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Work to start on \$1m pathway

Work on the first two stages of a pathway encircling Rautawhiri Park will start next year.

The \$1 million project will be completed over five stages, with the first two costing \$376,000. That money is coming from Auckland Council 'growth funding' plus \$42,480 from Rodney Local Board.

The project was identified last year as a priority in the Rodney Local Board's Recreational Walkways and Bike Trials programme.

"The good news is we now have growth funding from council, together with funding from the local board's play spaces budget, to pay for these two stages to be constructed," says Brent Bailey, chair of the board's Parks & Reserve Committee.

"It will be a great amenity for the community and visitors alike."

Concept designs for the Rautawhiri Park perimeter walkway have been completed, and community engagement is currently in progress with sports clubs, local residents, schools and Helensville community groups.

Brent says the Lions Club of Helensville supports the scheme and plans to contribute financially towards the purchase and installation of five to 10 fitness stations to be located around the walkway.

Recycling service changes

Helensville's R&R Recycling in Stewart Street will close on January 1 next year, and its business will transfer to the Helensville Community Recycling Centre in Mill Road.

R&R Recycling paved the way for recycling in Helensville, operating since 2002 under the care of Robbie (Alan Robinson) and Ronnie Hinds. Robbie has run it by himself since Ronnie passed away in 2014.

Over the years the business won a number of awards, and has been the source of many donations to a number of local community organisations.

Helensville Community Recycling Centre manager Treena Gowthorpe acknowledges the "excellent work of Robbie and Ronnie and the invaluable service they gave to the Helensville community", and says a plaque will be installed at the Mill Road Recycling Centre to honour them.

Once complete the concrete path will have links through to existing facilities such as the playground, sports courts, skatepark, sports clubrooms, car parks and toilets, and it has been designed to meet the requirements of sports field users for areas of play and buffer zones.

The funding of \$376,000 (council growth funding and local board funding combined) for the 2017/18 financial year will enable the construction of stages one and two, which will create a walkway circuit around the perimeter of the athletics field and provide links to the playground and toilet facilities.

"It is great for our area to secure this growth funding, but there remained a \$42,480 shortfall. So the Rodney Local Board was delighted to put its money where its mouth is and stump up the shortfall at our Parks and Recreation meeting on October 19," says Brent.

Construction of stages one and two is planned for late summer and autumn next year.

The idea of a traffic by-pass for Helensville has been raised again (see page 12). It's an issue that has done the rounds for more than 20 years.

I think it's fair to say it would make the centre of Helensville a much more pleasant place, and I think few businesses would suffer adverse effects. Business owners often equate vehicle traffic with customers, but it's been shown again and again around that world that removing vehicles from shopping areas increases business rather than hurting it.

I will be interested to see what locals think of the idea, but regardless of their support or otherwise, the huge cost of such a piece of infrastructure would make it seem unlikely to proceed. The new government is certainly less keen on roading projects.

Medical centre changes

A reconfigured reception desk and patient waiting area, and an on-site prescription dispensary, are among changes coming to the Kaipara Medical Centre.

The changes are designed to improve both the centre's clinical efficiency and the overall health outcomes for patients. They come after an extensive review of the centre by Procare, which looked at options for reconfiguring the site and ways to improve efficiency.

The three key changes to take place over the next 12 to 15 months are:

- A reconfigured front desk and patient waiting area, beginning early 2018.
- The establishment of an on-site dispensary so patients have the option of having their prescriptions filled at the centre.
- From December 1 this year, an increase in fees for extended hours clinics only.

The new layout of public spaces at the centre will result in greater waiting room privacy for patients, and will address the issue of cold weather entering the building from the automatic entry doors. It will also

create room for the on-site dispensary.

It's expected the building work will begin in early 2018, with disruption to patients and staff kept to a minimum.

The new dispensary is an important development for the Kaipara Medical Centre, giving patients the option to fill their prescription on-site immediately following their doctor's appointment. The centre is working with local pharmacies through a tender process to secure the contract to help fund and operate the dispensary.

Board chairman Dianne Kidd says: "this change will bring huge benefit to our community, especially our elderly and disabled patients who can find it difficult to have to visit two locations to see their doctor and then have a prescription filled."

From December 1, fees for extended hours clinics held on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday evenings (from 5.30pm to 7.30pm) and on Saturday mornings (from 8.30am to midday) will increase. The extended hours clinics are usually fully booked, and to date have been subsidised by Kaipara Medical Centre.

Local birth centre leads way with breastfeeding

Helensville's Birthing Centre has been acknowledged as one of the nation's best when it comes to breastfeeding rates.

