Major extensions at Parakai church

Work has just begun on a three-quarter million dollar extension to the River Valley Baptist Church on the corner of Parkhurst and Fordyce Roads in Parakai.

The new building has been in the planning stages since July 2012, and local builder Paul Nasmith is expected to have it to lock-up stage by early November.

Then, members of the congregation will do as much of the finishing work as they can themselves, with the aim of having the building finished within six months.

"It's taken a huge amount of time to get resource consent," says building committee chair Shirley Wood. "Under the new unitary plan it hasn't been easy."

The extension will include a new main meeting room capable eventually of seating 200 people, although with a congregation of around 50 it won't be needed in its entirety to start with.

Instead, it will be divided up with permanent-looking but temporary walls to create extra room for a creche and a children's ministry room.

Also included in the extension will be a new entrance foyer, office, storage rooms and a toilet block. The existing meeting room will be repurposed as a multi-use space.

River Valley Baptist Church was formed in January 2001 with a congregation of just 16, which met in a resource room at Parakai School.

The church bought its current property at

the bottom of Fordyce Road in late 2006, and has already altered the building three times since

Shirley says the latest extension will largely match the existing building in terms of style, although it will have an iron roof.

"It will look like it belongs in Parakai."

"It's a Parakai building, and we hope it will be used by the community," she says. Church members have met with Imelda King at Te Whare Oranga o Parakai to make sure its use doesn't clash with that facility.

Locals feature in kids book

A new children's book by Helensville author and artist Ann Keane features local people and local scenery.

Readers of 'Let's Catch that Rainbow!' will recognise names such as Stokes, Bodle and Hayes - no first names are used - and the beautifully painted scenes are almost all views from Rimmer Road looking towards Helensville.

The main protagonist in the book is a boy called Hadleigh, which is Ann's youngest son's name. In fact the story is based on a tale Hadleigh, now almost 29, made up when he saw a rainbow while being driven to Hobsonville Kindergarten as a four or five year old.

"When we got home that night I wrote down what he had said. We actually made the rainbow cake [which appears in the book]", says Ann.

While the story is based on a real incident, Ann says she has "embroidered a few bits".

She says all the characters in the book are based on real locals.

"They've all known since Hadleigh was four or five that I had the story, but I don't think they thought it would ever happen."

Ann, a former kindergarten teacher and accomplished artist, has written more than 30 children's stories, but this is the first one published. The illustrations, in watercolour and ink, took her nine months, working about five hours a day.

She now has three more books

being planned (one also set locally), and has only just been able to start work on them after seriously injuring her hand in a car accident. She has had physiotherapy for a year, and has only recently regained the ability to grip a pen or paintbrush.

She says it was "awful" not being able to paint for a year. "I had all these other stories I wanted to get on with."

Originally from Wairoa in Hawkes Bay, Ann started teaching in her home town after graduating from teacher training college in Wellington. She then moved to Oratia Kindergarten in West Auckland, and met husband Rex, now a real estate agent with Burmester Realty in Helensville, while flatting in Henderson in 1981. She spent the last 12 years of her kindergarten career at Hobsonville Kindergarten, 'retiring' three years ago.

"I wanted to get into the garden and paint really [but] I didn't do any of that - I just wrote and wrote lots of stories."

Ann lived for five years at Whenuapai before moving to a house at the top of Rimmer Road - a house readers may recognise in one of the book's illustrations before moving to her present home on a farm in Kiwitahi Road.

Helensville loses popular entertainer

Graeme Ronald McCardle 5-11-1948 - 2-7-2015

Graeme McCardle was born in Helensville in November 1948 to parents Edna and Ronald. He was the second of three children, with an older sister, Lois, and a younger brother, Allan.

As a child Graeme loved playing rugby and tennis.

He attended Helensville Primary School, where he was known for never wearing shoes. He'd hide them near the gate as he left his house in the morning, and then put them back on again when he returned home.

He met Linda Leathart, who years later became his wife, when they shared a Form 2 class at school.

