### Hair yesterday, gone today Community

First the pony tails were lopped off, then the longest hair was cut, and finally the clippers came out for the close shave.

That was the process for three young Waioneke School students who had their heads shaved to raise money for Leukaemia & Blood Cancer New Zealand (LBC).

Brooke Christie, Katie Kruger, both aged 11, and 12-year-old Dana Nasmith were taking part in LBC's annual 'Shave for a Cure' fundraising event.

Prior to their 'shave day' on March 18, Brooke and Katie had raised almost \$900. Dana joined in on the day to become the third official member of the school's team. By the time Helensville News went to print, the trio had raised more than \$2540.

Many of the school's other pupils showed their support by sporting colourful wigs, crazy hairdos or weird hats for the day, and a further \$170 was raised at the school - a creditable effort for a school with a roll of only around 80.

Deputy principal Di Megler - who donned a purple wig for the event - says she "can't believe how brave" the girls were to cut off their locks, and says the girls "look beautiful" with their shaved heads. Jayne Morris from Celtic Rose in Parakai did the honours with the clippers.

On average six New Zealanders are diagnosed with a blood cancer or related condition each day. LBC receives no government funding.



# health day

A fun-filled community health event will be held in Parakai on Saturday, April 13.

Called Kaipātiki Ki Kaipara, it's being run by Whiti Ora o Kaipara, a charitable trust under the auspices of the Ngā Maunga Whakahii Development Trust, in conjunction with Auckland Council.

It will be held from 9am to 4pm at Kaipātiki Reserve (formerly Parakai Reserve).

"The main purpose for the Kaipātiki Ki Kaipara event is to showcase the large amount of health providers we have access to within our community," says Ngā Maunga Whakahii's Keanna Johnson-Phillipps.

Health providers taking part will include the Waitemata District Health Board's Bowel Screening Programme, Te Ha Oranga, Breast Screen Waitemata, and the Kaipara Medical Centre.

Entertainment will include live music, kapahaka performances, bungees, and Pacifica performances, and there will be food available.

Harold the Giraffe from the Life Education Trust will be on hand for children to have their photos taken with, St John Youth will be running activities, and HIPPY South Kaipara will be organising craft activities.

Keanna says they are expecting 200-plus people to attend the event.

### 20 years of Helensville News

### Christchurch remembrance

Around a hundred locals gathered at the Springs Road landing in Parakai at sundown on Tuesday, March 19 to remember the 50 people who died in the Christchurch mosque terrorist attack the previous Friday.

After some brief words from Helensville's Fiona MacBride and a performance of the song 'The Rose', those attending went in orderly groups onto the pontoon and threw flowers into the Kaipara River, where they drifted down river in the glow of the sunset.

The group then sang the hymn Abide with Me and the national anthem, and then the halfhour ceremony finished with a prayer from pastor Tim Forlong of Helensville's Magnify Church. Two armed police watched the ceremony from a respectful distance.

### College sets NCEA records

Kaipara College has set record pass rates in its school-wide NCEA results for 2018.

The University Entrance pass rate increased by 8.5 percent to 57.8 percent, a record for the school. And the NCEA Level 3 pass rate of 74.5 percent was also a school record.

Principal Steve McCracken says both those results "significantly outperform" both the national average, and the average for Decile 4 to 7 schools.

The college's Level 2 NCEA results showed a pass rate of 78.1 percent, which equals both the national and decile results.

"Nearly 32 percent of our Level 2 students received Merit or Excellence endorsements, which is very pleasing," says Steve.

He says the school is only one percent off setting a record for NCEA Level 1 passes, which currently sit at 77.3 percent.

"I am delighted that we have continued the upward trend and our overall results continue to improve."

Last year the New Zealand Qualifications Authority changed the way it reports results publicly. From 2018, all students who attend a school for 70 days or more are counted in public reporting.

"This will streamline the way each school presents their data to ensure transparency of information and clarity to the public," explains Steve.

#### Back to the future for Shelly Beach

The clock is being turned back on the Shelly Beach waterfront.

A new 'natural' seawall and five new groynes to prevent erosion, along with placing new sand along 450m of the beachfront, are aimed at bringing the beach back to a more natural, pre-1950s state.

