## \$17m upgrade to water treatment plant

A group of locals took a tour around Helensville's recently upgraded wastewater treatment plant in late November.

The plant, which treats wastewater from around 1600 homes and businesses in Helensville and Parakai, has had a \$17million upgrade to vastly improved the

The upgrade included installation of New Zealand's first operational 'membrane aerated biofilm reactor' (MABR) - relatively new technology for the biological treatment of wastewater.

Watercare technology innovation manager Kevan Brian says the old plant had an oxidation pond and ultra-filtration which wasn't consistently meeting consent requirements for the level of ammonia in the

discharge - to the e x t e n t t h a tAuckland Council i s s u e d a nabatement notice in late 2021.

"We needed to change something and we needed to do it quickly," he says.

"We'd been trialling an MABR at our innovation centre at the Māngere Wastewater Treatment Plant. While it hadn't been done before in New

Zealand, we already had the data to give us confidence it was the right solution for Helensville."

Inside the MABR tanks is an army of bugs that eats the carbon in liquid wastewater and reduces the amount of organic compounds and ammonia nitrogen.

"These bugs need oxygen to survive, so we pump air in to keep them happy and healthy. In the MABR, membranes hang down inside the tank like spaghetti, and the bugs cling to the membrane surface. We pump air in, and oxygen diffuses through the requirements, but its actual performance sees ammonia levels in the treated wastewater about 1.4mg/l.

"Ultimately it means we're now discharging much higher quality treated wastewater to the Kaipara River."

Other benefits of the MABR system are that it's much cheaper than a membrane bioreactor, it's quieter, it has a smaller footprint, and it reduces the greenhouse gas emissions from the biological treatment process by up to 50 percent.

The treatment plant's upgrade also included additional ultra-filtration capacity, the installation of an automated standby generator to keep the plant running during power outages or surges and work to strengthen and restore the capacity in the oxidation ponds by reinforcing the embankments.

Our project manager Tony Morley says the urgency of the project meant a different approach was needed.

"Because we were fast-tracking this project, the designer, contractor, and supplier had to work together to agree who could most efficiently detail the design. This resulted in our contractor detailing up elements of the design to maintain the tight construction programme.

"We used off-site fabrication to speed up the pace of construction, with the construction team focussed on the on-site works," Morley says.

"The two MABR tanks were built off-site and installed in just one day - with no concrete platform and no piles. This worked really well because the site has very little space, being squeezed between the Kaipara River and the oxidation ponds. They can be picked up from the Art Centre until Saturday, December 9, painted or decorated as you like, then returned to the centre by December 14 to go on the Christmas tree.

December is the gallery's annual Cash and Carry exhibition, with all artwork under \$250. This exhibition runs from Wednesday, December 6 until Friday 22, with a 'Christmas Party' opening event on Friday, December 15 from 5pm to 7pm.

The Art Centre is holding two workshops in December, both with Jacky Pieper. The first is a Wine and Paint evening on Thursday, December 7 from 5pm to 7pm, with all material provided and a \$55 per person cost. Jacky will also hold a Christmas Table Centrepiece workshop on Saturday, December 16 from 10am to midday, cost \$65 with all materials provided. Email: manager@artcentrehelensville.org.nz to book.

Helensville Art Centre will close on Saturday, December 23 and reopen on February 1 next year with its first 2024 exhibition titled 'Kaipara Awa - A River That Connects Us.'

Art Centre manager Yvonne Abercrombie says the Kaipara River "is as much a symbol as a physical body of water" and the exhibition will reflect what the river means to us. Open to anyone and in any media, it's a broad subject which she says can be interpreted as imaginatively as desired. ## **New Shelly Beach playgrounds**

Work on two new playgrounds costing around \$500,000 at Shelly Beach is hoped to begin next January.

The two projects are expected to take three to four months to complete, depending on weather. It was decided to defer starting the work until after the Christmas holiday period so the current playgrounds could still be used.

The existing lower foreshore playground is being removed completely, and the area reinstated with grass and native trees. The current paths will be kept, along with the barbeque and one picnic table.

