Sculpture to mark town entrance

Helensville is to get a dramatic town entrance sculpture, courtesy of the Helensville Lions Club and renowned local sculptor Jeff Thomson

Standing seven to eight metres tall, it's hoped it will be located on one of the grassed areas in front of Helensville Museum in Mill Road.

The colourful sculpture will depict an aerial view of the Helensville area, showing the Kaipara River, railway, and main roads and township areas. It will be mounted up high on a support designed to look like a kauri tree trunk.

The sculpture was the idea of Lion Dennis Cummings, who says Lions members voted almost unanimously for this design from several options provided by Jeff Thompson.

"I've often thought over the years that we should have something," says Dennis. "There's nothing [currently] to welcome people to the town.'

He adds the Lions club is "very keen" on the project, which should

help engender pride in our town, while at the same time recognising the work of probably

Helensville's most famous artist.

The Lions Club has pledged \$20,000 toward the project, which Dennis expects to cost \$60,000 in total. A large part of that cost will go on things like engineering design, resource consent, and health and safety, plus the main structural construction which will have to be done by a qualified engineer.

Dennis expects it will take 12 to 18 months to raise the rest of the funds for the sculpture, and then Jeff says it will take another "good six months" of work to actually create. The Auckland Council public arts team is helping Jeff with all the regulatory requirements.

Jeff stresses the existing design is a

prototype "which will definitely change".

'That's what I like, to keep changing it until I come up with the best design," he says. "It's very early days, but I think the concept will work well."

He has met with local iwi and is looking to incorporate Māori references into the design, probably in the form of printed-on patterns on the structure. The whole structure will be "enriched with layers of patterns and designs"

While based on an aerial view of the area, Jeff says the final version won't be to scale and will be quite abstract.

"It will have realism, but also abstraction."

Because of its large size it will probably be made in aluminium rather than the corrugate iron Jeff is better known for - and the design is full of holes which will help reduce wind resistance.

The prototype model plus design sketches will be launched to the public, at a yet to be determined

location, during Arts in the Ville over Labour Weekend.

Jeff has works in collections, museums and art galleries throughout New Zealand and overseas, and this latest project won't be his first 'town entrance' job either - he created in 2000 the well-known giant gumboot sculpture in Taihape.

Temporary closure of Kaipātiki Reserve facilities

The public toilet, old playground, and campground at Kaipātiki Reserve in Parakai will be closed until late November for construction work on the redevelopment there.

While that work is on, public toilets are still available in Helensville at Creek Lane and Rautawhiri Park.

The project is being undertaken by Te Poari o Kaipātiki ki Kaipara, a cogovernance between mana whenua, Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara, and Auckland Council.

"We appreciate our community's understanding and cooperation during the temporary closure period," says Te Poari chair Tamaki Mercer.

When complete the redeveloped reserve will feature:

- A new playground which incorporates māra hūpara (traditional Māori play elements);
- A basketball court;
- Barbeque and picnic table spaces;
- New public toilets, paths, and enhancements to the reserve entrance and parking;
- Improved campground access;
- Soft landscaping and planting;
- Improvements to site drainage.

Te Poari aims to deliver a world-class recreational facility which aligns with the

unique natural surroundings of Kaipātiki Reserve, incorporating sustainable design elements to maximise benefits for the community.

Tamaki sees the park's transformation as an important investment.

"This major capital works playscape project at Kaipātiki Reserve represents an important investment in the local community's recreational infrastructure," she says.

"The playscape will serve as a dynamic and innovative space, designed to inspire cultural connections with the stories of Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara, imaginative play, physical activity, and environmental awareness that forms a major kaitiaki (caring) for the taiao (environment)."

Signage has been placed around the reserve to guide visitors and pedestrians towards alternative routes during the construction, and safety fencing has been installed. Display boards with more detail about the project are situated at the reserve.

"We are all humbled to witness the transformation of this historic place and are committed to bringing together top designers to connect Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara pūrākau (stories), encourage active outdoor space and a deep connection with the natural environment," says Tamaki.

