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Helensville businesses sweep awards

Helensville businesses have again shone at the North West Country Business Awards, taking out all the top prizes along with five of the eight category awards.

South Kaipara Good Food was the hero of the awards night, held in late September, taking out the Supreme Award along with the Environmental Excellence Award, Best New Business, and the category win for Best Not For Profit.

The other top prize, the People's Choice Award, went to Commercial Road retailer Paper Plus Select.

In the individual business categories, Skydive Auckland won in Recreation, WOW Sushi in Hospitality, Helensville Mechanical Services in Manufacturing and Trade Services, and River Valley Meats in Rural Services.

Highly Commended gongs went to Parakai 4 Square in the Retail category, Parent Aid North West in Not For Profit, and Cleaver's Edge in Rural Services.

The other three category winners were: Marbles People & Culture Hub Huapai (Business & Professional Services); Aneia Warner Salon Kumeū (Health & Beauty); and Stihl Shop Kumeū (Retail).

The supreme winner was chosen from the winners of the eight business categories, and the judges called the winner, South Kaipara Good Food, "an outstanding organisation."

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They went on to describe SKGF as h a v i n g "excellent marketing strategies w h i c h contribute greatly to the success of this non for profit.

"You have phenomenal community involvement. You deserve to be very proud of the

work and your achievements to date - and the future looks very positive with people like you doing what you do."

"We are truly humbled by the judges' feedback and their recognition of what we are doing to address food insecurity within the South Kaipara community," says SKGF chief executive Gemma Donaldson.

"It was one of the biggest privileges of my life to stand up and represent our team and those we support. A special thanks to those who have supported us on our journey and lent a hand with time, advice, or a donation. It means the world to us and the whānau we support."

In the closely-fought People's Choice Award, the judges said it was good to see how winner Paper Plus Select kept in contact with its customers during lockdown to keep business going, adding: "being recognised for good results in tough times [is] a great achievement."

"I'm incredibly proud and incredibly humbled," says Paper Plus Select owner April Ashton. "The love that we've received has been great." River Valley Meats, which recently opened a retail outlet in Commercial Road, came in for praise from the judges for its win in the Rural Services class.

"The way your business connects with its community is a mixture of passion and strategic partnerships. Good planning, business agility, and genuine hard work are obvious."

Commenting on WOW Sushi's win in the Hospitality category, the judges said it was "great to see a business able to get growth even while being hit by Covid and lockdowns. Overall, a great business with thought going into sustainability, community support, and those medium term goals."

Parakai-based Recreation category winner Skydive Auckland also received the judges' kudos, describing it as "an exceptionally diverse and innovative business."

"You have a great many achievements, good market awareness, multiple streams of activity, and goals you hope to achieve, all of which will add to the sustainability of the business."

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Blues Festival coming to South Head

After nearly two decades of planning, the first Auckland Blues Festival will be held at South Head on Saturday, November 12.

The event's line-up reads like a who's who of the blues music scene, including leading New Zealand musicians like Midge

Marsden Band, Ash Grunwald, and Fiona Boyes & The Fortune Tellers, along with top Australian artists like Jeff Lang and Nathan Cavaleri.

The acts also include Albi & The Wolves, Cat T u n k s F t . Blackstratblues, Jimi Kara & The Psychedelic Blusos, Kokomo, Blue Collar Band, Laura Collins & The Back Porch Blues Band, Original Sun, Paul Ubana Jones, The Caramelos, The Flaming Mudcats, The

Solomon Cole Band, and Lil Lach, with even more expected.

Many of the artists have played internationally.

To be held at Leighton's farm in Wilson Road, South Head, the one-day, one-night festival will feature two stages, the White Stag stage complete with shade canopies and rain cover, and the Blues Jam Bar, between them covering all styles of blues music.

There will be food trucks, boutique licensed cocktail bars, buses to and from site as well as free camping, glamping, and other luxury on-site accommodation options.

The bar and entertainment for campers will continue for around 90 minutes after the main stage closes, and breakfast and coffee will be available in the morning for overnighters.

The event is being organised by the same people who put on the three-day Aum New Year's Festival, a music, dance and art event held at the same venue.

