'Repair Shed' aims to counter throwaway culture

"Give it a go before you throw" is the call to action from the Helensville Resource and Recovery Centre, which is embarking on an exciting new venture.

Work starts this month on The Repair Shed, which will be built at the centre's Mill Road site.

When it opens early next month The Repair Shed will offer the tools and expertise to enable locals to breathe new life into broken or worn items such as clothing, bicycles, furniture, shoes and electrical goods.

The philosophy is 'repair don't replace', with the aim to reduce waste going into landfill and to counter the throwaway culture of today.

The Repair Shed is modelled on the successful European Repair Café, which has been operating throughout Europe for a number of years and which recently started up in Australia.

A community facility, The Repair Shed will be equipped with a range of tools and staffed by a team of volunteers with expertise and qualifications in repair work. Locals will pay a gold coin donation to use the tools and repair their items under the supervision of one of The Repair Shed experts.

Any new parts needed for a repair will be at a cost to the customer, but the labour will be free, with locals taught how to do the repair themselves.

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Over time a bank of spare parts will accumulate meaning some parts will be available second hand, further reducing the repair costs. It is anticipated repairs will be cheaper than replacement in most cases.

Workshops on bicycle repair, furniture recovering, and re-purposing of broken items are also planned, along with youth training programmes.

The Helensville Resource and Recovery

Centre has the Rodney Local Board to thank for supporting the initiative and funding the setting-up of The Repair Shed.

It is expected retired local people who have skills and expertise to share with the community will be attracted to the project. Repair Cafes in Europe have proven to be vibrant, enriching hubs where all tiers of the community work alongside each other, sharing skills and knowledge.

Rodney Local Board chair Brenda Steele says the board is extremely pleased to support the community initiative.

"It's a fantastic idea on so many levels. I'm really excited to see how this grows and develops. We have so many talented people in our community with the valuable know-how and generosity of character to make this a real success," says Brenda.

"I know there are those who will get a real buzz out of helping others to learn new skills and breathe new life and value into items which would otherwise be discarded.

"I think this will appeal to

Helensville residents, especially the older ones who grew up at a time when things were made to last and were not thrown out unless they could not be fixed or reused somehow.

"This initiative has enormous potential."

Wainui School students become apprentices

Two students from Wainui School got some valuable work experience from a local building company, becoming apprentices to help build new stairs for the school hall.

The work was courtesy of parent Paul Minton, who owns building company Mint Trades. Paul came up with the idea to hire apprentices from the school for the project.

The students had to apply for the apprentice positions with a CV outlining their suitability for the job. The two standout applications were from Matt Vastre and Max Rensen, both year 8 students.

In his CV Matt said: "I think this will be a great experience because I love to build and make things with my dad who is a master craftsman, and it will help me at what I really want to do later in life which is what my dad does".

Max stood out saying: "I would like to be a builder when I grow up, and I would value this experience a lot. I can use a hammer safely and I am good at listening and following instructions".

The boys weren't paid for their work, but then the whole job was provided free of charge by Mint Trades.

"The boys were keen and eager to get into the job," says Paul. "They had great listening skills and surprised me with their practical knowledge. I would love to work with them in 10 years' time!"

Wainui School principal Gillian Bray says: "Matt and Max really enjoyed learning new building skills with Paul."

She described the apprenticeship project as a "wonderful authentic learning opportunity".

Island life big influence on new principal

With his wife Janine a teacher and sports co-ordinator at 'rival' Parakai School, new Waitoki School principal Brendon Fiebig joked to his students when he arrived that they had to beat Parakai at sports.

Brendon is a keen sportsman, who played and umpired cricket until recently as

well as having played both rugby and football.

However, while he concedes local schools do compete for student enrolments, he firmly believes they all have the same goal in mind and should work closely together.

Born in Wellington, Brendon moved in 1970 at age two to Fiji, where his father managed an engineering company. He spent nine years there, a period which "strongly influenced my outlook on life".