The centre has just received its fourth accreditation from the New Zealand Breastfeeding Alliance (NZBA), the culmination of 12 years of monitoring by that organisation. Jane was in Helensville on Friday, October 20 to make a special presentation to Birthing Centre staff on the occasion of it's 12-year accreditation, giving them a specially made koru statue as recognition of their high rates of breastfeeding mothers.

In its fourth audit of the Helensville Birthing Centre, the NZBA found "women in

The Helensville Birthing Centre boasts a 100 percent exclusive breastfeeding rate at discharge for women who give birth at the centre, and a figure of 95 percent overall - well ahead of the national average of 83 percent and the international standard of 80 percent.

The NZBA monitors all 75 hospitals and other centres that provide birthing facilities throughout New Zealand as part of the The Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative, a joint international project by the World Health Organisation (WHO) and UNICEF to improve breast feeding rates.

Full accreditation takes 12 years explains NZBA executive officer Jane Cartwright, with birthing facilities visited at three, six and nine years to receive accreditation before getting a final 12-year tick of approval.



Birthing Centre manager Michelle Nasey said at the presentation that while it's " w o n d e r f u I t o b e acknowledged", that's not why they do it. "It's about the culture of what we do" with the staff believing in breast feeding being the best thing for mothers and babies.

Helensville lactation consultant Debbie Tetlow says: "It is especially heartening when women who come to us after having

had births such as caesareans, with the associated negative start to breastfeeding that entails, are able to overcome the initial difficulties and leave our centre successfully breastfeeding."

She says the challenge is to support women to continue to breastfeed once they return home, as there's a big drop off with only one in five babies nationwide being exclusively breastfed at six months - a long way from the WHO recommendation.

She says efforts to improve those rates locally include a well-resourced website with lots of information on breastfeeding; antenatal breastfeeding classes; and ongoing access to Helensville Birthing Centre lactation consultants. The most important support is from the community itself through whanau and popular 'mums and babies' coffee mornings.

Farewell to former editor

We remember Cynthia Thrush, the longest-serving editor of Helensville News, who passed away in August.

Cynthia Thrush 23/8/29 - 22/8/17

Cynthia Thrush was born Cynthia Elizabeth Green on August 23, 1929 in London, England to Major Ellis Charles

(Jimmy) Green and Ruth Dohring. She was followed by two sisters, Shirley and Margaret.

She attended boarding school in India at the Convent of St Joseph & Mary in Simla, while her father served as a Major in the Indian Army. Cynthia fondly remembered the nuns at the school, and could recall in detail visits to palaces during school term breaks, as some of her girlfriends were princesses. It was India where she developed a penchant for curries, and her own pork pilau was legendary.

After the partition of India, the Greens moved

to New Zealand to join other family members in Auckland. There, Cynthia completed a

Bachelor of Science in 1953 and a Diploma of Educational Studies. Her dedication to education culminated in a Commemoration Medal for Services to New Zealand in 1990 and an Education Service Award in 1991. She completed a

Cynthia Thrush

(Education) in 1994 While at University in Auckland in the late 1940s, Cynthia fell in love with Ron Thrush. They met on a university tramping club trip and courted for four years before marrying in 1951.

Master of Arts

Ron joined the Royal New Zealand Air Force, reaching the rank of Wing Commander. The couple's early married life involved frequent moves to Air Force bases around the country. Their first child Ruth was born in 1954, followed by twins Peter and Liz.

Then came a posting to the RNZAF flying-boat base in Fiji, where their fourth child Gavin was born in 1959. Cynthia taught at the secondary college in Suva.

The family returned to Wellington (Defence HQ) in 1959, and for 20 years Cynthia enjoyed activities with the Wellington theatre and education communities. Their fifth child, Amylouise, was born in 1973. Ron and Cynthia separated in 1978 but remained close friends, and she and Amylouise moved to Auckland in 1980.

Cynthia was a foundation trustee of the North Shore Theatre and Conference Centre Trust, which successfully lobbied for a purposebuilt venue for Auckland's North Shore - the popular

Bruce Mason Centre. She remained a trustee many years.

Cynthia thrived as a secondary teacher, first as a science teacher in Suva and then at Onslow College in 1961, where she later served for many years as a guidance counsellor. After her move to Auckland, she taught at Avondale College and later Glenfield College from 1981 to 1992.

Retirement led to new challenges for Cynthia including a role as an educational training consultant, contracting to major corporates such as Telecom.

Then came a move, aged 72, to a lifestyle block in Mangakura Road, Helensville. Cynthia relocated part of the former Huapai Golf Club rooms onto the fiveacre site and proceeded to renovate. refurbish and landscape the property into a comfortable family home.

While in Helensville, Cynthia purchased the Helensville News and developed it into a 16 page monthly newspaper filled with local interest stories, personalities and events. She loved writing 'good news' and being part of the local community, and delighted in calling this her "ninth career".