A completely new playground will be built on the seaward side of the current one. Play equipment will include a hammock and climbing frame, a double swing set, a tunnel, a double slide, a dolphin rocker, a spinner, and climbing hand holds. Part of the playgound will

have bark surfacing, and the remainder a 'wet pour' rubber safety surface.

A sand area will have a sand digger, sand unit, and concreted items to dig for.

There will be three new picnic tables, a bench seat shaded by a specimen tree, and painted 'find me' images on the concrete path to encourage users to explore the park. The whole thing will be finished off with the planting of shrubs, groundcovers and specimen trees.

On the upper playground, beside the Shelly Beach fire station, the existing basketball court will be retained, but reshaped into a full-sized court.

A climbing frame will be installed over a

bark surface, two picnic tables put in, and a concrete area with painted games and skate grinding boxes created. Like the lower playground, the existing path will be retained and painted with 'find me' images of birds and plants.

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# Quadski a potential game changer for Coastguard

Coastguard Kaipara is trialling a groundbreaking addition to its rescue fleet - a Gibbs Quadski, courtesy of Gibbs Farm.

With unique capabilities and versatility, the Quadski is poised to significantly enhance Coastguard's operations on the Kaipara Harbour, ensuring more efficient and effective responses to emergencies.

The Kaipara Harbour has challenging characteristics including tidal fluctuations, extensive sandbanks, and narrow, shallow channels, all of which can pose significant operational challenges.

Despite Coastguard Kaipara's wellequipped 8.5m rescue vessel, it has limitations in accessing some areas of the harbour during mid-to-low tides.

The Gibbs Quadski is an amphibious quad bike/ATV which converts into a

personal watercraft. It boasts a top speed of 72 km/h on both land and water, features a proprietary marine jet propulsion system, and can transition between land and water in about five seconds. Developed and manufactured by a Detroit-based team, the Quadski shares features with the Gibbs Aquada amphibious car and uses a marinised version of a BMW 1.3-litre engine.

Its features are tailormade for the Kaipara,

offering several key benefits which could revolutionise Coastguard's rescue efforts. These include:

- The Quadski can effortlessly traverse shallow waters without putting the primary rescue vessel at risk of stranding - essential for ensuring Coastguard's ability to help people without delay.
- It allows for fast launching, ensuring a rapid response to emergencies at almost any tide and from multiple boat ramps. Currently, Coastguard Kaipara

can be affected by tides, other boat ramp activity, and waiting for a full crew to assemble; the Quadski's abilities can overcome those issues.

• The Quadski gives Coastguard the ability to deploy a single crew member for immediate response and assessment while the rest of the team is assembled and the primary rescue vessel launched.

A recent incident on the Kaipara Harbour underscores the need for the Quadski's capabilities. In that situation, a jetski with a flat battery was stranded northwest of the Concrete Marker in challenging conditions an outgoing tide, strong southwest wind, and just one hour until dusk. The jetski operator had limited communication options and insufficient clothing.

Various options were considered for rescue including waiting for the wind to push the jetski, trying to float a line, or calling for a rescue helicopter. Volunteers did eventually manage to pull the jetski to safety, but it's clear the Quadski's capabilities could have made a significant difference in that scenario.

The trial will continue until around May next year, encompassing both winter and summer conditions, to thoroughly evaluate the Quadski's performance and potential in a range of scenarios.



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## **Community Patrol relaunched**

The South Kaipara Community Patrol has been relaunched, and Helensville Community Constable Melissa Haven is calling for more volunteers to join the patrol.

The patrol was set up in 2009, with members of the Helensville and wider Kaipara community volunteering their time over the following decade.

Recent disruptions such as Covid and its associated lockdowns, weather events, and some key members moving away meant the patrol went into a hiatus for a short time.

But now, with a new vehicle kitted out with all new gear, and a new chairman, the South Kaipara Community Patrol has made a comeback and can again be seen patrolling Helensville and the surrounding areas.

