Commute to city to become safer for locals

South Kaipara commuters are in for a safer journey into Auckland with a raft of safety improvements to be made on SH16 between Waimauku and Brighams Creek.

However, they will have to wait up to three years for all of the new safety measures to be completed.

Work on the \$53m safety and efficiency improvements to State Highway 16 is expected to start later this year and be completed in stages, with the first being in the areas with the highest crash history.

The work will include a new roundabout at the Coatesville-Riverhead Highway intersection, extra lanes, safety barriers to prevent head-on crashes, and more space for pedestrians and cyclists.

The New Zealand Transport Agency has

approved funding for the design and construction of the project, which is part of the government's \$600 million Safe Roads programme.

Between 2006 and 2015, four people were killed and 30 seriously injured on this section of SH16.

"Improvements will include extra lanes between Brigham Creek and Taupaki roundabout, a flush median to give drivers more room and a safe place to turn, and a roundabout at the SH16/Coatesville-Riverhead Highway intersection," says NZTA system design manager Brett Gliddon.

Flexible road safety barriers, which can help reduce road deaths by up to 80 percent, will be put along sections of the route.

Changes to speed limits are also being

considered following consultation with road users.

Initial work on the safety projects will see surveyors locating boundaries and the positions of utilities such as water and power. Next will come 'enabling works', including moving utility infrastructure and any fences, trees or driveways that may be in the way of the project.

Flexible steel-cable road safety barriers will be installed along the route, except between Taupaki and Kumeu, which will instead receive a painted flush median to provide more room and a safe place for vehicles turn, while keeping traffic flowing.

The road between Brigham Creek and the Taupaki roundabout will be widened to

Plenty new for Arts in the Ville

Most of the artists who took part in last year's highly successful Arts in the Ville will be back again this year - but organisers promise plenty that's new as well.

The three-day event will again be held over Labour Weekend, October 20-22, with 21 venues already lined up.

There will be new artists exhibiting, plus a new pop-up gallery at the old Art Stop in Commercial Road. It will feature emerging

artists, most either recently qualified or still studying, the youngest just 19. Leda Daniels will have her new gallery at 1 Commercial Road open, while internationally-recognised sculptor Jeff Thomson will again open his workshop.

The displays in the War Memorial Hall will be greatly expanded this year, with 11 artists exhibiting there, plus there will be a special fun 'Hat Walk' event on the Monday organised by Myra Lloyd of Marmalade Hats - the details of

which are being kept secret, but which we can reveal will involve people being able to try on hats.

The auction held for the first time last year will now be a completely separate event, held on the Friday night before the rest of the weekend's events. A criticism of last year's event was the lack of refreshment opportunities, and coorganiser Kura Geere-Watson says she has arranged for both The Kombuchery and Husk to stay open all weekend, and other venues may follow suit.

Arts in the Ville has grown each year, and is developing a reputation as an event which draws people to Helensville from outside our area. Over the past couple of years, many of

the artists reported more than 200 visitors each day, with many also making good sales.

Among new features hoped to be added before the next Helensville Show, on Saturday, February 23 next year, is the ability to buy tickets online for the show, our town's biggest annual single day event.

"As a show, we want to use technology to make things more efficient for everyone,' says A&P Association president Rick Croft.

"Ultimately, we want show tickets to be a simple click away. Show entries and trade exhibitors should find it easy to get all the information they need to be part of the show. Horse measuring is one of the services we provide to the showing community, and we want that info easily accessible on the website.

"The biggest improvement is the ease of looking at the site, whether it be on a computer or a phone," he says.

The new site was built using the opensource Wordpress platform by Helensville website design company Dash Design.

Health Trust seeking community representatives

The Helensville District Health Trust is calling on people with a passion for the health and well-being of the South Kaipara community to join the organisation at one of the most exciting times in its almost 30-year history.

Retiring chairperson Erica McKenzie says: "It has been rewarding in my time as chairperson of the Trust, and I'm sure whoever takes over the role will likewise feel a great sense of achievement for helping create a thriving and healthy community."