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Kaukapakapa School 150th

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Alan Hargreaves passes away

Alan Arnold Hargreaves July 21, 1939 - September 3, 2023

Alan Hargreaves, who was involved in many aspects of the local community including the Helensville Rugby Club, the Helensville Railway Museum Trust, ratepayers associations, the Odd Fellows Lodge, the Masonic Lodge, and the Helensville A&P Show, passed away in early September.

Alan was born at Takapuna on July 21, 1939. The middle of three brothers, he was

raised on a farm at the end of Onereri Road near Kaiwaka, and by all accounts had an idyllic upbringing.

He was educated at home via correspondence for the first few years until a local school opened. During those first years his parents often had to hunt high and low for him when it was lesson time; he had a favourite hiding place under a daisy bush beneath the windows. That was also a go-to place for smoking a stolen cigarette!

The school on Onereri Road was a one room affair catering mostly for the

extended Hargreaves family and was still standing there in a paddock through till the late 1980s.

After his primary school years, Alan went to boarding school at Kaikohe where he studied among other things agriculture, something he was very passionate about his entire life.

He then worked on the family farm, specialising in raising pigs, taking them to shows and winning lots of awards including Royal Show grand champion several times. He even judged livestock at some shows.

There are stories from around that time of drives with mates to dances in Whangarei

and Auckland, masking the smell of alcohol on his breath not because of the police but because the girls wouldn't dance with him if they smelt it. He was a big hit with the ladies at least according to Alan himself!

The Hargreaves' homestead was by the water's edge of a bay in the northern part of the Kaipara harbour, which lead to a passion for boating - particularly speed boat racing. The family would travel with their launch and speed boats to attend regattas all over the harbour. At one stage he held the trophy for the fastest boat on the Kaipara. People cruising the

history in his later years.

Alan and Joy married in St Matthew's Church in Helensville on April 20, 1963, and celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary this year.

They lived in a small cottage on the Hargreaves family farm until moving to Helensville in 1965 to share milk for Joy's father, and a couple of years later they purchased the farm from him.

Life wasn't easy financially in those days and Alan worked hard to ensure his wife and sons Keith and Rod were provided for.

In 1980 the farm was sold and the family • To Page 7

moved to a 25 acre block at Parakai.

Although this brought about a change in occupation Alan could never shake his farming passion, so he established the Kaipapa Red Devon cattle stud on his new land, and in the following years purchased other blocks of land to extend the herd.

He and Joy also grew feijoas for market, a legacy of his experiments with growing kiwifruit, grapefruit, tamarillos, and feijoas in their earlier years on the dairy farm.

After the move to Parakai Alan wasn't quite sure what he wanted to do for a living.

He was talked in to becoming an insurance salesman by a friend and was within days of signing up when approached by someone from Wrightsons Real Estate who suggested selling real estate might be his calling - which turned out to be the case.

He worked with Wrightsons selling real estate in the local area for next few years, then shifted to Bayley's Real Estate handling commercial and industrial property throughout West Auckland - saying that he loved his job so much he would dream about it at night. His crowning achievement was brokering the land deal that led to the establishment of the Westgate shopping centre.

Alan retired from real estate in 2007 but still called in to the office once or twice a week for the next few years, helping to broker deals and mentoring new estate agents.

A busy man, Alan didn't let retirement slow him down much. He was always off to one of the properties to check stock, feed hay, mend fences, weed spray, or attend meetings. He told his nurses in the hospital that he couldn't possibly stay there as there were too many things that needed doing.

In 2008 Alan and Joy built a new house on one of their blocks on the South Head peninsula with sweeping views over the Kaipara Harbour. They lived there until

earlier this year when they moved to the Parkhurst area to be closer to town.

Alan loved travel, both in New Zealand and overseas. He and Joy travelled extensively overseas and in later years took family with him to share those experiences. Right up to the end he was planning a family holiday to Fiji and it was only his ill health that stopped that happening.