The patrol acts as 'the eyes and ears for police', working closely with and supporting local police by being highly visible in the community and reporting anything suspicious.

We rely on community members volunteering their time to help and keep our community safe, and with their support it can

assist with freeing up police resources", says Melissa.

The minimum requirement for volunteers is one patrol a month, and you can choose a day and time which suits you.

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'Wool' theme for **Helensville Show** 

Next February's Helensville Show will feature a special 'Wool - NZ's Hero Fibre' theme - one that had been planned for this year's event which was cancelled because of flooding.

The theme will be incorporated into many aspects of the Show and will illustrate the journey of wool from sheep to end use, including history and some interactive areas for Show visitors.

As well as demonstrations from former world champion blade shearer Allan

Oldfield, there will be a demonstration of throwing and processing a shorn fleece.

Brightside Spinners will be spinning wool and will have interactive

activities. There will be a weaver with a loom for visitors to try out weaving, and the local knitting group will have a 'Give it a Go' for Show visitors to try out knitting.

There'll be a fashion parade featuring

woollen clothing, ranging from historic items from Helensville Museum and homespun items, through to modern clothes from the likes of Icebreaker and Swanndri

A re-creation of an old shearing shed is planned, featuring old shearing items such as combs and hand pieces, shears, grinders, wool presses, moccasins, and old paperwork. Dozens of old wool brand stencils have been gathered together and will be on show, as well as printed in a folder to

create a record of local farms and their brands.

Visitors will even be able to try their hand at creating a custom wool brand.

## Work begins on rescue centre

Construction work is well underway on the new Coastguard Kaipara Rescue Centre at the end of Springs Road, Parakai.

It's hoped the 15m x 8m building will be at lock-up stage by Christmas.

*Helensville News* first reported on plans to build the new Coastguard home back in August 2020, and a groundbreaking 184sq.m. 'fast response' garage for Coastguard Kaipara's 8.5m rescue craft Winstone Rescue, the large 4WD New Holland tractor used to tow it, and the coastguard's second, smaller rescue craft. The third bay will eventually include a workshop, storage, locker room and a bathroom, with a mezzanine above featuring

a training room, office and kitchen.

The move from its present location at the Kaipara Cruising Club in Mill Road to the new Parakai site should bring a number of major benefits.

Most important will be faster response times. Being significantly closer to the mouth of the Kaipara River, Winstone Rescue will able to reach the harbour to respond to distress calls at least 10 minutes faster - a potential vital difference in a life-

threatening emergency.

The Springs Road boat ramp will also give Coastguard Kaipara true 24-hour launch capability. Currently at Mill Road, volunteers are unable to launch for a threehour period around low tide. When called out during those times, they have to tow Winstone Rescue by tractor to the Parakai ramp anyway, adding to delays.

The near-new ramp and floating pontoon at Parakai will enable fast, easy transfer of casualties to medical staff.

The new home also comes with a huge financial benefit. Coastguard Kaipara has been given a 30-year lease on the land beside the Springs Road wharf carpark for just \$1 per year from Auckland Council, saving the organisation almost \$17,000 a year in rent - almost half a million dollars over the 30 years which will now be available for important maintenance, purchasing and upgrading equipment, and training.

Regular weekly training will also benefit with the volunteer members being able to spend more of their two hours of on-water training actually on the harbour, and less time spent reaching it.

However, things are looking more positive for Kaipara Medical Centre now. We now have much better staffing levels, and are pleased to let our community know we are open to new enrolments again.

We have a wonderful team of three doctors and two nurse practitioners, as well as a fantastic support team.

The doctors are myself (Dr Kathryn Elcock), Dr Dean Foster, and Dr Halima Nati - our newest addition to the team. The nurse practitioners are Beth Poi, who has been with us since 2022, and Sacha Cowell, a nurse practitioner who joined us in October this year.

Nurse practitioners are nurses who have many years of experience and have gone through advanced training to be able to offer care in a very similar way to a GP in primary care.