A large mangrove colony developed at the northern end of the beach after a seawall

was built in the late 1950s. Part of the seawall and some mangroves were successfully removed in a trial in 2012, and now the rest of the seawall has gone, along with the removal of 3200sq.m of mangroves. Brought-in sand has opened up the beach north of the jetty and restored harbour views.

Finishing off the project will be a pathway joining the northern footpath with the high use area at the carpark, café, and new beach north of the jetty.

The project has taken longer than anticipated due to difficult foundation conditions on part of the site, and the challenges of working in an area frequently inundated by the tide. The work has been

underway for the last nine months, and is hoped to be completed by the middle of July.

Cost has also increased from the initial forecast of \$1.5 million due to additional stormwater and drainage work being needed, and changes to the construction methodology.

But Matt says it is much more difficult to find somewhere suitable for the recording studio.

"Our vision is to find an old place with heaps of character, like an old barn, hall, warehouse or church," he says.

He describes as "pretty intense" the emotions when he shut down RedRoom's Helensville premises for the last time, but says he is "determined to continue" with the business.

"I would love [it] to stay in the Helensville area. There is incredible artistry in the area.

"We want to continue making great music and taking it to the world."

As well as producing awarding-winning records for the likes of Troy Kingi, whose album won Best Māori Pop Album at the 2018 Waiata Music Awards, RedRoom Studios has been used extensively by local musical talent, notably many of the musicians to come out of Kaipara College.

Matt now has three records which he can't finish, and has had to cancel other upcoming jobs.

Ideally he would like to find somewhere that has some accommodation so artists can stay over while they are recording. It also needs a good power supply and internet access.

### Kindergarten kids learning all

Learning about sustainability and how to care for our planet and the oceans is coming early to some local children.

Parakai Kindergarten in Fordvce Road. Parakai is focussing on sustainable practices within the kindy environment this year - and head teacher Ebony Taitimu-Moore says the children are right behind it.

The teachers have identified a raft of ways they, the children and their families can work towards being more sustainable.

"It's so relevant now. There's so much information about being waste-free, caring for our oceans, reducing our rubbish, so we kind of ran with it here at kindy, because kindy can produce a lot of rubbish with so many children," says Ebony.

"It's something all the teachers are quite passionate about, and a lot of our parents are passionate about it too, which is awesome."

The kindy started by encouraging wastefree lunch boxes, and pretty much straight away most parents bought containers or beeswax or cloth wraps for the food.

To avoid waste like non-recyclable soft plastics, parents are encouraged to buy

foods like yoghurt and crackers in bulk and transfer them to reuseable containers for the lunches. If the children do have soft plastics in their lunch boxes it is sent back home for the parents to reuse or dispose of.

That's been a really good process because it has made parents aware of how much rubbish their child's lunchbox is producing," says Ebony. "Some things can't be helped, and we totally get that, but many things can be bought in bulk."

Next term the kindy children will be making their own beeswax wraps, packaging them in threes to be sold to the families as a cheaper alternative to storebought ones.

"If we can make it easier for parents to gain sustainable resources that makes it a win-win," says Ebony.

Now completely plastic bag free, this term the kindy introduced reusable wet bags for children to keep in their bags for when they have wet or dirty clothes. They are available for \$5 on enrolment, or parents can provide their own.

Leftovers are sorted into pig and worm scraps, and recyclable containers like yoghurt pots are put aside for use in the art area. Office administrator Nadine Phillips takes pig scraps for her neighbour, and the kindy has two worm farms for the rest.

Parakai Kindergarten is also into 'upcycling', using old wooden pallets to make bicycle stands and storage units for the plastic pipes they use in the sandpit. They are also reusing items such as cable reels, jars and crates.

"It's all about trying to upcycle what we can as opposed to buying new all the time," says Ebony "and showing the kids we can be more innovative."

The children have spent a lot of mat times learning how plastics affect the oceans, and with teacher Sharon Clayton have been sewing small drawstring fabric vegetable bags for parents to use instead of the disposable plastic ones provided by supermarkets.