Brendon's working life didn't begin with teaching - instead he worked in banking, a job he says didn't fulfil a need in him.

"I always wanted to be a teacher, but put it off for a number of reasons."

At age 30 he quit banking and went to university to gain a BA in education and sociology, before going to teacher training college at Karori.

His first teaching role was at Stanley Bay School in Devonport. He then became principal at a 25-student school at Gisborne, before moving back to the North Shore in 2009 to take on the deputy principal position at Birkenhead Primary.

Then the opportunity came up "for a bit of a change and to get back to the islands" - an opportunity which meant a move to Rarotonga, where Brendon spent two years working for the Ministry of Education, primarily providing professional development to teachers and principals, while Janine taught there.

After returning to New Zealand, Janine, who was a navy-trained, qualified chef before moving into teaching, got work at Northcote Primary while Brendon became principal at Tapora School on the north Kaipara.

With such geographically wide-spread

jobs, the couple decided they needed to live somewhere central, so moved in February 2013 to Helensville.

Janine has since taken on her current Year 2 and 3 teaching job at Parakai School, where son George (6) goes. Daughter Milly turns five this month.

When the chance came for Brendon to take over the principal's role at decile 8 Waitoki this term he jumped at it.

"I consider myself extremely lucky," says Brendon. "The staff, parents, board and I are on the same wavelength regarding teaching philosophy. The community has been very welcoming and open. The staff are very friendly and very experienced, and know the parents and community.

"The children are advancing well and getting a great education - which makes my job a lot easier!"

Brendon says technology will continue to play a bigger part in education, particularly in the senior classes. The focus will be on how technology can help education, and he stresses that teaching and learning practices have to be strong.

He also sees education moving more towards enquiry-based learning and problem solving, where children "learn how to learn, rather than what to learn".

Brendon says arts are also a strong focus at Waitoki. He "dabbles" with guitar and ukelele, and has become a student at the school himself, taking drum lessons there.

Spending 30 to 40 hours making and decorating a cake into a scale replica of an excavator paid off for Kaukapakapa's Sandy Tucker she won third prize with it in the first competition she entered.

But even better than that, her beautiful likeness of a red-eyed tree frog, which she only decided to enter at the last minute, did even better - taking out first place in the same intermediate novelty carved cake class at the Go Bake Cake Competition, part of the New Zealand Scrapbooking, Craft and Cake Expo.

4.30 Show. The digger, made from a mixture of hazlenut and chocolate cake, MDF and home-made modelling chocolate, was designed using the machine's original blueprints, and every detail is to scale.

Her success is even more spectacular as Sandy has only been decorating cakes for two years.

Sandy was born in Scotland but raised in Botswana in Africa from the age of one, then attended boarding school in South Africa. She moved with her family to New Zealand 16 years ago, finishing her last year of education at Long Bay College in Auckland.

Her husband Chris, an electronics engineer, is from Tapora, and the couple moved onto their 27ha d r y s t o c k f a r m a t Kaukapakapa mid-2006, where they live with sons Alex (4) and Scott (2).

They spent a whole year travelling the world before the children were born - it was in Costa Rica that Sandy fell in love with the r e a I - I i f e counterpart of her tree frog. Sandy says

a power systems engineer - she used to design electricity substations - is a help when it comes to creating the structures to support her cakes.

Sandy has taken a number of professional decorating classes, but says the hobby has a "heavy learning curve - you have to keep learning new stuff."

While she bills herself as 'The Cake Engineer NZ', at this stage she only makes her creations for friends and family. However she has thought about turning her hobby into a business.

"That will depend on whether I can make money at it," she smiles.

Her 'amateur' portfolio is impressive, with cakes shaped like castles, tractors, Wonder Woman, Minnie Mouse, Darth Vader, Angry Birds, a motorcycle, a wet t-shirt and even a gothic engagement cake. So what happens to the cakes? Mostly, they get eaten.

