Rrrrracing this time...

The sound of thundering race horse hooves has returned to the Helensville race track - albeit for a few brief days.

The track at the Helensville showgrounds was host to a film crew making a television movie about racehorse Kiwi, which won the Melbourne Cup in 1983.

Kiwi raced from 1980 to 1987 and remains the only horse to win both the Melbourne Cup and the Wellington Cup.

The Helensville track was chosen as a location because it is still rural and not too built up, and has a 1980s feel. Other filming locations included private horse farms, Avondale and Thames race courses, private homes, and Ardmore Airport, with Ellerslie Racecourse standing in for Melbourne's Flemington track.

The story of Kiwi's win is Transtasman horse racing legend. Bought by Waverley

sheep farmer Snow Lupton for just \$1000, he was used for mustering sheep as part of his conditioning routine.

Kiwi was considered very much an outsider for the Melbourne Cup, and with just 500m to run in the race was placed second to last. But a storming run through the field saw the horse, ridden by jockey Jim Cassidy, win by just over a length. His finish was so fast many race commentators only picked up Kiwi as he neared the finish line.

Wrightson merger clarification

Some of the information provided to *Helensville News* by PGG Wrightson head office for last month's article about the merger of the Helensville and Kumeu branches of Wrightsons was incorrect.

Kiwi was controversially scratched by an Australian veterinarian before the following year's Melbourne Cup.

Six weeks of filming finished in late March, and post production was expected to take three months.

Kiwi received just over \$3 million from New Zealand On Air's Platinum Fund, and was produced by Rogue Productions for TVNZ 1's Sunday Theatre lineup.

A screening date has yet to be set.

After being shown a map of the walkway and receiving an explanation of its origins and construction history, IVP Gudrun

originally started by the Helensville Riverside Trust, which completed the difficult initial 270m stage with the help of \$9000 provided by the Lions Club. The balance of the project was completed in stages by from Auckland Council. The work has seen 284 cubic metres of concrete crush compacted by club members, along with 60m3 of mulch spread. 1000 Lions and the public on a community planting day.

The group then walked along the walkway to the

river lookout and jetty at Creek Lane. After a photo session, IVP Gudrun's party left to visit both the Muriwai gannet colony and the Waimauku Lions Club's clock and playground. The International Vice President's visit to District 202K ended with a dinner hosted by Waimauku Lions, attended by 150 Lions members from around the country.





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New business owners having a blast

Helensville's Somerville family is really enjoying their new local business - in fact you could say they are having a blast.

Blastalot is run by Tom Somerville, who lives in Wishart Road, with his daughter Eva doing the administration and Eva's partner Noel O'Callaghan sharing the blasting duties with Tom and providing mechanical support. Eva and Noel live in Fordyce Road, Parakai with their children, Ella (3) and oneyear-old Ruby.

The company, which started operating in Helensville in February, specialises in vapour blasting - a type of sand blasting

which uses garnet instead of sand for an almost dust-free process.

The idea for the company name came from Noel, who has a background in stainless steel welding and fabrication - and he has been known to refer to Tom as Sir Blastalot!

How Tom came to own a sand blasting business is rather roundabout

He and wife Tami were originally deer farmers in Hawkes Bay. When the market

for commercial deer farming largely died off, they moved to Auckland where Tom spent a year telemarketing in insurance, an industry he would end up spending more than 20 years working in.

"So many people leave their run too late," says Tom. "I was working in an industry and [was] reasonably successful at it, but it wasn't really what I wanted to do.

"I figured I was well enough and young enough to have a new career."

But the switch from insurance to sand blasting wasn't straightforward - it came about through Tom's pottery hobby, which he took up eight months ago.

He made a huge pottery and glass fish sculpture, and then wanted someone to sand blast the timber frame it was hanging in, to raise up the grain in the wood. That led him to Norm Perris, who for many years had run a sand blasting business from his home in Pinchgut Road, Kaukapakapa.

The upshot was Norm wanted to retire, and Tom ended up buying the business and relocating it to Helensville.

