsellor I often get asked if diagnoses like ADHD are helpful," says Brett, "or whether they make things worse by excusing the person's socially difficult behaviour. I usually reply that 'it depends'!"

He cites the case of a 58-year-old man who was diagnosed with ADHD just two years ago.

The man describes his entire life as "a struggle". When he was diagnosed he "felt a tremendous relief that I could finally put a name to this 'thing' that had caused so much

Circus Aotearoa, which has toured New Zealand from December to June

each year since 2008, is an animal-free circus providing a modern cross of traditional and theater based acts in a classic 'touring circus' format. It has put on more than 800 90-minute performances in the 554sq.m. Big Top, which can seat 240.

A typical line up of acts includes various aerial performances, juggling, unicycles, contortionists, hula hoops, swinging and static trapeze, clowns, foot juggling and manipulation, chair stacking and balancing, acrobats, magic, and slack rope walking.

Big lineup for this year's A&P Show

Visitors to this month's 112th annual Helensville A&P Show will notice a few changes around the grounds, with two of the most popular show highlights - the main entertainment stage and the Relish the Taste food marquee - both moving to new homes.

The stage, which will again feature music from popular band The Groove Diggers, has been moved to the former Relish the Taste site while the Relish marquee moves to the main trade area.

An added bonus at Relish the Taste this year will be cooking demonstrations by top New Zealand chef Annabel White, along with those by

Helensville's own Peter Brennan. Being a true agricultural and pastoral

show, the 2014 Helensville Show will do what it does best - highlight the farming aspect of our community through displays and competitions of animals, including cattle, sheep, miniature donkeys, horses, poultry and working dogs. Many of the trade stands will be farming-themed, plus there will again be a Junior Farmer competition for local school children.

The show will also host the Northern District Young Farmer competition.

The Zipline Flying Fox returns as a highlight of the Cookie Bear Roadshow, which will again feature a wide range of rides,

mostly for school-aged children.

One of the biggest crowd-pleasers from the past three shows was the 'Grand Sheeplechase' sheep racing by Sheep 'n' Show, which returns but in a new location around the side of the racetrack nearest Railway Street. They will also be demonstrating sheep shearing.

Also returning will be the popular 'Water Walkers' Zorbs.

After an absence last year the crowdpleasing vintage military vehicles will be back on display as part of the show's First World War tribute. They'll be joined by a display of shiny MG sports cars.

The youngest visitors to the show will be pleased to see the return of the McDonald's Travelling Farmyard, where they will be able to touch and feed sheep, pigs and goats. Carmel's face painting will see them decked out in all sorts of colourful designs.

Clydesdale-drawn carriage rides will give show visitors a good look around the grounds, and Helensville Pony Club will have pony rides for the children.

Woodhopping is one of the show's most popular spectator sports, and the North Harbour Axemen will be in action again this year. Other returning regular competitions include highland dancing and sheepdog trials.

Other regular features will include

demonstrations by Brightside Spinners, and the River Valley Amateur Winemakers & Brewers Guild which this year will be celebrating its 30th anniversary and 29th year at the show.

As usual there will be free tractor rides from the public carpark, accessed through Stewart Street, and an EFTPOS cash out facility will be available at the show office.

Entry to the show is by cash only -EFTPOS will not be available at the gate. Entry: adults \$10, school children \$5, preschoolers free, family pass (two adults and up to four children) \$25.

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From Parakai to Copenhagen

Young Helensville woman Courtney Addison is proof that growing up in a small town and attending local schools needn't stop you achieving your goals.

23-year-old Courtney has just been awarded a three-year PhD fellowship to the University of Copenhagen in Denmark, where she will carry out research into gene therapy for the university's Department of Food and Resource Economics.

Courtney, eldest daughter of *Helensville News* editor Dave Addison, grew up on the family farm in Fordyce Road, Parakai, attending Sunny Days Early Learning Centre, Parakai School and Kaipara College.

After leaving college she enrolled in Unitec's sports science degree course, but after only two weeks made a judgement call that was not for her.

She switched to the University of Auckland instead, completing a Bachelor of Arts degree in 2011. The next year she graduated with an Honours degree, and in 2013 completed her Master of Arts in medical anthropology, researching and writing a thesis on Chronic Fatigue Syndrome.

During the course of that study last year she attended a major international anthropology conference in Barcelona, Spain, where she presented a paper on her research.

Courtney was short-listed for the PhD

fellowship in November last year, and offered the position in

December. She leaves for Denmark in early March.