About 30 people gathered at Peacemakers in Parakai recently to witness the blessing of native plants for the new rongoā educational landscape there.

A trailer laden with native plants, all with rongoā properties, was blessed by kaumātua Ben Hita, who accompanied the plants from Te Hana. Ben introduced himself and the plants and spoke of his desire for them to flourish in their new home. Haranui kaumātua Wata Richards welcomed the plants and his fellow kaumātua.

The plants were blessed with prayer and sacred water, before the small crowd followed the kaumātua through the embryonic gardens, where they blessed the land and recently planted trees as they went.

Donna Kerridge and Treena Gowthorpe, who designed the landscaped area, explained the intention behind the design of the Peacemakers rongoā educational landscape.

Rongoā are plants used in traditional Māori healing, and Andrew Connolly from Peacemakers says: "it's about holistic integration of mind, body and spirit."

In the past few weeks both Parakai and Helensville townships have been the target of graffiti vandalism. Areas targeted have been several street signs, buildings, a bus stop, and throughout Helensville Primary School.

Auckland Council has a fantastic team of people who quickly remove this eyesore from our streets and community spaces, usually within 24 hours of being notified. Please report all graffiti vandalism to Auckland Council on 09 301 0101 and provide them with the following information: the exact location of graffiti; a description and size of the graffiti; and the type of surface the graffiti is on.

Graffiti vandalism may seem minor, but it's an issue that can have a huge impact on those living within the community. Graffiti vandalism can lower property values, can encourage further criminal offending, and often makes a community appear unsafe to live in.

Rapid identification and removal of graffiti has been shown to reduce its occurrence. As a community we need to have a zero tolerance approach to the defacing of both public and private property. Don't just assume that someone else has reported it to either Auckland Council or the Police. We would prefer to hear about the same incident more than once rather than have the graffiti visible for long periods of time.

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Former pharmacist passes away

GERALD NEIL MUNRO, 1934-2014

Active community worker, local pharmacist and family man, Gerald Munro died recently aged 80.

Gerald and his wife Shirley came to Helensville from Wellington and Hawkes Bay in the late 1950s to run the pharmacy in Helensville. They lived here for 35 years before moving to the

Hibiscus Coast.

Gerald was born in Hastings in 1934, and educated at Hastings Boys High School, where he played in the 1st XV rugby team - a sport he actively supported for the rest of his life with his sons and grandsons.

Gerald trained as a pharmacist in Hastings, and after their marriage, Gerald and Shirley moved to Wellington, and later to Helensville where they brought up their family of two sons and a daughter.

As well as running his pharmacy business, Gerald, with the support of Shirley, took roles in a number of local, national and international organisations - principally the Lions Club and pharmacy associations.

Gerald joined the Lions Club of Helensville as a charter member in 1962, and became president in 1963. Over the following years he held other roles in the Helensville club and went on to serve at regional and national level. He was District Governor of the Northern Region 202G from 1987 to 1988 (north of the harbour bridge), where he was held in high regard.

He was a member of the Helensville club for 38 years, before transferring to Orewa Lions in 1993. He retired in 2010, after serving with Lions for 48 years. In recognition of his loyalty and achievement in Lions, Gerald was awarded the prestigious international Melvin Jones Fellowship.

Gerald served on the Helensville Borough Council from 1965 to 1983. One particular project he and the Lions Club worked on was the expansion of the Helensville Library - which was moved from a room in the Council chambers to a separate building next door.

Another major project Gerald was involved in, also with the Lions Club, was fundraising for, and establishing an ambulance service and station for Helensville, in the late 1960s.

The Helensville Players, active in the

district from 1965 for a number of years, also had the backing of the Lions Club, and both Gerald and Shirley took an active role in productions particularly 'The Lisbon Story' where Lions did all the publicity and front of house arrangement, and Gerald's pharmacy worked as make-up artists. The Lions won the Ron Usmar Award for this project.