"I've always liked doing practical work," says Tom.

He and Noel now work from a site behind BuildLink West (Oikoumene) in Railway Street - although much of their work is done from a large, trailer-mounted mobile blasting machine.

That means the pair can call on, for instance, local farmers who may have outsized machinery that needs sand blasting, and which would be too hard to bring into a workshop.

Tom says their vapour blasting equipment, which can also use sand or soda if required, can strip almost anything off metal and most other hard surfaces. It operates at a lower pressure than traditional sand blasting, and cold rather than hot, which means it avoids the risk of distorting metal panels associated with regular sand blasting.

The almost dust-free process means it is ideal for on-site work.

Tom and Noel also offer priming and painting options, and repair and fabrication work.

Age no barrier to making a difference

Every Tuesday morning 94-year-old Ruihi Waldrom is picked up by her friend Avila Allsop from her home in Huapai and together they head off to the Waimauku Spinners and Weavers group at the Glasgow Park Hall in Waimauku.

On the agenda is a morning of conversation, a good bout of weaving and knitting, an asparagus roll (or two), a sweet slice and a cup of tea to wash it all down with.

Ruihi has been a member of the group for nearly three decades and her fingers are as nimble as ever. "Knitting has helped keep my fingers mobile," she says.

Knitting needles and a bag of wool are never far away. She says whenever she can she'll sit down and knit for half an hour or an hour, although her eyesight means it's getting harder to knit while she watches television.

Her knitting prowess may not be widely known in the community, but there's a good chance that if you had a baby at Helensville Birthing Centre you may have taken your new-born home dressed in a woollen singlet or hat handmade by Ruihi.

How many singlets and hats does she think she's made over the years? It's impossible to say, but the original Plunket pattern she uses is firmly memorised: "it's a basic knit two, pearl two pattern."

Career Expo for everyone

The knitting of hats and singlets for newborns was part of a project she was involved with through the Women's Division of Federated Farmers many years ago. That project itself fell by the wayside, but Ruihi kept on knitting.

She remembers the first thing she ever knitted - she was about 12 years old, and it was an outfit for her Kewpie doll.

Her grandmothers taught her how to knit, but she says it's not a skill she's passed on to others because no-one has asked her to teach them. A lost skill perhaps, but she doesn't blame the young mothers of today.

"There are just so many different types of materials these days that are so much easier to wash and care for than woollen garments."

As well as providing singlets and hats for babies at Helensville Birthing Centre, she also knits rugs and children's clothing which are sent to the poor in eastern Europe through an organisation called Cover Up.

Ruihi Waldrom is proof that even at the age of 94 you can still make a difference in the world - both in your own community and in those half a world away.









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Former librarian farewelled

YVONNE MILLER 1930 - 2017

Long-serving local librarian Yvonne Miller lived in Helensville for 50 years from 1960 until with husband Bruce, she retired to Orewa in 2010. She died at Orewa on February 14.

During her five decades in Helensville, Yvonne made her mark on the community as a dedicated librarian, an active Scottish country dancer, a Brownie leader, and a keen genealogist. The Miller's generosity

and hospitality were well known, and their annual Guy Fawkes bonfires were legendary for many families.

Yvonne Lamb was born and raised in Christchurch. attending school and university there. In 1952 she travelled to Wellington to do a one year post graduate course at the Library School. While there she met up with Mary Ronnie, who became a life-long friend, and who also shared a love of Scottish country dancing.

On a trip between Christchurch and Wellington Yvonne met a young man from Ashburton, Bruce Miller, and after her return to

Christchurch they became engaged, and then married in 1953.

The Millers moved to the North Island and from 1954-57 were share milking at Woodhill. Lee and Debbie were born there. Their next job was at Papakura, and during those three years Nick and Jan were born. Their move to Helensville came in 1960 when they bought a dry stock farm situated between Wishart and Rautawhiri Roads. Their youngest child, Cathy was born there.