They say the Auckland Blues Festival will feature "one of the best sound systems in the world" and describe the event as "a beautiful family focused, boutique and bespoke blues festival designed for discerning tastes."

Describing the Wilson Road venue as one of the most beautiful festival sites in the country, they add: "expect a day in paradise and to be treated like family."

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Plans afoot for Good Food project

After winning four awards - including the Supreme Award - at last month's North West Country Business Awards, South Kaipara Good Food isn't resting on its laurels.

Chief executive Gemma Donaldson says a number of new initiatives will start in the coming months.

Kai Grow is one such initiative, focused on community, urban and market gardens.

Kai Grow team leader Jo Ogilvie is working with local organisations to establish the community garden concept in the area. Plans are underway to augment existing food gardens, with local schools like Helensville Primary and Waioneke School already on board with the project.

In October, another project commences at the Health Trust campus.

James Scott, general manager of the Helensville District Health Trust says: "we are very excited to be able to support this vital community initiative. There are areas of under-utilised garden space at the Trust's campus on Commercial Road and Porter Crescent, so it really makes sense. To be able to support the health and well-being of the community by providing space to grow fresh kai really aligns with the Trust's principles."

Thirdly, an educational programme called Kai Learn will kick off its spring/summer schedule in the coming months. Classes such as cooking with food rescue, saukraut for gut health, cheese making on a budget, and preserving and jam making are already planned.

Gemma is immensely proud of her team. "Only with enthusiastic and clientfocused staff, volunteers who contribute

more than 320 hours a month, and a community that truly cares, are we able to achieve what we do."

SKGF's Kai Assist programme (previously called Kai Collective Te Awaroa) has provided more than 4000 food parcels since November 2021. Financial hardship in our community has seen a significant rise in demand for the parcels, with roughly 125 headed out the door each week - a figure which is growing.

New footpaths for Kaukapakapa

Two new footpaths are being planned for Kaukapakapa to better link the village with the school, community hall and local residential area. Rodney Local Board has set aside \$3.25 million from the Rodney Local Board Transport Targeted Rate fund to design and construct the footpaths, which are aimed at improving pedestrian safety and access in the village.

A 420m footpath on the eastern side of SH16 to the north of the village will link North Crescent with the village centre and will include two pedestrian crossings, while a 164m (new and upgraded) footpath on the west side of SH16 from the village shops to Kaukapakapa School and the hall will include a new pedestrian crossing, a new parking layout, and outdoor amenity space near local businesses.

AT will work with Kaukapakapa stakeholders and Waka Kotahi over the next few months to develop a detailed design, with construction planned to start early next year.



St John service awards

The Hato Hone St John Helensville Area Committee held an afternoon tea in early September to recognise and celebrate service awards received by local members an event long-delayed by Covid 19.

Presentations were made by Northern Area patron, Sir Richard Blundell KStJ

following an introduction by by Helensville Area Committee chair Dr John Elliott OStJ.

The St John Service Medal is awarded after 10 years of service and every five years, a bar is added to it. The Service Medal is unique as it is the only one still issued which features the profile of Queen Victoria, under whose charter of 1888 the Order of St John was established as a Royal Order of Chivalry.

A 10 year medal was presented to Ali Constable, who has been an ambulance officer at Helensville since 2008 and has served as an Auckland training tutor. She is currently the Helensville operations support officer.

Marcel Hendricks, who started in Helensville as a volunteer ambulance officer in 2005 and who is still at Helensville Station as a Volunteer EMT, received his 15 year bar, as did John Issott. John started with St John in 2006 with the Helensville Area Committee and since 2014 he has been the treasurer. He also works in the Op shop and is a member of the Regional Order Affairs Committee. For his services to St John, he was made a Member of the Order, by the

They can be awarded to external individuals, societies, groups, or businesses, as well as to St John members.

Recipients receive a framed certificate, signed by the Governor General, who is the St John NZ Prior, along with St John Chancellor, Mr John Whitehead CNZM KStJ. Eve's award, from last year, was one of the last acts by Dame Patsy Reddy GNZM QSO DStJ.