Graeme then went to Kaipara College where he 'specialised' in socialising and enjoying time with his friends - although he also managed to find time to play in the school's First XV rugby team.

He left school at 16, undertaking a mechanics' apprenticeship at McLeod Motors, and spending weekends helping his father with the family carrier business, where a love for trucking was born. After he qualified as a mechanic he worked fulltime for the family business, J. Hunter and Co, driving stock trucks.

During Graeme's

teenage years, he joined the Helensville Players theatrical group, performing at the local young farmers' dance and the Fire Brigade ball, the beginning of a lifelong passion for entertainment.

In 1969 Graeme's friend Mike was dating Rosemary, who was at nursing college in Auckland. Mike didn't have a car, and needing to get to Auckland to see her asked Graeme if he would like to come on a double date and to provide the transport. Rosemary's double date friend turned out to be Graeme's old classmate, Linda.

Although Graeme and Linda had met again, it appears Linda was not that impressed; Graeme had to resort to ringing her mother to get her help to organise dates.

Linda was also training as a nurse, and Graeme would often turn up at the hospital in his smelly stock truck and clothes. That didn't put Linda off, and they were married in 1970 and moved in to Gow St in Helensville.

Graeme was a very regular visitor to the local dentist, and he was left with just 12 teeth for his wedding day - six on the top and six on the bottom, just enough for a decent wedding photo smile.

After his wedding, he had the remaining 12 teeth removed and replaced by dentures, a feature which meant Graeme was able to

periodically change his look with different sets of false teeth – as evidenced by his music CD covers.

Graeme and Linda had three children, Martin in 1971, Simon in 1973 and Kelly in 1978.

In 1980 Graeme went to work in Woodhill Forest, a job that would last for 20 years and forge some special friendships and traditions. One of those centred around Friday nights after a hard week at work. It started with a cold beer at the Grand Hotel and then home to the McCardle house for fish and chips - and on more than a few occasions Graeme had to bear

Linda's wrath for being a 'tad' late back from the pub.

About the same time as Graeme entered the forestry game, he was asked to join a local band, The Freightliners. Despite some changes in the band personnel, they stayed together for 25 years, playing gigs all around the North Island.

In 1985 Graeme was asked by Alan Hargreaves and Malcolm Smith to help set up a local country music club - the Helensville River Valley Country Music • To page 5

Later in his working life Graeme owned his own coach, contracting to different companies and making trips all around New Zealand. He loved this work, especially the opportunity it gave him to entertain tourists with his own particular brand of humour, wit and exaggerated anecdotes.

He combined his passion for coach driving with his love of music by regularly serenading passengers. He also made regular visits to Parakai rest home Craigweil House, where he would entertain the residents with songs and humour.

Graeme's family made annual camping pilgrimages to Matamata Opal Springs, an almost 30-year tradition, and he would encourage as many members of his family as possible to join the 'camping fun'. What he loved most was everyone sitting around in the evenings sharing stories, singing songs and enjoying each other's company.

Graeme also became the 'Games Master' at the annual Shelly Beach Boxing Day community sports day, where he set up and refereed games.

Graeme battled cancer for his last 10 years, never giving up. He set up team Tickety-Boo, which participated in the two most recent Relays for Life, a Cancer Society event. Showing great courage, in March of this year he hobbled around on crutches to show support for other cancer sufferers and their friends and families.

Dizziness is a frequent issue brought up in consultations.

There are two main types of dizziness. The first is a light headed sensation, like the your head is going to float away. This is often due to low blood pressure, and you can experience this for a few seconds if you stand up quickly after lying down for a while, and is more noticeable if your blood pressure is low due to illness, or dehydration etc. However if this is prolonged or progresses to the point of fainting, then the cause for the low blood pressure needs to be looked into.

The other dizziness is more a room spinning, giddy feeling, due to vertigo. This is often made worse by turning the head, rolling over in bed

etc, and can be associated with nausea, and people sometimes stagger like they're sea sick. This is due to the balance centres in the inner ear sending incorrect messages about your movement to your brain, either due to a viral infection of the inner ear, or if it is recurring can be due to benign positional vertigo (BPV). This can be very debilitating, and there is medication for symptom relief, but not curative. There are exercises that can help shorten the episodes, and we can provide information on these when you see us.