Nicola says there are many people who have moved to the area in the last decade or so who may not be fully aware of how the Trust came about as a grassroots response by the community to keep its maternity hospital, when it was threatened with closure in the mid-80s.

"The Trust has always been a real pioneer in regards to community health," she says, "and I'm confident that with the right people we'll continue to hold true to that pioneering spirit in this next exciting chapter of our history."

medical centre notes

There is much discussion about future health costs and the public health risks associated with obesity.

Studies have shown that if you are overweight, losing five percent of your body weight, whatever your starting weight, is a most effective prevention for diabetes. A 10 percent weight loss shows improvement in osteoarthritis, fatty liver, hypertension and sleep apnoea.

However, losing weight is difficult, and most approaches in primary care achieve only three percent weight loss, and only one person in 20 maintains that weight being kept off for more than six months.

The key is changing the reaction of the brain to feeling full on smaller portions, which involves various methods to retrain the physiological response - which is why sustained weight loss is so difficult.

The best approach from the medical clinic side seems to be a mixed tool of lifestyle enablers to shift the fullness to meal size response - including options (if suitable) such as low calorie meal replacement shakes, or medication to help suppress appetite, as well as support to help increase activity and change how we approach eating. Bariatric surgery works in a similar way, of limiting the size of meal sizes while feeling full on less.

Of course, for some people due to other medical conditions these are not suitable, so always seek advice. Weight loss in obesity has massive impacts on future and current health, and needs a multi-faceted approach. You can't outrun a bad diet - as I've been told.

Living in a rural area such as the South Kaipara, we all know someone who uses, or has used, a school bus to get to and from school.

So it surprises me that motorists who use our rural roads don't seem to know the speed limit when driving past a stationary school bus which is picking up or dropping off children.



For anyone unaware of the speed to drive past a stationary school bus, remember this saying: "Either way it's 20K".

I can appreciate that to a motorist who has been driving at 100kph along, say, SH16, and sees a school bus ahead, that 20kph may seem a bit too slow. But they are legally required to reduce their speed to 20kph - and let me tell you that 20kph it is not too slow when a person is hit by a moving vehicle.

There's a reason for this 20kph speed limit. Statistics show that almost all pedestrians that are hit by a vehicle at 20kph will survive.

That changes quite significantly if they are hit by a vehicle travelling at 50kph. There is obviously a greater risk they will be more seriously hurt, and in fact 20 percent of car versus pedestrian crashes at that speed result in death.

We all know children can at times be unpredictable, that they are more likely to run out onto a road without looking, and a school bus is a pretty big vehicle that can block not only their view but the view of a passing motorist.

So if you are travelling when there is a possibility school buses will be about, be vigilant, drive to the conditions, and watch your speed.

Don't be the driver who passes a vehicle that has slowed down to 20kph to pass the bus safely (yes, this does happen!) Be the driver that is now educated and conscientious, who slows down to 20kph when they drive past all stationary school buses.

If you don't, you might get an infringement notice for excessive speed, 50 demerit points, or your driver's licence suspended for 28 days for driving 50kph over the speed limit.

I know that I would much rather deal with the enforcement side of this unsafe driving behaviour, than have to attend a fatal crash where a child has been killed because of someone's unnecessary speed past a school bus. Who would want that on their conscience?

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'Rescue Run' on again

It's going to be a disaster.

At least, that's what organisers of this week's 'Rescue Run' have planned, with five major disaster zones set up in Woodhill Forest for teams of competitors to race their way through.

The inaugural Rescue Run was held in 2016 over local farms and in Woodhill Forest, and raised more than \$185,000 for charity.

This year five major charities are set to benefit from the run - St John (Northern Region); Coastguard (Northern Region); Fire & Emergency NZ (Helensville Volunteer Fire Brigade); Land Search & Rescue

Suffrage drink

A limited edition drink to mark the 125th anniversary of suffrage in New Zealand will raise a bit of cash for the Helenville Women & Family Centre.

The Kombuchery in Commercial Road is selling the limited edition kombucha flavour just for September. It's a blend of Earl Grey and Rose Petals, and \$1 from every glass or bottle sold will go to the HWFC.