Both Beth and Sacha can be your lead care provider and offer continuity of care for people with long-term health problems. They can offer standard medical and ACC consultations, prescriptions, repeat prescribing for long term medications, investigations, referrals, and medical certificates - as well as offering the holistic approach that a nursing background brings.

Our current Nurse Prescriber, Kath Dix, will also be undertaking further training to work towards becoming a nurse practitioner.

We have also welcomed Jo Reid to the team in the role of Nurse Lead at the clinic. Jo is well known in the local community and has brought energy and drive to the team here to further improve the services and level of care that we offer. Many of our wonderful team of nurses including Sarah, Courtney, Renee, and Jenna will be well known to you, and they continue to offer nurse-led appointments for immunisations, wound care and dressings, liquid nitrogen, ear suction, blood pressure, and diabetes checks.

Many patients will have also met Roz Ryan, our Health Coach, and Robert Vallom, our Health Improvement Practitioner. They are invaluable members of our team, and between them they offer support with diet, lifestyle, exercise, mental health, stress and sleep issues, and referral to community-based support when needed - and their services are free for all enrolled patients.

The team at Kaipara Medical Centre is led by Practice Manager and Helensville local, Pettina Coates, while our administrative team who welcome you at reception support the clinical team and can help you with your enquiries.

We believe our recent newcomers will help ease some of the pressure experienced over the last few years and improve access for those in the community who need to see us.

Currently the wait for a routine appointment with one of our GPs or nurse practitioners is around one to two weeks. For same-day urgent medical needs or accidents, we run a daily duty clinic from 9am to 3pm Monday to Friday for our enrolled patients.

If you feel you need to be seen urgently on the same day, then please call reception from 8am to see if this option is right for you. You will be given an appointment time to see one of the nurses, and then reviewed by the duty doctor or nurse practitioner that day as needed. This service is intended to manage timely issues, such as sore throats, coughs and viral infections, urinary infections, acute pain, breathlessness, as well as accidents.

## Local cleans up in business awards

Ask Andy Cummings what his favourite win in the NWC Business Awards was and he has to stop and think - but just for a minute.

Is it one of his category wins, getting the best new business award, or taking out the Supreme Award?

"To get the Supreme Award was the ultimate," he says. "I've had Kumeu Meat Processors for six years, and a lot of business owners will relate that there have been a lot of challenges over that time," he adds, citing both Covid and two floodings.

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## Kaipara ki Mahurangi MP hoping for positive change in electorate

Local MP Chris Penk hopes that now being in government, rather than in opposition as he has for the past six years, will bring about some positive changes in the Kaipara Ki Mahurangi electorate he won with a huge 19,500 vote majority.

"It would be great for the electorate to have the attention it deserves with investment in infrastructure, [like] transport, namely the roads but also public transport routes and services.

"I'd love to crack the nut finally of passenger rail potentially up to and including Helensville, but maybe less ambitiously initially to Huapai or Waimauku. It seems to me \_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_\_that's an obvious

opportunity.

"And while the decision rests with local government, if there's any ability to strike a deal at central government level or get on board some other parties that might be interested, I'd love to have a part in that."

He says longplanned works to improve SH16 also need to happen.

"It's not going to get any cheaper and we need to get on with it. But also a Kumeū bypass which we specifically talked about during the campaign. At some point we have to acknowledge that

SH16 as the main drag for so much density of population is just unmanageable on its current footprint."

Now a 'real' MP, Chris says he is looking forward to the next three years.

However with a swathe of ministerial responsibilities just announced, he may have to spend more time away from the electorate. While he missed out on a position in cabinet with three parties vying for just 20 spots, he has been appointed Minister for Building and Construction, Minister for Land Information, Minister for Veterans, Associate Minister of Defence, and Associate Minister of Immigration.

"I really hope and expect that I can still attend all the local events like Helensville & Kumeū shows and schools that want me to walk through the doors.

"I think you can't be an effective minister or representative unless you're connected to your local community, and can easily lose touch in Wellington I think," he adds.

