Local art going to Buddhist monastery in Taiwan

In what he describes as "the high point in my art career" Helensville wood artist Ray Scott has two of his artworks going off to be displayed at the Fo Guang Shan Monastery, the largest Buddhist monastery in Taiwan.

Ray, along with three other Helensville artists - William Robert Boyd, Leda Daniel, and Ruth Sumner entered artworks in The Art Salon, a prestigious annual art show held in the Fo Guang Yuan Art Gallery located inside the Fo Guang Shan Buddhist Temple at Flat Bush in South Auckland.

The exhibition, which coincides with their Cherry Blossom Festival, runs until Saturday, November 30 and will be visited by thousands of people from around the country and overseas.

The four had to deliver their artworks to the gallery a week before the exhibition opening on October 12. Ray entered five of his intricately turned wood art pieces, including two large wall hangings.

"They told me they had not had anything like my art and were excited to include it to the show.

"One was a silhouette of an

albatross cruising the Southern Ocean. The other was a circular piece, representing ripples on a pond, both made from swamp kauri," he says.

Just 24 hours after delivering the artworks, Ray was notified that both pieces fitted into their Buddhist beliefs, and they wanted to present them to the visiting Head Abbot to signify a special connection between New Zealand artists and their headquarters in Taiwan.

"They asked me as the creator of the works to help make the presentation at the grand opening [of the exhibition].

"This was the high point in my art career - particularly as these pieces are being planned to be displayed in the Fo Guang Shan Buddhist Monastery in Taiwan."

Ray was duly on hand when his two large works of art were presented to the Most Venerable Hsin Bau, the worldwide Head Abbot of the Fo Guang Shan Buddhist Order, based in Taiwan, who was in Auckland for The Art Salon's official opening.

At the exhibition opening Hsin Bau spoke of how art can bring "kindness

and beauty" and wished everyone "can go feeling enriched after seeing the artworks."

Gallery curator Abbess Manshin explained The Art Salon is a platform for cultural and spiritual exchange, and voiced her appreciation of the artists for their "vibrant contributions."

The Art Salon is now in its eighth year, and the exhibition aims to foster harmony through art. This year 668 artworks by 179 artists are being exhibited - 129 artists featuring in the main Salon currently showing, and the remaining 50 in a Summer Art Salon in January.

Fo Guang Shan is an international Chinese Mahāyāna Buddhist organisation and monastic order based in Taiwan.

Auckland's Fo Guang Shan temple at Flat Bush is a serene complex with

4ha of landscaped gardens, a vegetarian café, and an extensive multiroom art gallery. Opened in 2007 it is the largest Buddhist temple in New Zealand, designed in the architectural style of the Tang Dynasty.

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Plenty of fun for kids at hall reopening

Bouncy castles, games, ice cream, sandwiches, and cake - what more could a small child want?

The hundreds who turned up for the 'official' reopening of the Helensville War Memorial Hall, organised by Rodney Local Board as a Family Fun Day rather than a formal ribbon cutting ceremony, were treated to just those as they got a chance to look around the refurbished building.

Outside there were four large bouncy castles, one of Helensville's fire engines, Mr Whippy, and a sausage sizzle. Music played both outside and inside the hall where children could play games like quoits, giant Jenga, and giant snakes and ladders.

Both Helensville Library and the RSA were also open, while downstairs in the Arts Centre children could take part in various arts and crafts activities including paper boat making in preparation for Arts in the Ville's Kaipara Classic race.

Mark Dennis from the Rodney Local Board was very happy with the turnout, estimating around 500 people turned up.

Everything was free and fully funded by RLB.

"We felt it was essential that the whole community felt welcome and included in the event and we didn't want money to be a barrier," says Mark

"The weather was perfect and it was wonderful to see so many children and young families attending and joining in the activities."

"There were a lot of positive comments about how bright and spacious the revamped hall looks. The new modern paint scheme was a big hit, with many people commenting on how it breaths life into the town. Along with the bright red of the RSA and their new decking area, we expect the new look of the building to bring in more public than ever before. It really feels like the heart of Helensville has returned," Mark adds.