Eve received her award for organising and leading welfare support for the operational crews, both locally and monthly at Auckland hospital, overnight on Saturdays, throughout the year. Since the start of Covid, with the huge demand on ambulances, crews were often not getting a proper break. Taking hot drinks and food to the hospital bay enables them to have a short respite and recharge.

After the presentations, family and friends joined the recipients for an afternoon tea to recognise the support they give which enables members to do their roles.

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Turning the Tide walk to raise funds to help children, youth

Helensville-based Kindred Family Services is inviting the communities of North West Rodney to take to Muriwai Beach on Sunday, November 20 to help raise \$30,000 to support children and youth.

The Turning The Tide fundraising event has options of a 17km walk or 5km gentle walk on Muriwai Beach, and for the first time this year there is a 1.5km whānau trail with fun activities for children and families to enjoy.

Kindred invites locals to choose the walk which best suits them, and encourages groups of five or more to enter the teams event and competing

the teams event and compete for prizes, recognition, and social status.

Kindred clinical manager Kim Wills, says Kindred has accepted, on average, seven new referrals per month over the past year for children and youth facing complex and overwhelming challenges in their lives. That's 84 young people annually requiring at least 10 counselling sessions for themselves and their families.

That's a significant increase on previous years - a symptom of the trials of Covid 19 and Kindred believes referrals could easily triple given the growing demand, which is stretching the organisation's funds.

"Our work with tamariki and rangatahi in our communities has demonstrated to us that they are brave, intelligent, resourceful, and hopeful for a better future," says Kim.

"We can work together with schools,

families, and our community to provide the necessary care and support they need to heal, build on their strengths, and grow into thriving, confident citizens."

Ana Christmas, executive director at Kindred, also highlights how, not only are the counsellors in high demand but there is a need for more spaces for therapeutic sessions to take place, both in and out of the school environment. She hopes the community will get behind the fundraising effort and help Kindred to create these spaces so it can reduce the barriers to support for local children.

"With \$30,000 Kindred can deliver an additional 300 therapy sessions for children, youth, and their families," says Ana.

"This intervention will work alongside existing programs and tools that promote a loving, safe, and supportive home environment through these challenging times."

With the help of local organisations, including Generation Homes, Rollercoaster, and Lions Waimauku, Kindred are already partway toward their \$30,000 target, and are optimistic the community will show up on the day and help get them all the way there.

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Descendants of settler family celebrate

Almost 40 descendants of early Parakai settlers James and Catherine Archibald gathered in Helensville last month to celebrate the 140th anniversary of their family's arrival in 1882.

With one member coming from as far afield as Australia, they visited the family grave at Helensville Cemetery, toured through the old Archibald homestead, and visited Helensville Museum.

James and Catherine were both born in 1851 in Scotland, James training as a shipwright.

Shortly after their marriage in 1876 they emigrated to Port Pirie in South Australia, where James worked as a ship builder and their first two children, Betsy and Maggie, were born.

Then in April 1882 they came to New Zealand, buying a 140 acre farm at Parkhurst, which they named Glencairn after the family farm in Scotland.

James built first a small shack, and then a proper house, which still exists today at 85 South Head Road. He tried a range of cropping on the farm, and raised cattle, sheep and horses, and also did repair work on the tall ships which arrived in

the Kaipara Harbour.

The couple's other four children were

born at Parkhurst, James III (1882), Adelaide (1886), Alexander (1889), and Chloris (1891).

The children attended Parkhurst School, located on the corner of South Head and Evans Roads and which closed around 1920. James served on the school committee there for 10 years, and later on son James III (known as Jim) did too.

Daughter Maggie was a teacher at Te Pua School for a time, riding side-saddle on her horse from the family home at Parkhurst.

Son Alexander had died at the age of 9 and was buried at Helensville Cemetery. When James died from cancer in 1910 he was buried in the same plot, as was Catherine when she passed away some years later.

After James' death Jim took over the family farm, staying there until 1921 when the entire family moved to Papakura.

The family get together was organised by Glenn Archibald, who says it was "a very successful event and brought the current day families together, and hopefully will rebuild some broken connections.3

The descendants also visited family locations around Papakura, and Glenn savs a 150th anniversary based there is planned.