September is the 125 year anniversary of suffrage in New Zealand. The suffragettes, led by Kate Sheppard, presented a petition to parliament, and on September 19, 1893, New Zealand became the first selfgoverning nation to allow all adult women to vote in general elections. (Auckland); and Surf Lifesaving Northern Region. A separate secondary schools division will be supporting Youthline.

For this year's event, on Saturday, September 8, the 15km course has been completely redesigned. It starts at Parakai Springs for registration and parking, with runners and spectators bussed to Woodhill Forest for the event proper.

Once there, up to 100 teams of six which must include two females - will tackle a course that traverses open paddocks, forest and native bush, coastal sections, some existing public walkways and forestry roads.

Along the way they will fight their way through five major 'disasters', each of which has been designed by disaster relief and emergency service professionals to as closely as possible mimic potential real-life scenarios.

First up will be the 'Patient Rescue Zone', a simulated first-responder challenge. Using GPS technology, the teams will have to locate survival equipment, rescue an injured patient (in reality a dummy), perform first aid and carry out an emergency evacuation. That dummy will then be carried by stretcher throughout the rest of the course.

Next competitors will encounter the 'Flood Zone', which will feature a 66m by 54m water maze designed to simulate a series of submerged city streets. Teams will need to navigate an escape through water at various depths, while keeping their patient

warm and dry.

A 'Mudslide Zone' will then test the teams' strength and endurance as they carry their patients through a flow of mud and water, using a guide rope to help climb out.

After that they will contest a 'Car Pile-up Zone' which will replicate a multi-vehicle motorway crash site. Teams will traverse a chaotic accident simulation filled with noise, smoke, fire and screams.

The final challenge will be the 60m-long 'Earthquake Zone', with teams entering a quake aftermath simulation featuring damaged buildings and debris.

Helensville main street improvements

Over the last couple of years the community has been asked what they think would make Helensville an even better place to live

Improving the quality of the main street has consistently been identified as a priority. People have talked of the need for an improved look and feel in the town - more trees and street planting, better connections with the river, shops needing to look more loved, and revitalising the retail strip.

Based on this feedback, the North West Country Business Association arranged for draft concept plans to be drawn up that provide for new street trees and vegetation pockets, hanging baskets, upgraded seating, better pedestrian spaces and improved connections with the river.

If you would like to have a look at these concept plans and either comment on them or have some input into the next stage of the process, which will be the detailed design phase, please come along to the Plans for Enhancing Helensville Township Community Drop-in Session.

It's on Saturday, September 8 from 10am to 1pm in the Helensville War Memorial Hall.

This is an exciting opportunity for the local community to see their ideas coming to fruition and influence what happens next.

Wet winter plays havoc with rural roads.

I don't recall ever getting so many complaints about roads as I've had this winter.

The particularly heavy downpours of rain have washed gravel into culverts, blocking them and washing out banks and roads. No sooner is gravel put into a pot hole than the hole reappears within days.

The weather has also delayed rehabilitation projects on sealed roads; one

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of the more visible examples being Parkhurst Road in Parakai, which now looks like a patchwork of repairs.

Parkhurst Road was due for complete rehabilitation months ago but this sort of work cannot occur in the wet because the seal won't adhere - the

fact that patches pop off within weeks demonstrates this problem.

As soon as the weather improves the work will be able to take place. Rehabilitation of roads is an expensive job and it is better to do it once, properly, in the dry. Continuous patching may seen like a waste of money but that would be nothing to redoing an entire road to see it fail within months because it wasn't done in the right conditions.

four lanes, and a roundabout built at the SH16/Coatesville-Riverhead Highway intersection. Between Huapai and Waimauku the narrow bridges will be widened and turning bays installed to make it safer at the intersections of Foster, Station and Factory Roads.

Where possible, flexible roadside safety barriers will be installed to protect vehicles from dangers such as power poles, trees and deep ditches.

Cyclists and pedestrians will also welcome the changes, which will include a sealed road shoulder at least 2m wide.