The hall building was closed for around two years during which time an \$8.3 million upgrade was made to address weather-tightness issues and improve seismic resilience.

"The facility had been assessed as being earthquake-prone back in 2021 and the hall and the RSA building needed to be strengthened to address the seismic risk," says Rodney Local Board chair Brent Bailey.

"Considerable structural upgrades have been undertaken with the piling, roof and walls strengthened. Weather-tightness issues have been addressed along with large amounts of asbestos safely removed during construction. The building's subfloor also had to be redesigned and rebuilt.

"On behalf of the local board, we are grateful for our community's understanding and patience during the construction."

The extensive work included:

- A new roof, new deck and work areas for the RSA rooms;
- New ceilings, wall linings, lighting and electrical installed in the hall and RSA;
- New security alarms, fire and access systems in the RSA and hall areas, and fully compliant fire exits;
- New wall heaters and refurbished toilets in the hall;
 New exterior cladding in several areas, and
- painting of the interior and exterior of the building;
- A new wheelchair accessible ramp to the car park.





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RSA reopens after 22-months

After 22 long months of refurbishment work on the Helensville War Memorial Hall building - a project originally only planned to take six months - the Kaipara Memorial RSA has finally been officially reopened.

The reopening ceremony on Saturday, October 12 was attended by a good size crowd. VIPs who spoke included local MP and Minister for Veterans Chris Penk; Graham Gibson, president of the Auckland District RSA; and Bob Pettis, vice president of the Auckland District RSA, chairman of the West

Auckland RSA Homes Trust and of the Ranfurly Trust Grants Committee.

"I can't tell how pleased we are to be back into our refurbished clubrooms," said RSA president Rex Keane at the reopening ceremony.

"It hasn't been an easy 22 months, having to lay off our bar staff, caterers, cleaners, admin and accounts clerks, and having to pack all our possessions into shipping containers back in December 2022.

"The only profit we have been able to make was one meat raffle a week at the Bowling Club."

Rex said the RSA had worked hard with Auckland Council and contractors to ensure the clubrooms were future proofed and fit for purpose. However he did point out the RSA wasn't happy with some of the design aspects, especially those forced upon them because of compliance issues - in particular the size of the new deck facing Commercial Road, which the RSA had hoped to be double it's eventual size.

"The bureaucracy to lease the small strip of land for the deck included an application of over 100 pages to Council, and their report back to the Local Board was double that number of pages! The whole process took over a year.

"This was ironic, as the RSA originally owned all this land, but gifted the land to the Helensville Town Board in 1948 as part of the scheme to build the War Memorial Hall and RSA clubrooms.'

The lengthy closure had other unforseen aspects, too.

"Unfortunately our opening was delayed several times, with equipment that hadn't been used for 22 months refusing to work or blowing up. But I guess it's nothing that \$20,000 won't fix!"

A highlight of the ceremony was the presentation by Chris Penk of a life membership to associate member and former KMRSA president Noel Bodle.

Noel had followed in his father Bill's footsteps. Bill Bodle was a World War Two veteran and RSA president in 1994 and 1995; Noel became president 22 years later in 2017.

"I am not sure if I should praise him or curse him," quipped Rex. "When he was president he asked me to come and give him a hand for a couple of weeks - yeah right!"

Rex described how despite the lengthy closure and lack of income, the KMRSA had continued to carry out its core functions of veterans' welfare, commemoration and remembrance.

"With the help of our members and the support of the local community, we held two poppy appeals in 2023 and 2024 raising over \$5000 each year.

"We held ANZAC Day services in 2023 and 2024 with dawn parades at Parakai, wreath laying at the Soldiers' Cemetery, an ANZAC breakfast at the Bowling Club, and a civic service at Kaukapakapa.

"We commemorated Vietnam Veterans' Day and Armistice Day in 2023.

"In conjunction with the Remembrance Army, we identified all the veterans' graves in the Helensville public cemetery and marked each with a large wooden cross," adds Rex.