Serving on the Kaipara College Board of Governors was another of Gerald's local commitments.

Gerald's family recall the family holidays they enjoyed together; Gerald's generosity

in the use of the family car; his passion for sport; going with him on Lion's working bees and helping in the pharmacy stock-takes; his support of their further education; and, as time went on, his involvement with their families and the lives of his grandchildren.

From their earliest years in Helensville, Gerald and Shirley holidayed on the Hibiscus Coast - initially at Red Beach Motor Camp, and later at Arkles Bay. When they retired from Helensville they lived in their Arkles Bay home, later moving to the Peninsula Club in Stanmore Bay.

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Helensville gets WWI Heritage Trail sign

Helensville is to be part of Auckland Council's Auckland First World War Heritage Trail, with the town to get one of more than 70 signs that will be located around the Auckland region - most in central Auckland but spread from Wellsford in the north to Waiuku in the south.

Ours will be located at the Helensville railway station, and unlike most of the signs being erected for the commemorative project, it will be among a handful of permanent ones.

The Auckland First World War Heritage Trail will acknowledge sites throughout the region with relevance to the 1914-1919 period. More than 70 sites, covering six themes, have been identified as having relevance to Auckland during the First World War. The six themes are: Going to War; Training, Administration and Defence; The Economic War Effort; The Home Front; Opposition to the War and Enemy Aliens; and Rehabilitation and Remembrance.

The Helensville sign will be double sided, measuring 900mm x 600mm and mounted between aluminium posts.

One side will cover the 'Going to War' theme, with text and images based around the Helensville railway station and the Kaipara Line, and their role in the war.

The other side will feature the 'Home Front' theme and cover Helensville's war fund raising efforts, particularly through the Helensville and Parakai branches of the

Auckland Women's Patriot League.

The signs will feature QR codes which can be scanned by smart phones to get more information from the internet.

Quick and easy fritters

Perhaps the quickest way to cook food is to fry it.

With a hot pan and a layer of oil things are browned, crisped and heated through relatively quickly and ready to eat with a side of salad or some simple steamed vegetables, within a few minutes.

As I have said in previous columns, in my house there is a gluten free person and a vegetarian, while I will consume just about anything. It is a pain to prepare different meals for each taste so when we find something that we all enjoy it stays in the family recipe book. These fritters are a winner with us all.

They also work very well if you want a meat version - just substitute 200g of minced pork or lamb for the chickpeas.

It is possible to use canned chickpeas when making these fritters, however don't use the liquid from the can, just use plain water. Be careful when you process the canned chickpeas as they will turn to puree very quickly and you may require more flour to bind the mix.

Fritters, vegetarian version

- 1 cup chickpeas, soaked for 2 hours in cold water
- 3 cups cold water for cooking
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 cup roasted almonds or roasted peanuts
- 1 diced onion
- 6 garlic crushed
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1 teaspoon 5 spice
- 2 chopped chillies
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh coriander - 1/4 cup chopped mint
- Salt
- 1 cup gluten free flour or plain wheat flour.

Soak the chickpeas in cold water for a couple of hours, or set them to soak in the morning before work.

Drain the chickpeas and place in a pot with the 3 cups of water and the bay leaf. Bring to the boil and simmer for 20 minutes, take off the heat and set aside.

Use a food processor to pulse the nuts to a rough chopped stage and place in a bowl. Dice the onion and add with the garlic to the nuts along with the paprika, Chinese 5 spice, chopped chilli, ground cumin and the chopped fresh herbs.

Drain the chickpeas and retain the cooking liquid; discard the bay leaf. Pulse the drained chic peas to a rough chopped stage and add to the nut mix. Add the flour and a good pinch of salt and mix together.

Add sufficient cooking liquid from the chick peas and using your hands mix all together until a dough forms. Shape into small fritters and then fry them in shallow oil, turning a couple of times until evenly browned.