She lived in Helensville until her 80th year, when she moved to Auckland to be closer to family.

Cynthia passed away with her family at her side on August 22, one day before her 88th birthday. She is survived by her two sisters and four children Ruth, Peter, Liz and Amylouise (Ron and Gavin died in a car accident in 2006).

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New Helensville MP

Helensville News editor Dave Addison had an in-depth interview with new Helensville Member of Parliament, Chris Penk. This article will run over two issues.

New Helensville MP Chris Penk is looking forward to being a 'local' member of parliament and representing and advocating for locals in the electorate.

After being elected with a majority of almost 15,000 and gaining more votes than all the other Helensville electorate candidates combined, Chris is obviously disappointed his party has ended up in opposition, rather than in government.

Of course I was disappointed my party isn't in government, but I think the

opportunity to contribute in a constructive way is still very much there," he says, "and to be an opposition that points out ways that things could be done better, as opposed to seeing the role as creating trouble or opposing for the mere sake of it. I don't want to do that.

"I also want to be pragmatic about what's going to achieve the best results for the Helensville electorate, so sometimes that will be acknowledging good stuff that comes out of the minority government's programme, and at other

times pushing them pretty hard to do more." He says that being in opposition "takes

some pressure off". "From the perspective of someone who's to work hard as an electorate MP, it makes it easier to advocate really strongly on behalf of constituents. I can noisily go into bat for a local school, for example, petition the Minister of Education and be on his or her case quite strongly in a way that would be a little more difficult if it was in your own party."

The flip side to that, he says, is that it will be more difficult to achieve real results - "but I'll do my best anyway".

Chris's background is in the military and law. He began studying to become a lawyer, then put that on hold to join the navy, firstly serving on frigates here as well as spending a year as an aide to the Governor General in Wellington, then transferring to the Royal Australian Navy so he could serve on submarines.

He rose to the rank of navigating officer, fifth in the chain of command, aboard the HMAS Sheean and was stationed in the Northern Arabian Gulf in late 2007.

Chris returned to New Zealand in 2008 after seven years in the military, joined the National Party, and completed his law degree. He was admitted to the bar in 2010 and worked as staff solicitor in Auckland until

establishing with a business partner his own firm, Ong & Penk Lawyers, in 2015.

Outside of family and politics, Chris is a former cricket player and coach and passionate supporter of the Black Caps cricket team. He's also a keen rugby league fan and supporter of the Warriors - though "some years it's real tough" he jokes.

So why did he enter politics?

"Because I'm excited by the opportunity for problem solving," he says. "I see politics as a good chance to work with people to make their lives better. At the most basic level that's what it's all about.

"At the local level it means advocating for things that are very much Helensvillefocussed, but then given opportunities on the national stage to develop good policy • To page 10

that will serve all the country."

His wife of seven years, Newshub digital media journalist Kim Choe, is fully behind his move into politics.

"She's very supportive, partly because we've both been supportive of each other's respective aspirations, but also because she knew I was interested in getting into the political realm from the time that we met," says Chris.

The couple celebrated the arrival of their first child, son Austin, just a couple of weeks before the election.

The Helensville electorate, which spans from Glorit in the north down to the northern Manukau Heads in the south and incorporates all of Waitakere, is one of the safest National seats in the country and of course the electorate of former Prime Minister Sir John Key.

Helensville News asked Chris what his thoughts were on being given a pretty much guaranteed path into parliament.

"I think it means I was highly enough regarded in the party to be given the opportunity, but I think to look beyond that in terms of being shoulder tapped for higher honours would probably be a mistake, because it would seem presumptuous within the party. But also if I get ahead of myself and don't do the hard work locally at the level that I'm currently at, then I won't stick around,

I won't survive

"I'm only in parliament now and into the future because the people of Helensville have voted me in."

On the campaign trail leading up to his election, Chris was often confronted with the big shoes to fill' dilemma of taking on the former PM's seat.

"[But] the message I got, in amongst people saying that I've got big shoes to fill, was actually that they were pleased that my focus will be able to be 100 percent local which is pleasing to me."

He did receive some advice from the former Prime Minister.

"The 'key' advice from Sir John was to work very hard in your early years to establish a reputation as someone who is reasonable, can be trusted, and will work hard, because you have that opportunity early on and if you gain higher responsibilities later as he did, and as I may or may not do, then you will be able to rely to some extent on the good reputation you developed in those early years," says Chris.

"The other [piece of advice] was that people want to know that you are a good person and that you care, more so than specifics of policy detail.

"I think people expect you to be someone who they can talk to and get stuff done, more than be a policy wonk or talk to them about detail they're not interested in."