Among those coming in for special recognition at the ceremony was Jane Burmester of Burmester Realty, who provided the RSA with free use of an office and equipment during the closure.

"Ag days are really important for rural schools; they are a great community day," she explains.

Calf Supreme Champion was won by Federico Kern, while Lamb Supreme Champion was taken out by Ella Pitcon.

Waioneke is Lynette's first principalship. Originally from Auckland's North Shore, she has more than 20 years' experience in teaching and has spent the past years at various schools in the north Kaipara such as Paparoa, Tinopai, and for the most part Maungatoroto. It was there she completed her leadership training and Master's in Educational Leadership degree.

She had decided she wanted her first principal role to be at a rural school when she saw the Waioneke job advertised.

"I fell in love with it. It's gorgeous," she says, taking up the position in April.

She has spent her first few months at the school getting involved in the local community. Known to the school community as Whaea Lynnette, she has been actively engaging in local community life - everything from participating in school events like the school disco and cross country day at Shelly Beach, to taking part in local events such as the South Head Golf Club quiz nights and the odd Friday netball game.

Lynette has put out a survey to find out what the community wants from their school. It's a survey for everyone, not just parents but for family, current and former students, and members of the public to complete.

"Being a new principal it's a great opportunity for the community to tell me what they want." she says, adding it will enable her to develop a strategic plan which aligns with the community's desires.



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Waitematā Hunt to celebrate 75th locally

The Waitematā Hunt will celebrate it's 75th anniversary over five days in March next year with a range of events around the Helensville area.

Organisers are hoping to attract as many former members as possible; the club currently has around 35 members, and could expect up to 100 to take part in the event. Non-members will also be welcome to take part.

The riders will camp at the Helensville Showgrounds, registering on Wednesday, March 19. There will be a burger night and

b a r i n t h e m a i n showgrounds building that first evening.

They will compete at various events for the Stirrup Cup over four days.

On the first day of activities, Thursday, March 20, riders will take part in a hunt over Raphoe Farm in Old North Road, a property which features views across to downtown Auckland. A hunt breakfast will be provided, and there will be a pizza night at the showgrounds in the evening.

Friday will see riders stay at the showgrounds and compete in hunters trials, followed by a 75th Anniversary dinner, auction, and a 1980s themed party.

On Saturday, March 21 the club will hunt over the Kidd and Bradly farms off State Highway 16, just a few kilometers south of Helensville - properties they have been riding over since the Hunt's formation in 1950. That evening participants will head to Parakai Springs for a relax in the hot pools.

For the final day of the celebration riders will head out to Shelly Beach where they will hunt over a farm with views across the Kaipara Harbour.

Waitematā Hunt is based at a property in Martins Access Road at Makarau, and holds hunts from March until late May, with two or three puppy hunts pre-season to bring young dogs up to speed.

The hunt uses an artificial scent which is dragged across the countryside during the hunt meet. The hounds, huntsman, hunt master, and the riders follow the scent over jumps or through farm gates. Hunts take place primarily in our local area, from Coatesville to the south, South Head to the west, and Glorit to the north.

Rugby club renovations

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councillor comment

As the end of the year approaches, how is Auckland Council performing under Mayor Wayne Brown and his election promise to "Fix Auckland"?

Financially the Auckland Council Group performed better than it has under previous mayors, particularly with the additional challenges from last year's weather events.

Auckland has had a large cost of living impact - with high inflation and interest rates affecting the daily lives of many residents and ratepayers.

However, the big financial positive is that Auckland Council's costs are now getting under control. Council is back on track in terms of being in a good position to tackle some of the bigger physical and financial challenges Auckland has put off for too long.

These include;

- Fixing Auckland's infrastructure although the government's problem of fixing the SH16 traffic congestion remains a major concern;
- Increased transport funding and activities to deliver better, more efficient public transport. The interim busway seems to be performing reasonably well, despite the fact that buses regularly get caught up in traffic;
- Building the financial and physical resilience of the region following last year's weather events. Flood prone areas will continue to flood, however the flood warning systems have improved as have our local emergency response plans;
- Providing fairer funding for local boards so more local community facilities can be built in our area;
- Getting Council finances in better shape for the future. This included repaying debt from the proceeds of selling poorlyperforming airport shares, and also making sure Auckland's port is making a profit for ratepayers.