Scottish country dancing became popular in Helensville after Peter and Nola West moved back to the town in 1963-64, and the Millers were among the keen Friday night members. It was an all-age group with dancers from pre-schoolers to senior citizens joining in, and regular visitors from other clubs.

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Yvonne began her library career in Helensville at Kaipara College in 1963, and after Margaret West retired from the public library ten years later, Yvonne took over her position. For a time she worked at both libraries. The public library moved from its one room in the council building when the Lions Club provided a larger, much more suitable building, adjacent to the council chambers.

The library went through a tough patch when Helensville Borough Council made a move to close the facility, but with the

strength of support group 'Friends of the Library' it survived and gained in popularity and usage.

Yvonne retired from the library in 1995, but remained active in the local community, notably with the Genealogy Society. Meantime the Millers had sold part of their farm and built a new house on Wishart Road, and hosted many visitors through running a bed and breakfast.

Yvonne and Bruce moved to Orewa in 2010, and although suffering from health problems kept up various interests, including gardening, walking their dog, going to shows at Centrestage, and bus trips.

Their children, grandchildren and great grandchildren live throughout New Zealand, Australia and Europe.

medical centre notes

The flu vaccines have arrived in time for the change in season.

Flu vaccines are available to anyone from six months of age onwards, and are fully funded for everyone over 65 years of age, or people under 65 with certain long-term medical conditions including asthma, diabetes, and COPD. This is because influenza can make these people very unwell and increase their risk of hospitalisation.

The flu is different to a bad cold, and has potential for more severe illness which is why immunisation is so important.

The flu vaccine is strongly recommended for pregnant women, and does not cross the placenta so is safe to have while pregnant. The

mother's antibodies are also then passed on to the newborn child to offer protection for the first few weeks for the baby, too.

The influenza virus is different to the cold virus, and can affect the whole body. The vaccine does not stop you getting colds. It contains the flu virus strains the World Health Organisation has researched to be affecting our part of the world, and changes each year.

The vaccine does not contain any live virus, so you cannot get the flu from the vaccine, but as with all vaccines, it stimulates your immune system for a few days which can make you feel achey and tired for a couple of days. Then your immune system will remember the virus strain, so it can deal to it if you are exposed in the future. The vaccine takes two weeks to be effective, so the sooner you are immunised, the sooner you are protected.

We will be running flu clinics, as well as opportunistic offering of flu vaccines to the community, so please contact us for more info or to have the flu vaccine.

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Mobile service helps lessen stress of funerals

Helensville area residents needing a funeral director no longer need to look outside our area - a new company has started up that will come direct to them.

Wainui resident Mark Mortlock is offering a fully mobile funeral service through his Hibiscus Funeral Services company, covering the whole of Rodney.



Without the overheads of running a full funeral home, Mark is able to keep the cost of funerals to a minimum.

Becoming a funeral director was a natural progression for Mark, who for the previous 20 years had worked in the not-for-profit sector, following several years as an ICT and communications specialist, originally with Sky Television and later running his own computer support business.

One of his biggest 'claims to fame' was working for three years as the event and marketing manager, until 2005, of the Parachute music festival, which at the time was the largest Christian music festival in Australasia, attracting crowds of 20,000.

Mark, a registered celebrant and minister of religion, then spent more than 10 years working with the City Impact Church, focusing on delivering faith-based social services for families, at-risk youth, and the elderly.

As the church's general manager he oversaw more than 100 staff, and was responsible for the church's

regional campuses and facilities as well as overseeing the operations and day-to-day running of the North Shore campus.

Mark says about 18 months ago he was standing over the casket of a parishioner, talking with the funeral director, and realised it was a profession he could bring something to.

"It's all about families, not that different to what I've been doing over the past few years," he points out. "My job is to navigate that [difficult] time and make it as easy and painless as possible."

He believes his "very hands-on" and personal mobile service can remove some of the stress associated with the death of a loved one.

Mark handles all aspects of the funerals, using local churches and venues wherever possible. The personal touch extends to handdelivering ashes to families in cases of cremation.

Non-religious options are also available.