"They are a hit [with the kids]," says Ebony. "They take a wee while to make and we can only make a few at a time, but they sell out straight away."

Helensville librarian Anne Coppell has also spent mat time with the children, providing resources, songs and books covering the 'reduce, reuse, recycle' ethos.

And in late March, 30 kindy children

visited the Waitakere Transfer Station's Zero Waste Zone.

The kindy has also moved to using more natural resources for the children. Instead of plastic playdoh tools they now use wood or metal ones, and glass jars instead of plastic containers for paint. At meal times the children are using glass cups and real cutlery rather than plastic, and Ebony says they have proven really capable, with next to no accidents with dropping glasses.

Parakai Kindergarten recently signed up for the nationwide Enviroschools scheme, which provides guidance on how to be more sustainable and natural.

The teachers took part in their first workshop in March.

Next term there will be a waste free parent evening with Kate Meads.

The hui will have two main themes, covering a pest-free Kaipara catchment programme that will be introduced, and asking: 'Where do we get 160 million trees over the next three years?'.

### Price matching a big local plus

Many people have the perception our local shops are more expensive than the big chain stores in the city - but that's not always the case.

Paper Plus Select owner April Ashton is keen to point out - especially to business owners - that she can usually match anyone else's price.

What's more, goods can be ordered online if wanted, and delivery is free - and often the same day - for business customers. Delivery is also free for private customers for any purchases over \$50.

"We're willing to negotiate [with business clients]," says April. "We want and need their business."

April has worked at the Commercial Road shop, which also doubles as the local Post Shop, Kiwibank and Lotto store, since she was 18. When she began there 15 years ago it was simply called Helensville Stationers. In 2004 it became a Take Note shop, and around a year before April purchased the business then owner Manu Patel converted it to the Paper Plus Select brand.

It's been a full-on couple of years since April took the reins at the end of 2016. She married husband Daniel only a couple of months after buying the business, and now splits her time between the shop and looking after her baby.

"It's been hard having the baby and not being able to work as much," she says, "but I'm supported well in that respect."

There are six other staff, five of them parttime, helping run the store.

Like many local businesses, Helensville

Paper Plus Select has to compete with malls and big chains, and April says the business is holding its own, if not growing as fast as she had hoped.

One area of growth has been supplying local school students with their stationery packs. Currently Helensville, Kaukapakapa and



Waioneke schools take part, and April expects others to join the programme.

Also popular have been community events, such as an evening with Nadia Lim, and a visit from Craig Smith, author of The Wonky Donkey children's book.

### Hire-a Hubby for almost any job

From jobs as small as changing a tap washer or a fluorescent light bulb through to fencing and major home revamps, Gerhard Heslop can help.

Since October he has run the Hire-a Hubby franchise based at Kumeu, which covers the Helensville and South Head areas as well. And because at this stage there is no franchisee for the area north of Helensville, he can help out in Kaukapakapa and the surrounding areas as well.



The well-known company has a 25-year reputation in both home and commercial maintenance work.

On any given day, Gerhard - Gerty to his friends - can be found painting, cleaning out gutters, doing small carpentry jobs, gardening, or even making major repairs to a property damaged by bad tenants.

He has developed close working relationships with local tradesmen for those jobs that require a plumber, electrician or building work that needs council approval.

It's a big change from his background in commercial management. Swiss-born Gerhard has lived much of his life in Australia, but his work has seen him employed by a major German engineering company, working for four y ears in China for a refrigeration company, and more recently in the security industry here in New Zealand.

He has lived since 2005 on a 10ha lifestyle block at Taupaki, and has done all the maintenance and fencing work there - a background which he says has given him a good grounding in hands-on DIY.

With plans underway to subdivide that land a project he will manage himself - Gerhard wanted more of a lifestyle type of job, working based from home and away from city traffic. He looks at it as semi-retirement.

At this stage he is concentrating mostly on residential work, often working alongside landlords doing repairs on rental properties. But he is also available for commercial work, and recently did floor repair work at Domino's Pizza in Huapai as well as work at the Massey Medical Centre.