Underpinning this progress is the fact council staff and management have taken on board Mayor Brown's determination for there to be a laser-like focus to stop wasting money. He is not there yet, but he has made a good start within the bureaucracy, including dramatically cutting out the upper management layer.

The Mayor is particularly pleased to see this layer of bureaucracy and duplication removed. This goes hand-inhand with moves to find savings and reining in operating spending, while not compromising the activities and services the Council provides to Aucklanders.

At the beginning of the financial year, Council faced a fragile future with a potential budget hole.

But it has been a good year for the Mayor, and ratepayers, because he has stemmed an incoming financial tide.

Additionally he has done a deal to get extra money for Auckland for weather recovery and resilience from central government. He has also put Council in a stronger financial position for the future with the establishment of the 'Future Fund' to mitigate rates rises for Aucklanders if hit by another major weather bomb.

The congestion on State highway 16 remains a major concern, however; the government's suggested solution of an alternative NZTA highway still remains unfunded with no start date. This is disappointing, and although this is not a Council or an Auckland Transport project, the Mayor is keen for the government to build it, and to restore a better quality of life for local residents.

All-in-all, not a bad effort by Mayor Brown during his first term - but of course, there's more to do and he will need to continue to work hard to fix Auckland, and deliver more for Helensville and the Norwest working with myself, the Rodney Local Board, and our local resident and ratepayer groups.

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Feedback sought on shoreline

Locals have until Tuesday, November 12 to provide feedback on Auckland Council's draft Shoreline Adaptation Plan (SAP) for the Kaipara Harbour.

The Kaipara Harbour SAP area extends for roughly 400km of the southern Kaipara Harbour and covers South Head, Waioneke, Shelley Beach, Parkhurst, Parakai, Helensville, Kaukapakapa, Makarau, Kakanui, Glorit, Mangakura, Tauhoa, Wharehine, Tāpora, Port Albert, and Te Hana.

The draft plan looks at how the council can respond to coastal hazards and climate change over the next 100 years through adapting council-owned land and assets like boat ramps, sea walls and coastal walkways, and by promoting the preservation and restoration of the coastal environment for future generations.

The plans lists four potential scenarios for every location along the coastline and Kaipara River basin, further divided into short-term (up to 20 years), medium-term (20-60 years), and long-term, (60-100 years).

Those four options are Hold the Line, whereby the existing coastline would be fixed and protected; Limited Intervention with assets and land maintained and managed; Adaption Priority Areas, which require further planning to manage risks; and No Active Intervention, which leaves nature to take its course.

Motorbike 'poker run' to raise cash for Helensville Fire station

Helensville Volunteer Fire Brigade will be the recipient of funds raised by this year's 5 Station Poker Run on Sunday, November 24.

The annual motorcycle run, now in its 18th year, can attract up to 200 motorbikes, generally a broad mix of Harley Davidson, Triumph, Norton, Ducati, and Japanese bikes. There are often some older, classic bikes taking part as well as a few trikes.

Riders follow a scenic route around the area, calling in at each of the five local fire stations at Helensville, Shelly Beach, Kaukapakapa, Kumeū, and Muriwai. At each station riders receive a playing card, and at the end of the event the riders with the best poker hands win prizes.

The host station - this year Helensville - is the start and finish point for the run, so locals will have a good opportunity to view a wide range of motorcycles.

Registration starts at 8.30am with the ride itself beginning at 10am. Riders pay \$35 to take part in the run (\$30 if pre-booked online), all of which goes to the host station. Tickets prices include a meal at the end of the ride. The event can raise up to \$6000 for the recipient fire brigade.

The five volunteer fire brigades work together on fire callouts around the district, and the poker run is a way for members to get together in a social way while raising funds at the same time. It aims to be a fun. relaxed and safe event, with pillion riders welcome and an emphasis on enjoying a ride with other motorcycle enthusiasts.