Born in Taranaki, Mark attended Orewa College and lived at Kaukapakapa before moving to Wainui. In his spare time, he likes to hunt on a South Head farm.

Every week the students from Parakai and Waioneke schools arrive at the community centre eager to discover what country they're heading to next.

They learn a little about their destination where it is in the world, what the climate is like and what produce is grown there - then they get to work cooking up a delicacy unique to that culture.

Te Whare Oranga kitchen manager

Keryn Reardon says the students are encouraged to try the recipes out again at home, and to think about what produce is grown locally and how they might be able to swap ingredients so they're using seasonal and economical produce.

For example, she says: "If a student goes home and recreates a meal of Vietnamese spring rolls, instead of using shrimp and lettuce which is a summer produce, they can make it in winter using shredded cabbage and leftover roast chicken."

The students are being exposed to different tastes and foods, but

also some valuable real-life learning.

"We're not only teaching them about different types of food," says Keryn, "but also how an actual professional kitchen operates, right through from health and safety, to basic kitchen etiquette and most importantly how to work together as a kitchen brigade."

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Helensville candidates named

All three main political parties have named their candidates for the Helensville electorate for the upcoming general election.

They are Chris Penk for National, Kurt Taogaga for Labour, and Hayley Holt for the Green Party.

Chris Penk stands to inherit the seat in parliament, one of the country's safest National seats, from former Prime Minister John Key at the election on September 23.

Chris lives with his wife in Glen Eden. After attending Kelston Boys High School, he studied at Auckland University, gaining a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1999 and an Honours Bachelor of Laws in 2009.

Between the two degrees, Chris joined the Royal New Zealand Navy in 2000, serving as an officer of the watch on the HMNZS Te Kaha and at Government House as aide-de-camp to the Governor-General in 2003. He then joined the Australian Defence Force, serving in submarines. He was appointed navigating officer of HMAS Sheean in 2006, and was stationed in the northern Arabian Gulf in late 2007.

Returning to New Zealand in 2008 he completed his legal training and was admitted to the bar in 2010, working as a staff solicitor in Auckland. In late 2015 he established his own firm with a business partner, Ong & Penk Lawyers.

Outside his military service and legal career, Chris has been an active member of various community groups, follows New Zealand cricket and league teams, and enjoys walking the family dog.

Chris says he is "keen to engage closely with as many locals as possible.'

"Helensville [has] had the distinction of being represented by John Key for the last 15 years, so I've got big shoes to fill running here. I won't be taking anything for granted, he says. "I bring my own unique skills and aspirations."

Labour candidate Kurt Taogaga spent much of his early life in Helensville

"My mother's family have lived in Helensville since the 1950s. I spent many years in Helensville as a youngster, living with my grandparents, attending the local primary school," he says.

After commuting to Pasadena Intermediate and Auckland Grammar School, Kurt attended Auckland and Otago Universities.

"When I moved back to Helensville, my

first full-time job out of university was working as a library assistant at the Helensville Library.

He subsequently took an English language teaching position in South Korea for four years, then spent two years in the United Kingdom. Since returning to New Zealand he has split his time between study and working as an English language teacher and business tutor.

He stood last year in the local body elections in the city-centre Waitemata ward where he now lives. Kurt is currently completing a Master's degree in Global Business at AUT.

The Green's Hayley Holt is probably the best-know of the three candidates, thanks to high-profile roles on television and radio. particularly Prime TV's show 'The Crowd Goes Wild' since 2009.

Prior to that she was a professional ballroom dancer and appeared on 'Dancing with the Stars' as a professional dancer and more recently as a judge. She also appeared on one season of the UK version of the same show; 'Strictly Come Dancing'.

She has danced since the age of seven, and in 1998 was a New Zealand ballroom dancing champion.

Hayley grew up in Auckland, and at Epsom Girls Grammar School was part of its Future Problem Solving program for gifted students.

She went to the University of Auckland to study history and mathematics, but after a year decided to follow her dream of becoming a professional snowboarder. A

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former national snowboarding slalom champion, she spent six years chasing that goal.