As part of her research project she will be expected to spend six months at another university in a different country, at this stage undecided.

While obviously excited at the prospect of travel and living in Denmark, Courtney says she will miss her home, farm and horses.

At this stage she says it is too early to say what she will do once she has graduated with her PhD.

Māori Medium Unit opens this year at Tau Te Arohanoa Akoranga

Tau Te Arohanoa Akoranga, the satellite campus of KingsWay School based in Awaroa Road, is opening a Māori Medium Immersion Unit this year.

"It has long been the vision of staff and whanau to provide a learning environment where those who wish to reach fluency in Te Reo Māori me ona tikanga have the opportunity to do so," says Principal Jan Porter.

Several students enrolled at the end of last year following the closure of Te Whare Kakano, the Māori Medium Unit at Parakai School, wanting to continue learning in an environment where Te Reo Māori was an option.

"We were also approached by Te Kahuiti Morehu of Ngati Whatua o Kaipara to see if we would be interested in having a Māori Medium Immersion Unit in our kura," says Jan.

"With our special character being bilingual education, it was something we had been seeking to develop for some time."

Groundwork for an immersion class had been going on for a number of years. Whaea Huria Koroi worked with the school from 2005 to 2009, teaching the staff and students Te Reo Māori me ona tikanga (Māori language and culture).

With the school roll growing, the support of KingsWay School and having a teacher able to teach a Māori Medium Immersion class, Jan says Tau Te Arohanoa Akoranga is "excited to be able to offer this to our community this year".

Matua Regan Taia will be the kaiako (teacher) for the class.

Last year the school completed a three-year professional development programme called He Kakano through Waikato University and Te Wharewananga o Awanuiarangi which saw it gain insight towards raising the academic success of Māori students as Māori.

Lots of changes at Palm Springs

Locals who haven't been to Palm Springs Thermal Pools at Parakai recently would be surprised at the changes there.

Two major developments have been introduced recently and are proving a hit with visitors to the pools.

Most noticeable is a new garden pool area, where swimmers can relax in a serpentine-shaped rock pool with waterfalls and surrounded by lush native bush.

The area around this pool has been carefully landscaped to provide a relaxing setting, and the whole area is screened off from the main pool complex.

Michaella Lee, who has managed Palm Springs for 10 years, says: "People love the environment with the plants and waterfalls."

The other new feature is a special shallow baby pool for the littlest swimmers. Parents can sit in the shallow water to keep an eye on their children as they play in the pool and jump around the fountain.

The main outdoor pools have been cleaned and tidied up with new tiles, plaster and paint so everything is fresh for the new vear. savs Michaella.

She is keen to stress the health benefits of the natural mineral water at Palm Springs.

The geothermal water at Parakai has been used for therapeutic purposes for around 150 years, and she points out the healing properties of the hot natural mineral waters are still widely recognised by doctors, physiotherapists and other health professionals, who couple them with proper exercise to aid rehabilitation from sport injuries among other ailments.

While the thermal water at Parakai can reach over 65°C, it is cooled and filtered before entering the pools. One of the large outdoor pools and the three outdoor spas run at about 40°C which is considered ideal for relaxing in, while the other big pool is kept at 34°C, suitable for exercise or water dames.

Hunt dogs go on show in Helensville

Locals will have the chance to see as many as 60 hunt hounds being judged at the Northern Region Hound Show at the Helensville Showgrounds on Saturday, February 15. The show will be open to the public at no charge.

The Hound Show is being hosted by the Waitemata Hunt, which has been part of the equine community in North West Auckland for more than 65 years. Waitemata Hunt was asked to host the event by the New Zealand Hunts Association, says Waitemata joint hunt master, Charlotte Porter.

The Hound Show will involve dogs from up to 10 hunts in the northern region, with judging of the 50 to 60 hounds starting at 11am. They will be judged by Barry Beatson, a former president of the NZ Hunts Association and former master of the Dannevirke Hunt.

Hounds are judged on specific criteria for hunting harrier hounds, with 12 classes for the hounds and a special horn blowing class for huntsmen.

It will be the annual show for the northern region. Winners will not go on to compete at national level as the national competition is only held every other year.



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Gold medal win for KKK snowboarder in leadup to Winter Olympics

Snowboarder Christy Prior of Kaukapakapa (right) has won the gold medal at the last qualifying event before the Winter Olympics, which start in Sochi, Russia this week.