"I hope to be able to report progress regularly to the electorate in terms of the things we can do for the good people of the North West."

Of the last six years, he says: "I think I'm more aware of how much good work goes on in the community that's nothing to do with politics or government. It is certainly very humbling in the role as MP meeting with people who are doing an incredible job of looking after their fellow kiwis."

At number 18 on the National Party list, Chris is becoming a more senior member of the party, amplified by the fact he's been the senior whip for the past couple of years, which has meant working closely with party leader and now Prime Minister Christopher Luxon, and deputy Nicola Willis.

He describes the role of whip as "a little bit of pastoral care, morale and discipline,

which sounds like a funny kind of mix. You need to be at the centre of the coming a n d g o i n g s o f different MPs and you end up having visibility with a lot of what's going on."

He describes his military background as being "not unhelpful" in that whip role.

As for work/life balance he points out h is two young children - Austin, 6 (born just two days before Chris was first e l e c t e d) and Chelsea, 2 - have n e v e r k n o w nanything other than a father flying off to Wellington every few weeks.

"It's always a balance to juggle that, but I would says there are a lot of people in this area who work long hours and sometimes multiple jobs and have to do shift work or be away from home, so I don't think we're anything special in that regard."

A keen Warriors supporter, Chris was thrilled with the team's performance this year, and as a huge cricket fan has closely followed the Black Cap's fortunes too.

Despite his 19,500 vote majority at the election, you won't hear the National MP refer to Kaipara ki Mahurangi as a 'safe seat'.

"The area has traditionally been very kind to us," he says. "I never use the term 'safe seat' because I think that sounds arrogant. 2020 proved it's possible to lose a seat that has previously been 'safe'.

"I think if you were to turn a 'safe seat' into a marginal seat or one that could be lost, that would be on the back of appearing to take voters for granted."

Chris says he's listened carefully to the issues raised with him over the past six years and taken them onboard and advocated for them. Now he has the opportunity to deliver and says locals should hold him to account if he doesn't.

"I would hope and expect people would do that."

## local board matters

So what is happening in Parakai at the Kaipātiki Reserve?

A fair question really given the difficulty the Te Poari o Kaipatiki ki Kaipara Board and Auckland Council contractors have had in the last year.

Guy Wishart and I are the Local Board representatives on this co-governance board and our first year in this role has been an instructive experience for us both.

The delays brought by Covid were followed by extreme weather events and a combination of windblown trees and soft ground have made the work of contractors a

#### Muriwai beach closure

Auckland Council's Planning, Environment and Parks Committee has banned motorised vehicles from Muriwai Beach during high-risk and peak summer periods for the next three years.

This summer, the beach will be closed to vehicles from Friday, December 29 though to Monday, January 15 next year.

Vehicle access will also be banned during Guy Fawkes for 2024 and 2025 to mitigate fire risk to the area, as well as over those years' peak summer periods.

Physical barriers will be installed to manage the closures, and signage will go up before the restrictions come into effect.

Further measures are being considered for the future, including more vehicle restrictions and charging for permits, along with fines for unpermitted vehicles.

real battle. That said, the wonderful design was begun in 2015 with the work of a group of Unitec students, and completed through several collaborations and revisions by Resilio Studio in May 2020.



the Reserve Management Plan which was supported by the Financial Plan and approved budget.

The stage one capital works approved by Auckland Council are nearing completion with delivery expected before the end of this summer in early 2024, but a large part of the reserve is expected to reopen by Christmas.

Even in this partially completed state Kaipatiki Reserve will be an attractive destination for visitors and locals alike. It's a long-overdue enhancement of the environment and facilities that had become very tired and distressed prior to the Treaty settlement and establishment of the co-governance board.

Based on what Guy and I have seen this is a shining example of what co-governance should be.

The momentum that has been built to date is extremely impressive. The contribution of the partners, Nga Maunga Whakahii o Kaipara, and Auckland Council are apparent throughout, and our South Kaipara community will have a great deal to celebrate and enjoy once the reserve reopens.