Alan was also a rugby fanatic. He played the game from a young age right through until no longer physically able to. When he and Joy moved to Helensville the local rugby club was defunct so, with a group of fellow enthusiasts, he set about establishing what is today known as the Helensville District Rugby Football Club.

He coached and managed teams and worked hard in the administration of the club and was made a delegate to the Auckland Rugby Union. Son Keith remembers in the 1970s being shown the Ranfurly shield, secreted away under Alan's bed!

In later years Alan was made a patron of the rugby club, and was also a founder of the North Harbour Rugby Union. In his final weeks at home he had been eagerly looking forward to the beginning of the 2023 rugby World Cup.

In 2003 Alan took on the role of leading the running of the Helensville Railway Station from the late Arnold Gosling and his partner Gail Oxton. They had purchased the station in the early 1990s from NZ Railways. Under Alan's leadership a Charitable Trust was formed to preserve the 1881 station, which is registered as a historic place.

Alan managed the railway station building tenancies, ensuring a steady stream of income used to maintain the station building-the 'old girl' as Alan called it.

Next, he led a project to construct the Helensville Railway Museum, which opened in 2013 and welcomes many visitors, both locals and visitors to the town.

He resigned as chairman of the Helensville Railway Station Trust after 20 years earlier this year due to ill health. He became Patron of the Trust, and will be honoured by the museum building being named for him.

At the Helensville A&P Show, as well as exhibiting his Red Devon cattle, Alan used to organise the entertainment, was the announcer before Hilty, and helped organise the 100th Show in 2002.

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First CAB co-ordinator calls in

Jennie and Glynn were treated to a tour of the new Commercial Road premises and a cuppa and chat with Rani and the day's rostered volunteers, Frank Bosch and Andrea Kumerich. Photos were taken for the organisation's archives.

As well as being Helensville CAB's first co-ordinator in 1991 Jennie also started the town's budgeting service and food bank.

The visit was something of a walk down memory lane for Jennie, who said in her day there were only four volunteers and the main client enquiry was people seeking help with paying bills.

The elderly couple were impressed with the spacious new premises compared to the tiny venue the CAB originally operated from.

Jennie began her CAB 'career' as a volunteer at CAB Mt Eden as she wanted to give back to her community. She was awarded a QSM for voluntary service.

The Thomas' have lived in Whangamata for 32 years, and called into the CAB following a visit to see family in Whangarei.

In an email the day after their visit, Glynn said it had been a boost for Jennie's morale and added he felt all volunteers should receive a QSM medal.

Hūhana LYNDON

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Million tree milestone passed

The Kaipara Moana Remediation (KMR) programme has passed the milestone of one million native trees planted or contracted to go in the ground this winter.

As of September 20, the figure stood at 1.1 million, with 28 local businesses and nurseries accredited as KMR suppliers.

The numbers for the programme to date are impressive:

- An estimated 180,000-plus hours of new work created;
- 57 people trained as KMR Field Advisors (many from local iwi/hapū);
- More than \$11.3m in project value underway or completed (supporting local, nature-based employment);
- More than 550km of fencing completed or contracted;
- 97,000 hectares managed under KMR Plans;
- 300 hectares planted or contracted to plant in natives.

KMR leader Justine Daw says she is proud of her team and the community for hitting such a notable target just 18 months after the KMR programme began.

Work is now underway to fast track the planting of the next million trees, with KMR working with more than a third of the estimated 1,500 pastoral landowners in the Kaipara Moana catchment.

Now the KMR programme is expanding its efforts by partnering with landowners to

Free diabetes course

Justine says in its first 18 months of operation KMR co-funding has largely focused on fencing and planting projects near waterways, but this will now expand into the planting of erodible hill slopes.

"To achieve our goal of halving sediment into the Kaipara Moana over the long term, we need to support a wider set of sedimentreduction activities," she says.

"This will include co-funding for native forest planting and assisted native regeneration, protection of existing native forests, and support for the establishment of poplar poles and some selected exotic species that are demonstrated to help stabilise moving hillsides."

KMR is now calling for Expressions of Interest by November 13 from landowners who want to take action across the 6000km2 Kaipara Moana catchment.