The snowboard slopestyle win in Stoneham, Canada on January 18 was 25-year-old Christy's first five-star World Cup win and puts her in a strong position heading into the Olympics.

Christy, picked as one of New Zealand's best chances for a medal at the games, won the International Ski Federation (FIS) World Cup event in a snow storm, taking a convincing win with a score of 89.75 ahead of Dutch rider Cheryl Maas in second with 85.25 and Austrian Anna Gasser in third with 84.25. She had placed second in her qualifying heat which allowed her to leap frog the semifinals competition and go straight into finals.

She describes herself as "relieved and really thankful" to have achieved such a good result. Winter Performance Programme Director Ashley Light says: "this result indicates that Christy is now starting to fulfil her true potential."

The win makes her only the second snowboarder from New Zealand to win a World Cup event.

Currently ranked seventh in the world for women's snowboard slopestyle, Christy gained a series of podium placings during the 2012 and 2013 seasons including second place at the TTR 5-star Super Girl Pro, first at the Czech World Cup Big Air, second at the Burton High Fives TTR 5-



star, first at the Billabong Bro Down TTR 4-star, and first at the US Open Rail Jam. She was awarded the 'Ms Superpark Standout Award' for 2013.

Christy says that she is both honoured and humbled to be representing New Zealand at the Winter Olympics, and is excited and nervous in equal parts.

Split courgettes down the middle and run a spoon down them to scoop out any seed parts and to create a trench. Lay them in your dish, skin side down and sprinkle liberally with some cooking oil, salt and pepper and bake for 15 minutes @ 180 degrees.

Meanwhile, make the sauce. Put the diced onion, garlic, and oil into a pot and cook gently for a couple of minutes. Add the vinegar and sugar, then the water and tomatoes. Cook for 15 minutes then add the chopped fresh herbs, salt and pepper and take off the heat.

In a bowl combine the mince, onion, garlic, chillies, sunflower seeds/peanuts, spices, breadcrumbs, salt and pepper. Mix together with your hands until throughly combined.

Remove the courgettes from the oven. Once cooled enough to handle, fill the trench of each courgette and mould extra stuffing to reform the shape of a whole courgette. Place them back in the dish, skin side down and surround with tomato sauce. Bake at 180 for another thirty minutes. Baste a couple of times during cooking by spooning the sauce over the courgettes.

After 30 minutes remove from the oven and cover with a light layer of grated cheese, sprinkle on a few breadcrumbs and return to the oven for another 15-20 minutes.

Getting inventive with courgettes

Courgettes: it always seems like a good idea at the beginning of the season to get a few courgettes underway. Trouble is at some stage they all start producing and you are collecting too many. The family only like so much of one thing so I have had to get inventive.

A simple fresh pickle that keeps for at least a week in the fridge

- 2x small to medium courgette
- 2x carrots
- 1x medium beetroot
- knob of fresh ginger
- salt and pepper
- 1/2 cup cider

Grate all the vegetables into a bowl. Heat the vinegar and melt the honey in it. No need to boil it. Once combined tip onto the grated vegetables, season with salt and pepper. I usually do this in the afternoon if we are eating it that night. You will end up with more juice after a few hours, just tip it all into a jar and keep it in the fridge for a week or more.

Another simple but easy thing to do with courgettes is to cut them into strips and lay on a tray, sprinkle with salt and pepper, smear on pesto and cover with sliced or grated parmesan. Bake in a hot oven until cheese is coloured and bubbling. Eat them straight away. If you have a couple of larger specimens this is a great way to use them up.

Courgettes any size. Enough courgette that when cut in half lengthwise they make a single layer in an oven dish.

Sauce

- 500g x fresh or canned tomatoes, crushed to pulp.
- Enough water to make a sauce. (about 1/2 cup, add more if needed.)
- -1 x medium onion diced
- 3 x cloves garlic chopped
- 1 tablespoon of cooking oil
- 1/2 x cup chopped basil or oregano or both.
- Tablespoon of vinegar
- Tablespoon of brown sugar
- Salt and pepper

Courgette stuffing

- 300g x mince lamb or pork
- -3x cloves garlic chopped
- -1 x medium onion diced
- 2-3 fresh chillies
- 1/2 cup sunflower seeds or chopped peanuts
- Heaped teaspoon paprika (smoked if you have it)
- 1/4 teaspoon of 5 spice, or cinnamon
- 1/2 cup bread crumbs
- Salt and pepper