Two years ago Hayley went back to university part time to finish her degree, swapping maths for politics. She joined the Greens where she says: "I finally found my tribe".

Her parents live on 40ha at Kaipara Flats, where Hayley hopes to build an off the grid eco-home.





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from the frontline

Cattle poaching is a serious criminal offence. It usually occurs in remote rural areas, where thieves take advantage of the distance between homes to go about their illegal roundups and slaughters. What is of great concern is that most of these people don't have a firearms licence - and if they do, they shouldn't have one, let alone be in possession of a firearm!



Earlier this year there were two incidents on the same morning where an armed poacher was

disturbed on private property at Makarau. On both occasions the offender fled in a vehicle. I also attended the senseless shooting of a beef cow at South Head in August last year.

Anyone in possession of a firearm must gain permission from the landowner before entering a property. If you know anyone that does not abide by this law, report it to police. If you see poachers with firearms on your property, don't approach them - call 111 immediately.

Many farms in the South Kaipara are isolated, and to reduce future incidences we need to work together. Make your neighbours aware of any suspicious incidents; communication and awareness are key steps to prevent crime. Reduce opportunities for thieves to cross fence lines, especially road boundaries. Check fences aren't damaged or deliberately cut, that all road gates are locked, and that stock are checked regularly.

Dogs are useful guardians, especially at night time, and generally alert their owners of anything out of the ordinary.

Install surveillance cameras. Many motion-activated cameras have great night vision capabilities. Motion activated driveway alarms alert land owners of suspicious people coming onto their property. Put up signs alerting people your property is monitored.

Ensure you are aware of who is coming and going on your property. Who is doing deliveries and pickups, who are the contractors and who do they employ? Who knows your lock combinations and who has access to keys allowing access to your properties? It is wise to change lock combinations regularly.

Why not keep a small booklet and pencil at hand so you can jot down suspicious vehicles, times and dates? It's better to have the information and not need it than to be asked a few weeks later and not remember details that could help apprehend offenders.

Please report all incidents of poaching or suspected poaching, and any suspicious vehicles. If you see something and it doesn't feel right, trust your instincts. If it is safe to do so try to get a vehicle registration and description. Report this to your local police station or phone Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Easy allergy-free crumb mix

As I have discussed before in my column, I have a household with family members who have issues with various foods. When it is gluten and dairy intolerance it can be quite a challenge to make something that requires crumbing and pan frying. I have now found a fantastic solution and have used it to crumb fish, chicken, egg plant, tofu and schnitzel. What's more, this crumb method makes such a good and even coating I don't think I would bother with old-school breadcrumbs again.

You will need to buy a couple of inexpensive items from the supermarket which will live in your pantry for a long time without going stale - namely cornflour and corn polenta.

Fine corn polenta is the ground corn that is left after the cornflour is removed, and is sometimes referred to as corn grits. It is the corn equivalent of wheat semolina. You can use it in many ways - to make a type of porridge, or to use it as the dusting under pizza dough to stop it sticking to the oven stone. I cooked polenta with cream when I had the restaurant, and used

it as a luscious starch similar to mash potatoes served under a meat dish.

Crumb Mix

To coat a couple of chicken breasts or a couple of fillets of fish:

- 2 heaped tablespoons cornflour
- 2 heaped tablespoons fine corn polenta
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- A few grinds of black pepper

Place ingredients in a plastic food bag.

In a small bowl mix one heaped teaspoon of cornflour with two tablespoons of water. Dredge the meats through the cornflour and water and drop into the bag, shake it about and set aside until ready to cook.

You can add other flavours to the crumb mix. I often use ½ teaspoon paprika, ½ teaspoon ground cumin, ¼ teaspoon ground chilli powder and sometimes I grate the zest off half a lemon or lime. This is particularly nice when frying slices of tofu.

Pan fry in oil or coconut fat, and if the pan gets a bit too hot don't worry as this crumb mix will take a much higher temperature than breadcrumbs will before burning.