Oikoumene Forest officially came into being in 1975, although founder Ernie Smith, Chris' father, had been selling poles on the site for some time under the Ernie Smith Post Yard name.

The name 'Oikoumene' is Greek and means 'all the men of the inhabited world'.

Chris, who has worked for the business for 30 years, says around 1990 the decision was made to move from just selling posts to include hardware, metal gates, and manufacturing their own timber farm gates.

"It's changed completely since," says Chris, explaining the business has tried to grow with demand.

"We've gone from a farm district to a lifestyle type district, and the demands that came with that, such as the decorative gates, which has become a big part of the business."

Around seven years ago Oikoumene joined Buildlink, which increased the company's range of building products.

Major commercial site for sale



One of the most prominent commercial properties in Helensville is up for sale.

The Kaipara Tavern in Commercial Road (shown in an aerial view above), along with its adjacent manager's accommodation building and the nearby fruit and vegetable shop on a separate title, has an asking price of just over \$1.7 million.

Real estate agent Peter Brennan, of Burmester Realty, says the main tavern building was constructed in the 1960s, at a cost of 600 pounds. The tavern was refurbished in the late 1980s. It includes a public bar, a gaming lounge and a garden bar at the rear, which backs onto the riverside walkway. The Commercial Road frontage was originally a restaurant, but now houses a liquor outlet.

The two freehold titles combined cover 1867sq.m, with the buildings occupying just under half of that area. All three businesses have new leases. The vendor, from Kaukapakapa, has owned the properties for 11 years.

Peter says the tavern has had several publicans over the last decade, but describes it now as a "settled family business".

with Kaipara chef, Peter Brennan

Beef and red wine casserole

Another comfort food recipe for those cold winter nights. Make a big batch and freeze some for during the week.

Beef and Red Wine

- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1kg trimmed beef chuck steak cut into about 8 pieces.
- 1 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon chopped garlic
- 4 medium carrots, peeled and cut into 2cm pieces.
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon any plain flour
- Half bottle of red wine, half a wine bottle of water.
- 2 bay leaves,
- Sprigs of thyme and rosemary tied with string into a bunch.
- 125g of bacon, cut the slices into 2cm pieces.
- 12 small onions, peeled
- 15 small tight white mushrooms
- 8 Brussel sprouts peeled and cut into quarters

Preheat the oven to 170° celsius. I use a large cast iron dish that goes on the stove

and in the oven, but you can happily make this dish with a large frypan and a casserole dish. Heat the frypan on a medium heat and melt the butter and oil together - heat until almost smoking then add the meat in a single layer. Turn it after a few minutes and brown all sides. Add the browned meat to the casserole as you go. Next add the onions and garlic to the pan and reduce the heat. Cook and stir for a few minutes then remove from the heat.

Sprinkle the flour into the pan and stir it to get rid of the lumps. Add the red wine in about three lots, stirring it into the flour mix before adding more liquid. Lastly add the water and return to a low heat. Stir back to a simmer, whisking if you need to get rid of any lumps. Allow to simmer for a couple of minutes then add the carrots, meat, sprigs of herbs and bay leaves. Season with salt and pepper, give it a quick stir and transfer to your casserole dish.

Cover and place it in the oven and cook for one and a half hours. Test some of the meat by trying to tease it apart with two forks - if it flakes apart it is cooked.

When the casserole has been cooking for about an hour or so, heat the frypan on a medium heat, add a drop of oil and the bacon pieces. Allow them to cook and crisp up without burning. Lift the bacon out and onto kitchen paper then add the onions, mushrooms and Brussel sprouts to the pan. Stir fry together then drain them with the bacon.

When the meat is cooked and you are ready to serve, add half of the bacon and vegetables to the meat and stir it through, spoon the rest on top as a garnish. Serve it all on top of mashed potatoes.