Local artists bring in the visitors

Inclement weather didn't affect Helensville's premier arts event, the three-day Arts in the Ville over Labour Weekend, with visitor numbers up on previous years.

"The town had a real buzz to it which is just what we want," says embroiderer Jo Dixey, one of the festival's organisers.

"The weekend was great. I had more than double the visitors through my studio [than last year] and I know the Art Centre was flat out with people taking part in the print making 'have a go'."

Cafe opens beside Parakai supermarket

Parakai has a new cafe.

Dan Dale, owner of the Parakai Four Square supermarket, opened the cafe in the premises at the end of the supermarket building, previously operated as a takeaway,

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in mid-October.

The building was gutted, walls replastered and repainted, and new cabinets installed.

"I thought a cafe would go well in Parakai," says Dan. "The feedback has been really good."

Walking into the new cafe, customers are faced with an array of cabinets.

Immediately to the left are ice creams - both Tip Top scoop ice cream flavours and the popular real fruit varieties in strawberry, blueberry and mango - sure to be a hit with summer on the way.

Beside that is a cabinet for cafe-style food, with salads, meals like lasagne, and cakes and slices.

Alongside that is the counter to order coffee - made from locally ground beans from South Head's High Noon Coffee Roastery, a local company that supplies some big names, like celebrity chef Simon Gault's Euro restaurant.

"Customers like to see us using local coffee," says Dan.

Next around the counter is what Dan says is currently the most popular item - fried chicken. Like a certain well-known brand, it

comes in individual pieces, a range of combo-style meals, plus side dishes such as French fries and coleslaw.

A pie warmer is still to be installed along with more outdoor seating, and Dan is also considering offering a hot roast of the day, with left-overs being sold as cold cuts.

Since taking ownership of Parakai Four Square in January last year, staff numbers have grown from 12 to more than 20, with up to four on hand in the new cafe at peak times.

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local board matters

Rodney Local Board has just completed its first year, and it's worth taking stock of what we have achieved.

We have five main areas of focus: Better Roads & Public Transport; Connecting our Communities; Planning for Growth; Protecting the Environment; and Working with the Community.

Our three-year 'Local Board Plan' looks at ways to address Rodney's transport needs and how council could bring forward funding to deal with the pressures of growth, public transport and road sealing. Our option of a targeted transport rate received enough support for us to explore proposals residents might support. We aim to have something ready for the 2018 10 Year Budget (Long Term Plan) consultation early next year.

We will continue to advocate for more responsive road maintenance and alternative ways of dealing with road sealing.

Greenways, or trailways - paths that can be walked, cycled or used by horse riders were a popular initiative in our plan. We have allocated \$250,000 this financial year towards helping community groups produce feasibility studies for sections of our existing Greenways plans in Wellsford, Warkworth and Kumeu/Riverhead.

We will complete Greenways Plans for areas that don't yet have them - an area from Kaukapakapa to Dairy Flat down to Coatesville and across to Helensville. This will enable us to target these areas for feasibility planning in the 2019-2020 financial year.

Firefighters to sell Xmas trees at Waitoki market

Kaukapakapa Fire Brigade will be at the Waitoki Christmas market on Saturday, December 9. They won't be putting out fires hopefully - but rather selling Christmas trees. Waitoki locals will also have the chance of a photo opportunity dressed up in a fire fighter's garb.

The market will be held in the Waitoki Hall from 8.30am to midday. New stall holders can phone Gill on 420 3301 or email: waitokihall@gmail.com. The centre plan for Kumeu and Huapai is an essential part in both improving the current township for residents and preparing for Structure Planning in Future Urban areas planned for development after 2028. The Board provided

\$230,000 towards the 'Huapai Hub' community group's proposal to create a community space in Huapai, and they aim to have this well underway this year. It is an exciting project and is the first step in our Centre Plan for a vibrant town centre.

We are working with the North West Country business association on a town centre upgrade for Helensville, and after public consultation they are now working on plans for some exciting streetscape improvements which we intend to fund over the next few years.

The Board has focused its efforts on improving our harbours and the waterways that flow into them. We have committed \$250,000 to assist landowners to fence off and plant riparian margins on rivers with pollution issues. The upper Kaipara River catchment is one of the priority areas this year, and we have partnered with Fonterra, Beef & Lamb NZ, and Te Uri O Hau to deliver this program. It has been well received on the ground which is a fantastic start.

As part of a \$3 million project to improve Rautawhiri Park, work will start soon on a perimeter path, as will upgrades to the tennis and netball courts.

After three years of planning the Board has chosen the \$12 million Huapai Indoor Court facility as its major advocacy item for the 10 Year Budget. This will be the district's first dedicated indoor sports facility if our business case is accepted. We are presenting this for inclusion in the 2018 plan and public consultation in the New Year.