An advantage of being part of the national Hire-a Hubby chain is that people needing work done can book their jobs in online at www.hireahubby.co.nz, with a guaranteed 48 hour response time.

### Four clinics cover all animal care options

What started out in the 1950s as part of the Kaipara Dairy Factory, as a small veterinary practice just for dairy farmers, has grown into a major local business with four clinics employing 50 staff, including 15 vets.

In 2014 Helensville Veterinary Services merged with the Kumeu Vet Clinic to form Vets North. Then in 2016 more expansion came, first with the purchase of the vet clinic at Waimauku, then with the establishment, from scratch, of a brand new Vets North branch at Silverdale.

There is also a rehabilitation centre at Huapai with an animal physiotherapist and a veterinary behaviourist.

Each clinic has its own specialties. Helensville is more farming oriented, Kumeu specialises in equine health, while Silverdale handles primarily household pets.

Mark Anderson, one of the four principals in Vets North, says each of the 15 vets have their own areas of expertise, and whenever possible the best vet for a specific job is assigned. And he points out that for callouts, mileage charges are made from the clinic nearest the patient - so if a horse vet comes to Helensville from Kumeu, for instance, mileage is only charged from the Helensville clinic.

Amalgamation has enabled Vets North to invest heavily in both continued education for staff, and in technology.

All clinics now have digital x-ray machines, and there is ultrasound equipment, including for horses. There are in-clinic laboratories now, too, enabling many tests to be done in-house, resulting in faster treatments.

The clinics are also geared up to regularly perform endoscopic (key-hole) surgery, and orthopaedic surgery.

"It's a professional service, providing best outcomes for our customers. We really do take that seriously," says Mark.

He says pets - mainly dogs and cats are still the clinics' biggest clientele, with equine business growing while the number of commercial farm animals are reducing.

"What's changed over the last 10 years?" asks Mark. "Pet pigs are common

now, and pet chickens". He says rarely a week goes by without treating a pet chook.

### Community well-being at heart

Audrey Jenkins has been involved with the Helensville Art Centre since before it even existed.

She was one of a group of local artists who decided back in 2004 to form an incorporated society, and came up with the name Art Kaipara. Today, with close to 100 members ranging in age from just 7 years to people in their 70s, that organisation oversees the latest version of the Art Centre, aiming to improve the accessibility of art to everyone in the South Kaipara.



When co-ordinator Pauline Denton started at the Art Centre around 10 years ago - in its previous Puriri Street location - she made the decision there should always be an exhibition on. And that's been the case, with a different exhibition held every month.

She has also run a wide selection of workshops for locals, covering everything from painting and flax weaving through to movie making. Pauline also co-ordinates the art activities of the Mt Tabor Trust, with residents meeting at the centre for four sessions each week.

Helping since the start of this year is new manager and exhibitions curator Heather Steadman, who took on her role following a year on the Art Kaipara Board and brought with her experience and qualifications in managing a not-for-profit organisation. She also used to manage the upstairs gallery at Lopdell House in Titirangi.

Keen to draw on Art Kaipara's vision of having the community's wellbeing at heart, Heather says some future exhibitions are planned to speak to that vision, including one titled 'Good Grief' which will be designed to help people normalise grief, and another musical-themed one to coincide with Music Therapy Week.

School holiday programmes are being developed, and it's hoped they will be expanded into after-school programmes as well.

For April Art Kaipara members have a chance to put their on works on show, and in May there will be an exhibition held in conjunction with the Helensville Community Recycling Centre, putting on show 'rescued' art that has come into the centre, plus possibly some up-cycled items.

This new service runs from Helensville, stopping in Kaukapakapa in Opoto Place opposite the school, and in Waitoki opposite the community hall. It finishes at Silverdale terminal.

This bus service is part of the Rodney Local Board's Transport Targeted Rate program.

At the same time the Helensville to Silverdale service launched, a new service from Wellsford to Warkworth started, so there are now services linking Wellsford, Omaha, Algies Bay, and Warkworth to Silverdale.

In the middle of this year a further service will be added providing another east/west route with buses running from Westgate to Albany via Riverhead and Coatesville. These will be followed by park'n'rides in Kumeu and Warkworth.