He gives special thanks to Kevin and Dawn Bayliss for allowing the visitors to tour the old family farmstead where they now live, to Helensville Museum for opening specially, Helensville St John for the use of their premises as a gathering point, the Auckland Council northern cemeteries staff.

Lodge will open during arts festival

Helensville's Duke of Albany Lodge affectionally known as 'The Duke' - will be open to the public during Arts in the Ville over Labour Weekend, October 22-24.

As well as being the venue for the Helensville Floral Art Club's display, Lodge members will be on hand to answer the question: 'what lies behind the closed doors?'

Ask many people about Freemasonry and the response is usually about secret societies and handshakes. Over the weekend, Lodge members will explain to visitors the layout of the Lodge Room, its symbolism, the various roles, and progression within the Lodge structure. The hope is to attract new, younger members.

The Floral Art Club will hold its display in the Lodge's refectory, and the Lodge Room itself will be open from 10am to 2pm, with a free sausage sizzle from 10.30am to 1.30pm.

The Duke was named after Queen Victoria's son Prince Leopold, and has been a presence in Helensville for 138 years.

It was established in September 1884 and met at various venues in the town until a dedicated Lodge was built on the present site in Kowhai Street. That original building was destroyed by fire in 1939, and its replacement, still in use today, was completed in 1941.

The Lodge Room is a representation of King Solomon's Temple. The rituals

undertaken comprise allegories and symbolism which along with various stone mason's tools are used to communicate the principles of Freemasonry, with a focus on self-improvement.

As well as the Lodge Room the building incorporates a refectory or dining room with attached kitchen and store room.

Regular monthly meetings, originally held on the full moon to allow members arriving on horseback to find their way home in the dark, is made up of two distinct parts - a formal part incorporating any associated ritual held in the Lodge Room, and a meal in the refectory for socialising.

While handshakes of recognition form an important part of the ritualised initiation of candidates to the different degrees of Freemasonry, the layout of a Lodge Room and the foundation of the rituals themselves are freely communicated.

The Armistice commemoration will be the Kaipara Memorial RSA's last event for 2022, as it has to close for seismic strengthening work being undertaken by Council contractors, which start on November 16.

Now, RSA members have to pack up and store all of the building's chattels and memorabilia until it reopens, hopefully at the end of February next year.

KMRSA president Rex Keane says the closure is far from ideal.

"We were just getting back on our feet after having to close over the last two years for the pandemic lockdowns and operating under the traffic light system, which has only just been abolished.

"However our veterans who have gone before us endured far harder times, so we shouldn't sweat the small stuff."

Museum getting back on track

Helensville and District Historical Society was set up in 1968 to preserve material pertaining to the area's history, and the Helensville Museum was set up to house that material.

The museum is now coming out of a lengthy closure forced on it in 2019 by pests, mould, and rot attacking the collection.

That now dealt with, the museum's volunteers are turning their attention to its original purpose - to house archival material and display the artefacts which tell the stories of the district's history - and of course make them accessible to the public.

Archival material is still in the process of being scanned, digitised, and crossreferenced by Society President Toni Walmsley and other volunteers, while rejuvenating the museum's courthouse, the oldest building in Helensville and the first of its kind in New Zealand, has been a priority for other volunteers.

Two displays are now on show there, Kees van Uden's models of historic

transport featured in the June 2022 issue of *Helensville News*, and the district's predigital Post Office, which has been upgraded with an illustrated timeline detailing stories from the past.

Plans are in place to add more features like a hologram, a soundtrack, and a copy of the original Kaipara Land Court minute books.

Helensville Museum will be open during Labour Weekend's Arts in the Ville, with a display of Jeff Thomson sculptures.

Visitors will have the chance to be photographed in period costume using the tin-type photography methods of the 1800s. The cost per photograph is \$125 and people can provide their own costumes and props or hire a museum period costume for \$5. Photographs can be booked online at: www.helensvillemuseum.org.nz.

The museum has one paid employee, administrator Carol, with everything else done by volunteers with a range of expertise. There's currently an opportunity for a volunteer with experience in building work such as construction and gib installation. Anyone interested can email Toni at: helensvillemuseum@xtra.co.nz.
